

## SHARED PRACTICE GUIDE 015 – CONVERT POWERPOINT TO A VIDEO

### **1. Introduction**

Shared practice guides (SPG) are a vehicle to share knowledge between the u3as in the London area. They are created by collating knowledge and experiences from those u3as. They are only a guide – what worked for one u3a might not work for your u3a. If in your experience something is wrong or you disagree with something, please write in to allow an update to be created and published. It's hoped these Guides will grow over time with more shared experiences.

### **2. Scope**

This particular SPG addresses how to convert a PowerPoint slide file to a mp4 video file.

### **3. Background**

Microsoft has brought out new functionality in PowerPoint which allows an enhancing of a basic presentation. An animated video can be more interesting than static slides. Basic knowledge of PowerPoint is required to follow this Guide. Versions pre 2015 don't provide this function.

### **4. Learnings**

This is the first issue of this SPG and the description of this additional PowerPoint functionality. Therefore there is limited practice and feedback so far on the use of this facility. Over time hopefully there will be feedback and updates to this SPG.

Please note, this feature is not suitable if you are recording a presentation because it doesn't record the presenter's voice.

A good example of where this feature is useful is for a u3a to display a series of local photographs than can be left to run at the start of a meeting or during a break (although you can use times animation for this function as well).

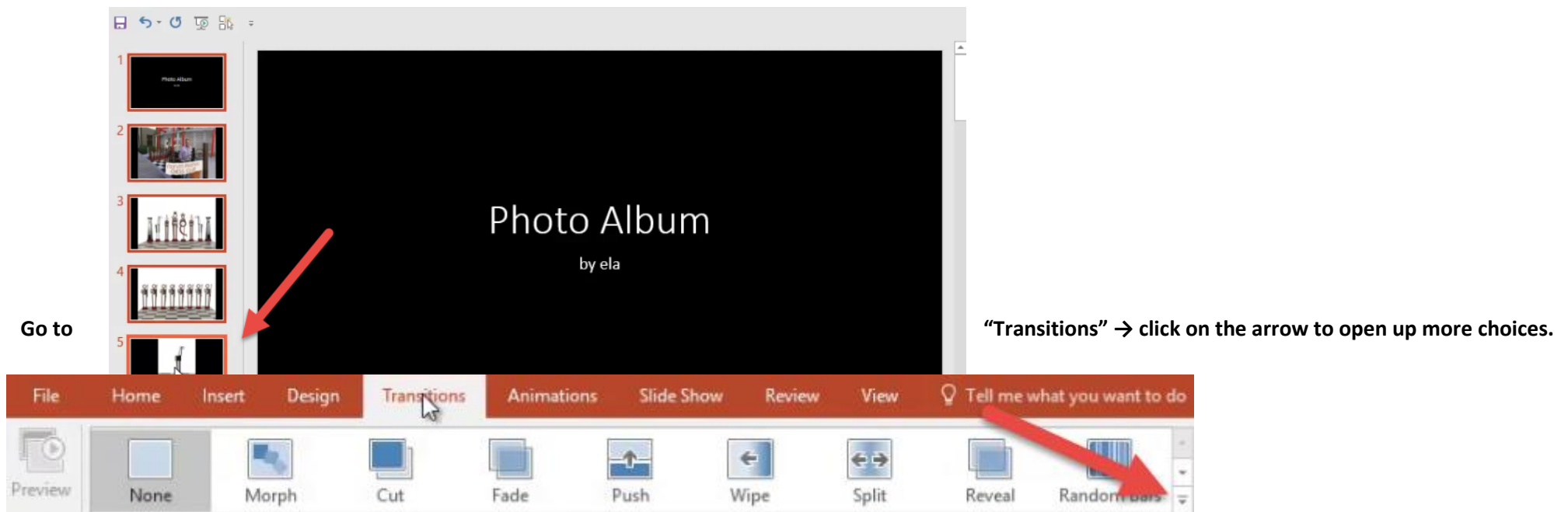

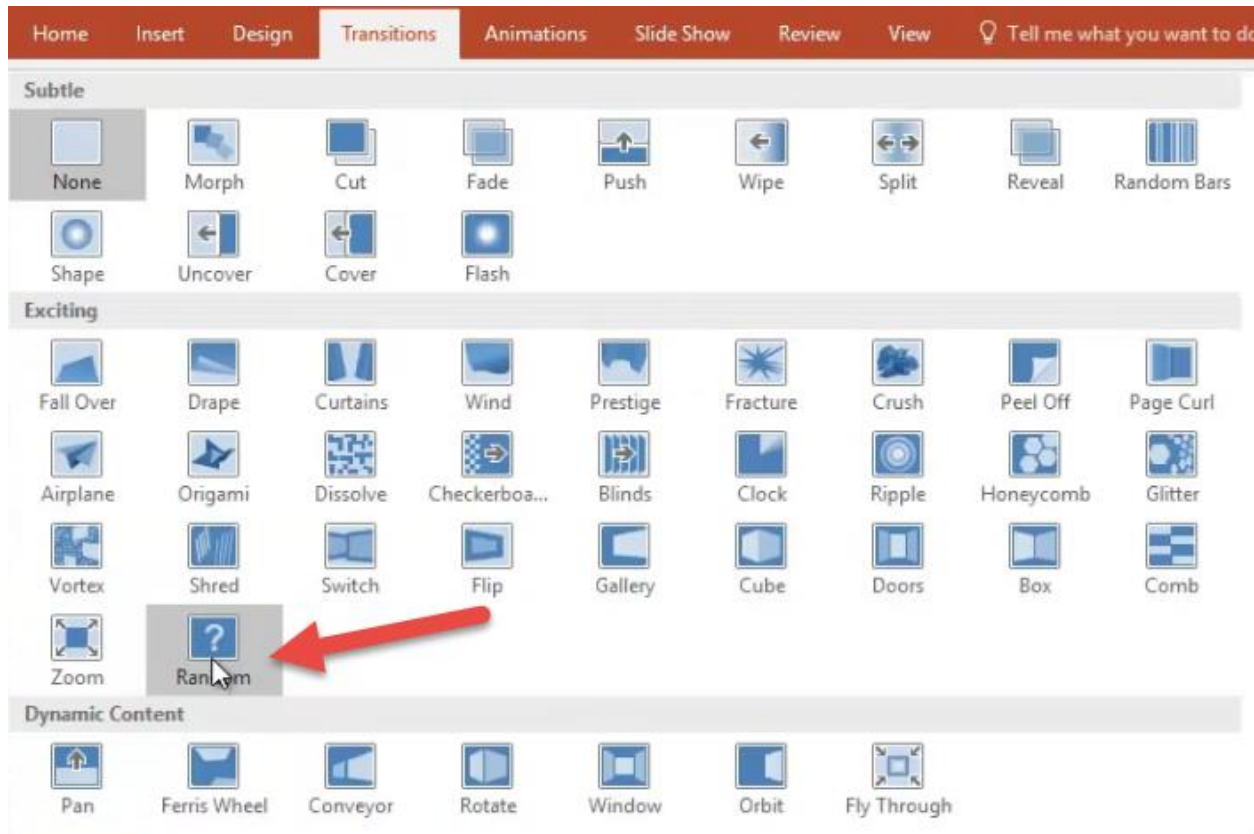
## APPENDIX 1 – DETAILED INSTRUCTIONS

### Powerpoint to Video

Add transitions to your slideshow *(moving in an interesting way from one slide to the next!)*

Click the first slide, then hold Shift while clicking the last slide to select the whole range of slides.





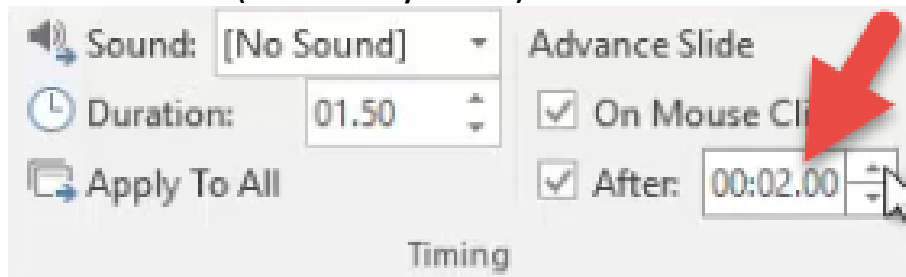
Click on “Random” (or any of the other ways of moving from one slide to the next)

Set the slides to advance automatically  
From the “Transitions” tab, tick the “Advance Slide” “After” box.



