Sue Clarke writes, 'At our June meeting we were treated to an uplifting morning of musical nostalgia. Kevin and Joy Siddall took us on their Musical Meander Around Britain. As we travelled, they performed songs associated with selected places. Our stops were backed up/supplemented by nuggets of interesting insights and background information. These included Kevin's miserly parking behaviour, Paul McCartney's inspiration when waiting for John Lennon at a bus stop and an Irish anthem sang at sporting events that can drown out the New Zealand Haka.

I strongly suspect most songs were familiar to us, however here's a play list for your reminiscence and interest. Starting from their home in Droylesden we stayed in the North West for three songs - Salford (**Dirty Old Town** by Ewan McColl), Liverpool (The Beatles, **Penny Lane**) and Wigan (**Uncle Joe's Mint Balls** by the Rochdale Cowboy, Mike Harding). Up to Scotland for the haunting, traditional **Wild Mountain Thyme** then down into the North East with Roger Whittaker's **Durham Town.** Venturing into God's own country, Yorkshire,



we had two songs, **On Ilkley Moor Baht'at** and the coastal **Scarborough Fair**. They acknowledged their student years in the Midlands but didn't represent it. Travelling south to Framlingham in Suffolk they chose the **Theme from the TV series The Detectorists** and from London **A Nightingale Sang in Berkley Square** immortalized by Vera Lynn in wartime. We moved west to Cornwall for lively **Sea Shanties** then up to Bath and the home of Sting, for **Fields of Gold**. Wales was represented by **Handbags and Gladrags** performed famously by Stereophonics. Crossing the sea to Southem Ireland we had the anthemic **Fields of Athenry**, written by Dubliner Pete St John. Finally, returning home to Salford we finished with Brian and Michael's tribute to LS Lowry, **Matchstalk Men and Matchstalk Cats and Dogs.'**

# Richborough Roman Fort and Amphitheatre

Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> July 10.00a.m - 11.00.a.m

This talk takes the audience on a virtual tour of one of the most important Roman sites in Britain; not to be confused with Caesar's brief visitations 100 years earlier. Richborough or Rutupiae, as it was known by the Romans, is considered the primary location for the invasion of Britain by the Romans in AD 43.

The site is unusual as its one of the few places across the country where we have evidence of continuous occupation for the almost 400 years of the Roman occupation of Britain.

In 2021 the amphitheatre was excavated, for only the second time. This talk includes an update on the new understandingsgained during this exciting time. Jenny the speaker was onsite during the excavation, a very special experience which she is happy to share.

This virtual tour lasting about 40 minutes takes the audience on a journey, pausing to look at interesting features, using a mixture of the latest evidence and interpretations, theories, and the occasional legend to help bring the site alive for a virtual or seated audience.

Neil Stevenson speaks about visiting the rarely visited, French occupied, coral atolls in the Indian Ocean. Neil has travelled to some of the least visited and remote parts of the world. This series of talks are about visiting parts of the world with few or no inhabitants.
