Spotlight on the Members' Meeting by Sue Clarke 'How I ended up in prison'

Our February speaker was Dr. Karen Castle who gave us a fascinating and amusing insight into her prison service career. She was the first qualified female nurse to be appointed as a Medical Prison Officer. This was an experiment to assess how a female presence might affect prison riot numbers. It was very successful. The talk and listen approach proved a calming influence, preventing many riots developing. Karen recalled experiences and observations encountered during her career. They were illustrated by interesting situations and characters and reinforced the u3a mantra 'learn, laugh, live'.

Karen fretted about being a couple of inches short of the required height for a Prison Officer but with trusty Tetley tea bags secreted in her tights under her heels she made the height and minced through the medical with no problems. Her diminutive stature proved advantageous later in duties



when offensive items like excrement and dangerous objects were hurled around. A quick duck of the head saved her many times. Yes, size does matter. Tetley tea bags are most efficient at water absorption and fast reflexes in the vertically challenged can prevent head injury.

Interesting characters met included the suave, Saville Row suited Mr Bint, a frighteningly intelligent man with impeccable manners. Upon initial meeting Karen assumed he was a lawyer. However, he was an accomplished fraudster passing himself off as a surgeon and, then later, after studying during his incarceration, an airline pilot. When moving on from nursing to the prison service Karen thought she'd applied for the Army. However, she'd attended a doctors' boozy bonfire party the night before the interviews! Karen attended psychological support sessions with prisoners and therapists often wondering which of them needed help most. Think we all have those thoughts about people, ourselves excepted, of course. Karen shared many useful skills learnt from inmates including hot wiring a car, housebreaking with a credit card, avoiding parking charges, the strength of Izal toilet paper, making deadly weapons and issues around drugs.

Pauline gave the vote of thanks, reinforcing the importance of our public services. Thanks also to Christine for organising such interesting speakers.

Introduction to the Air Fryer, with simple recipes

Air fryers(AF) are small, convection ovens, not deep fat fryers at all.

A powerful fan oven and small surface area means that they heat up quickly and cook speedily. For example, a whole small chicken will cook in 50 minutes.

Thinking of buying an AF?

Don't limit yourself by buying too small an appliance. Go for at least a medium sized air fryer and invest in a good cookbook,

Always go for quality when buying a machine. Maybe a good idea to be recommended by friends.

In my opinion, the AF is better than the microwave, as it produces crisp results quickly. Great for students, solo cooks, busy families, older people....in fact anybody. It is generally a brilliant way to cook!

You can reheat cooked foods, bake a pie, or a cake. Cook fluffy rice and even boil eggs for breakfast.

David Hockney and the Theatre

Friday 23rd February 2.00 p.m.- 3.00 p.m.
Through sound and video, art historian Peter Webb brings Hockney's theatre to life.

David Hockney has enjoyed visiting the theatre ever since his early years in Bradford. During his studies at the Royal College of Art in the early sixties, his work often used the stage as a device. His first steps in the world of theatre were cartoon-style sets and costumes for Alfred Jarry's absurdist play *Ubu Roi* for the Royal Court Theatre in London in 1966. It was not until 1974 that he had another opportunity when he was invited to produce designs for Stravinsky's *The Rake's Progress* for the Glyndebourne Festival Opera. These witty, inventive variations on the crosshatched engraving style of William Hogarth brought public and critical enthusiasm.

By means of sound and video Hockney's theatre is brought to life.