## SPG 15 – PowerPoint to a Video

Set it to 2 seconds (or whatever you want)



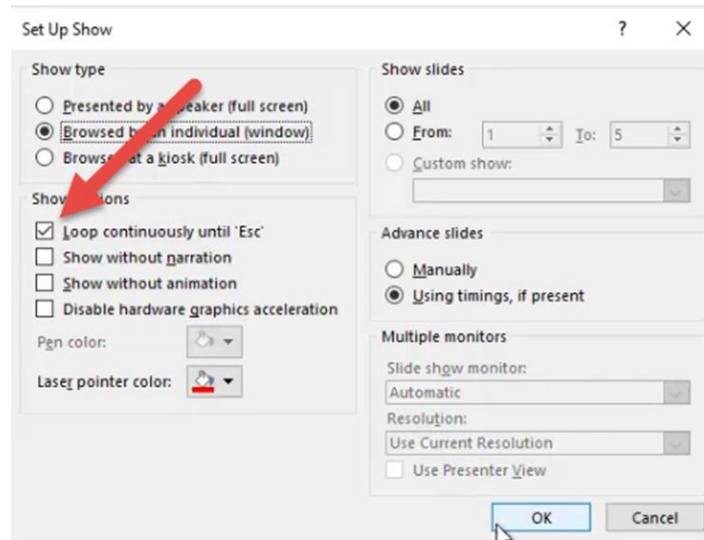
Set the slideshow to loop continuously

Go to "Slide Show" → "Set Up Show"



Turn on "Loop continuously until 'Esc'", then click "OK"

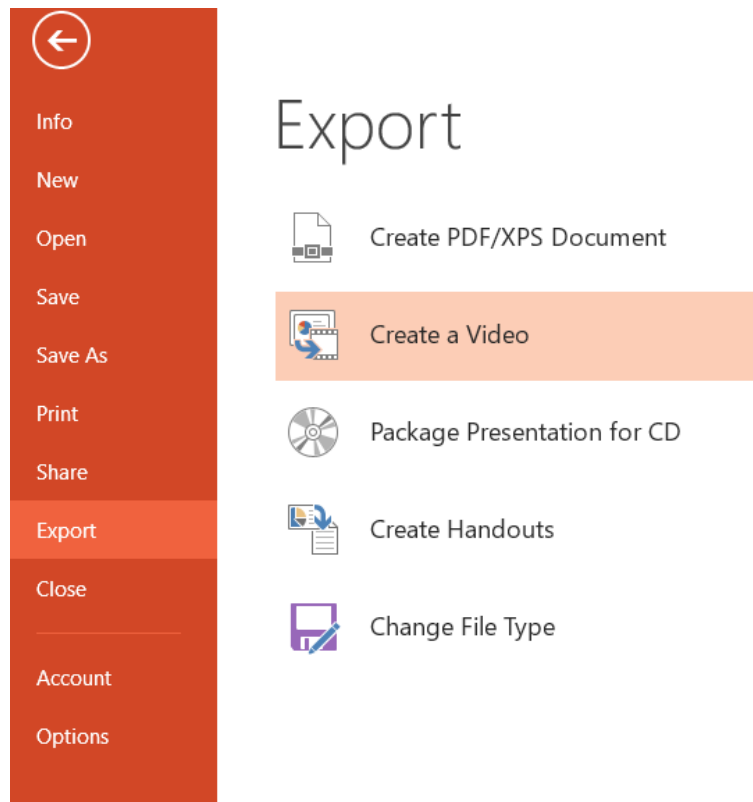
## SPG 15 – PowerPoint to a Video



### Save the ppt as a video

Click on **File**, then **Export**, then **Create a video** (*internet quality Medium worked ok for me*)

### Create a Video

Save your presentation as a video that you can burn to a disc, upload to the web, or email

- Incorporates all recorded timings, narrations, and laser pointer gestures
- Preserves animations, transitions, and media

