b) Sound System at Monthly Meetings and other Venues

Our u3a has been awarded a grant from the Pennines Township (of Rochdale Council) to buy a portable PA system capable of linking into our microphones to greatly improve speaker amplification at our monthly meetings (and where needed elsewhere within the u3a). It should be available for a test run at the December Christmas Social (11thDecember) and then brought into use from the January 2024 meeting onwards. We are going to see whether we can use it in conjunction with the portable hearing loop installed in the Harvey Room at the Coach House, which hopefully will be of benefit to those with hearing aids. Our u3a is grateful to the Pennines Township committee for awarding us a grant to purchase this equipment.

At Christmas time the whole family would help out on the stall and even at the age of nine or ten I was very often seen clutching a few oranges shouting "three for a bob". A lovely time.

Trips to Spitalfields market with Uncle Sid on a Wednesday morning were great. He would pick me up in the little lorry at 3am and managed to get me to school on time. (Several "market kids" had a snooze in the corner of the classroom on blankets quite often.) Working on the stall meant my arithmetic was second to none!

Back to the vegetarian guest: So easy. Labelling is great these days. Paxo is vegetarian. Bisto granules (not chicken) are veg. A blessing. Just remember, vegetarians eat everything on the plate apart from the meat. And we don't always want a lookalike sausage or burger.

People have often said "but don't you miss the turkey?" I'd miss the roast potatoes, mash, roast parsnips, carrots, peas, sprouts and gravy more. Yes even the sprouts.
