February Speaker report

Gifts in Wills for Cancer Research - Alison England

The work of this charity is very wide. Prevention of cancer is one aspect of its work. Examples given were the HPV (human papillomavirus) vaccine given in schools to help protect against cervical cancer, and the research which showed a link between tobacco and disease. The latter leading to a Public Health Act in 2007 banning smoking in public areas. CRUK (Cancer Research UK) Radnet is a network of centres of excellence. In Leeds, the focus is on Medula blastoma in children, and in Manchester, developing new treatments.

The charity's vision is that by 2034 three out of four people will survive cancer. As with most charities, this one requires funding and one method of fundraising is a Gift in Wills approach. The astounding sum of £238 million pounds was raised last year via this and amounts to a third of its income. Legacies like these are left for different reasons and a video shared with us told the story of a lady who took part in a clinical trial to alleviate the effects of her treatment and subsequently did just that.

The charity offers a Free Will service and a legal guidance service too as another fundraising approach. Items and gifts that are donated are later auctioned and an interested audience engaged in a fun game of guessing the value of particular items given. Examples were; a stream in the countryside linked to licensed anglers fees (£150 p.a.) a padlock to a safety box in Harrods containing old bank notes (£40,000); a WW2 gun (£637), a USA Gold Double Eagle 1924 coin (£1,100), a collection of football programmes (£19,500), an Edward Lear painting (£80,000), and a range of classic sports cars (£438,000).

U3A GARDEN GROUP

Gardeners and garden designers of the past was the subject of our March meeting and involved member participation. We were invited to research a pre-21st century practitioner and give a short presentation on them.

We began in 18th century Yorkshire where John and William Aislabie landscaped Studley Royal and Hackfall Wood. They were followed by Humphry Repton who took on the mantle of Capability Brown to become England's foremost landscape designer.

The eminent Victorian Sir Joseph Paxton was responsible for the Crystal Palace, the gardens at Chatsworth, the Cavendish banana, and the Gardeners' Chronicle amongst many other developments. Shirley Hibberd was a prolific writer, he wrote for the amateur gardener, the fern enthusiast and promoted organic gardening.

In the 20th century the influential Vita Sackville West planted the iconic garden at Sissinghurst; Rosemary Varey was another influential designer in Britain and America with

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clients such as Elton John and King Charles. We finished our meeting in Cumbria where Sylvia McCosh had developed the lovely garden at Dalemain.

BIRD GROUP

Our second outing of the year for the u3a bird group was a local one to Nosterfield nature reserve. This time we centred our visit around the working quarry area. Easy parking off the B6267 adjacent to the Tarmac Quarry visitor centre meant we were a stone's throw away from Lingham Water.



From the hide, we spotted a pair of beautiful Bull Finches on the catkin filled branches of nearby trees. Swans, Tufted ducks and Pochard and a gaggle of Greylag Geese were seen enjoying the winter sun along with Shelducks. Interestingly, the Shelduck nests underground in old rabbit burrows, in tree holes or in haystacks. During the 19th century, it was persecuted for this habit in certain areas as it competed with rabbits which were food for many people. Hiding amongst the reeds and undergrowth and standing very still, we were fortunate to spot some Snipe. Their mottled brown

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feathers above with paler buff stripes on the back, and dark streaks on their chests were great camouflage but their distinctive long bills enabled us to just make them out in the scopes. We were treated to a lovely ariel display by a beautiful buzzard wheeling overhead in the blue skies. Its markings were clearly visible; this area must make for good hunting as we had spotted five buzzards on a previous visit back in July. Making our way, along the very muddy path we stopped along the hedge line to see if the renown Nosterfield Little owl was in the vicinity. Its owl box was clearly visible, but no sightings of its resident were seen today. With the working guarry in the background, we arrived at Flask Lake which has a large sandy gravel spit on which we spotted a large number of Black-headed gulls, in amongst who, two cormorants were drying their wings outstretched in the sun. Behind them were a good number of Oystercatchers. On the margins of the lake, were several Little Egrets strutting their bright yellow legs as their patrolled the area for food. Heading along the causeway, reflections from the sun made it tricky to keep track of Little and Great Grebes diving below the waterline. Binoculars and scopes came in useful when examining the colourful plumage of Teal and Tufted Ducks. Nearby a pair of swans were seen putting on a mating display-mirroring each other's move. All six swan species perform a variation of a courtship ritual in which the male and female face each other and bow their heads, forming a heart shape with both of their necks. Our group found this rather timely as our visit took place during Valentine's week! In total thirty-three bird species were spotted making it a worthwhile return visit to our local nature reserve.

Our next visit is to Fairburn Ings on 8 th April at 10:00 am.
