Frozen Planet III

And now..... a BBC trailer featuring Sir David Attenborough:

D A: In this new series I shall be exploring what it is like to face extreme hardship in the depths of a cold winter now looming. D A: Snowy owls, narwhals, killer whales and Arctic monkeys have all reported similar difficulties and are fearful of the long cold dark nights (in case you haven't noticed clocks went back on Sunday) when they will be too frightened to turn on an electric blanket or roast a penguin. I came across a lone reindeer who told me,

Reindeer: I am on my own because I can't afford to start a family. Those who don't live on the extremes have no idea what it is like. Frankly I am not looking forward to Christmas. They ought to swop Westminster for the Antarctic and then see how they like it.

DA: And finally I asked a snow leopard, huddled in a blanket and clutching a Thermos flask, if she thought the new Prime Minister could make a difference to the current energy

crisis. She replied with a shrug of resignation,

Snow Leopard: Brexit, Covid, the NHS, strikes, the Northern Ireland Protocol-don't ask me what that one is about-Putin's war in Ukraine, the time we have wasted recently on daft fiscal thinking..... I used to be a nice orange colour with dark spots but I have gone white overnight with all the worry.