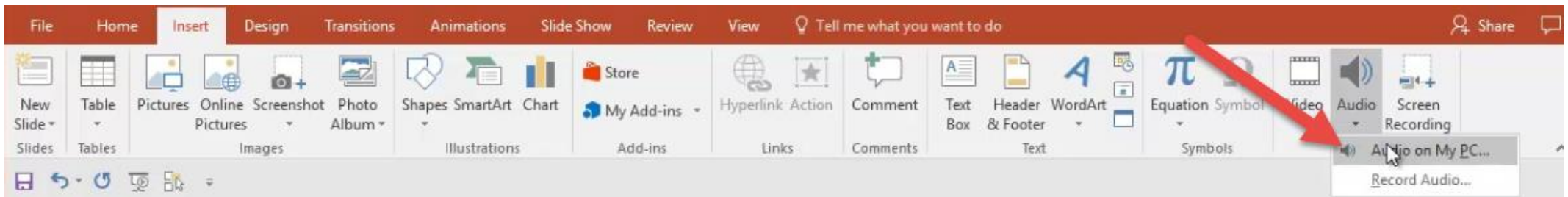

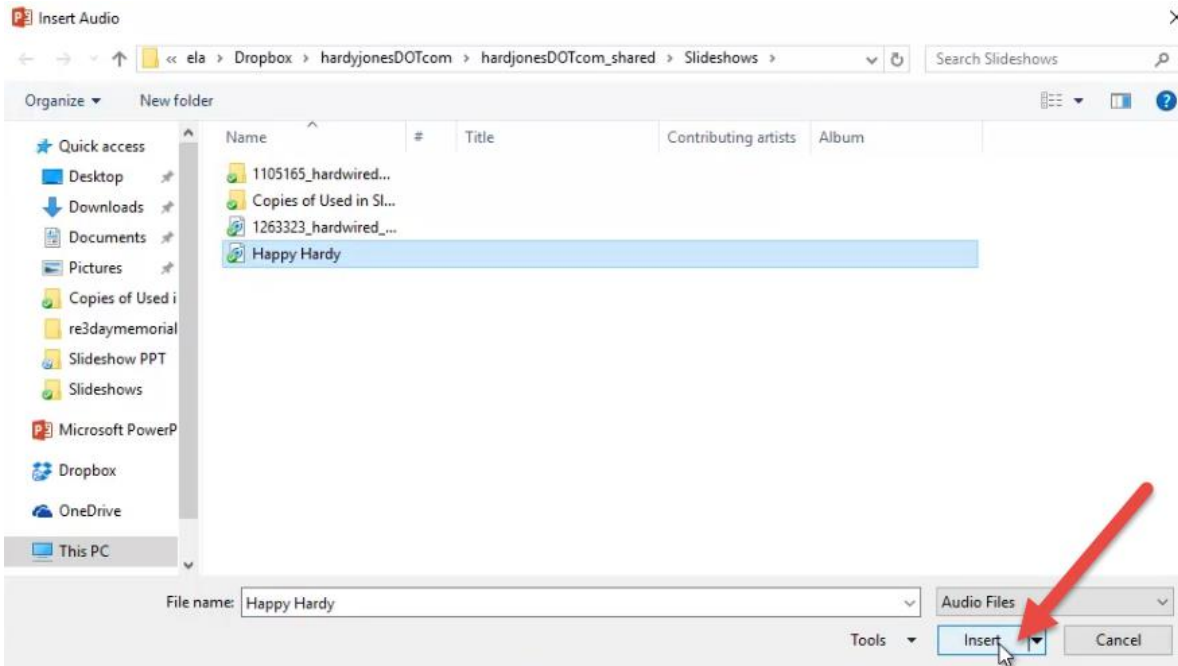


### To Add Music to the Powerpoint/Video

Go to "Insert" → "Audio" → "Audio on My PC".



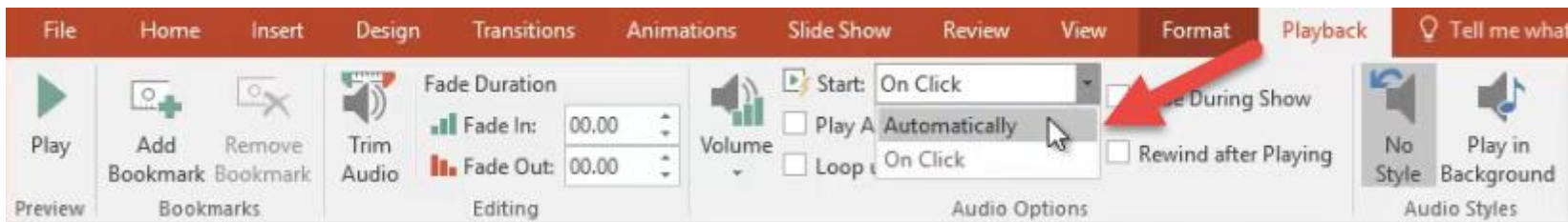

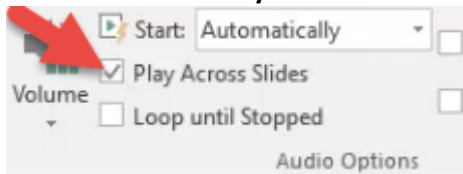
Select a music file and click “Insert”

Adjust the playback settings

Go to “Playback” → select “Automatically” for “Start” so that the music plays on its own.



Tick the box for “Play Across Slides”.



## SPG 15 – PowerPoint to a Video

To hide the audio speaker icon on the slide during the show, click on it to select it, then go to “Playback” → “Hide During Show”.
