Shakespeare's Limericks are not as well known as his sonnets but they do show his characteristic mastery of verse form. The 12 Limericks were discovered in a skip in Stratford-Upon-Avon last New Year's Eve. They are quite possibly in Shakespeare's own hand but are certainly believed to have been used by the Playwright to 'pitch' new projects to fellow members of his company*. As such they may provide a unique insight into the creative process.

(*Though closer textual and chemical analysis suggests that at least one may be of a more recent date.)
