## Gardening Group: Marilyn Dibble

Our guest speaker James Ellson, gave us a very interesting talk on his wide variety of Apples. He was a police officer for 15 years, starting in London and finishing as a Detective Inspector at Moss Side in Manchester.

"When I left the police I started writing, and have been writing ever since. My debut novel The Trail was published in 2020, and the sequel Cold Dawn in August 2022.

I live in the Peak District with my wife, and manage our smallholding, which includes bees and an orchard.

My passion on our smallholding is apple trees, and I am aiming for 100 varieties. Currently, 64! I propagate all my trees by whip and tongue grafting or budding, and I am experimenting with apple breeding (developing a new variety). This talk looks at the history and geography of the apple tree, how to grow them, propagation, and breeding. Includes the story behind the naming of the Bloody Ploughman apple. And a demonstration in whip and tongue grafting." Website: jamesellson.com

Well, it definitely feels like autumn is with us now, with some cooler mornings and heavy dews. Having said that, we have

also had some warm days and many plants are still growing, especially the lawns which I'm still having to mow on a weekly basis. Next year I'll have the robotic mower fitted to keep the back lawn trimmed! There's still plenty of colour in the borders, but gradually plants are now starting to slow down and before you know it, we'll have some wonderful autumn foliage to admire.

Jill and I have almost finished for the year with the Potting Shed stage. The Harrogate and Malvern Autumn shows were the last two shows of the season, and both were very good and felt like giant harvest festivals, celebrating the end of the gardening season.

Our final outing of the year with the Potting Shed will be to the RHS Harlow Carr Autumn Gardening Weekend on 21-22 October where Jill will be cooking seasonal fruit & veg, I'll be talking gardening and Jonathan Moseley will be creating some stunning flower arrangements. There's a selection of specialist nurseries, RHS talks and Paula Routledge from Floral Media will be there helping visitors to create their own buttonhole for free!

Of course, life continues after the Potting Shed with the development and planting of our own garden and we'll both be on the road giving talks and demos to gardening clubs, U3A's, WI's and flower clubs through autumn, winter and spring, where I'm sure we'll see many of you.

## **Jobs for October**

Air temperatures might be cooling down, but the soil is still very warm, making it ideal for autumn planting of trees, shrubs, fruit bushes, roses and perennials. Planted now, the roots will soon start to grow out into the moist, warm soil helping the plants to settle in and establish before winter.

There is still time to plant spring flowering bulbs such as daffodils, crocus, camassia, iris and snowdrops and the golden rule is plant three times their depth. If you have tulip bulbs, wait until November or early December to plant when the soil is cooler.

Summer bedding and annuals can be removed from the garden as they finish flowering and replaced with wallflowers, polyanthus and violas for a spring display.

Now is also a great time to plant up a container or two for autumn, winter and spring interest. Evergreen shrubs, berrying plants, ornamental grasses and ivy are all good plants to use. They can be interplanted with bulbs and spring flowering bedding.

Get the compost heap ready for the influx of autumn garden waste such as old veg plants, leaves, grass clippings and stems of herbaceous plants that are being cut down. Mixed together it will form compost for the garden next spring.

If your lawn needs some care and attention, October is a good time to aerate compacted areas to improve winter drainage, scarify to remove thatch and moss and to over seed to help thicken up a thin lawn. Ideally try to complete lawn maintenance by the end of the month to give the grass time to recover before winter.

If toadstools and fairly rings are a problem on your lawn, brush them off with a stiff broom.

Bring tender perennials such as pelargonium, fuchsias and cannas undercover for winter. For now, a cold greenhouse is sufficient, but when temperatures drop, a little frost protection will be needed.

Lift maincrop potatoes, allow the tubers to dry for a few hours before storing in paper or hessian sacks in a cool, dry, dark shed.

Plant spring cabbage plants and over-wintering onion sets into prepared ground.

Keep picking apples and pears as the fruits start to ripen on the tree. If storing them, place sounds fruits in trays in a cold, airy shed.

Young strawberry plants raised from runners in late summer can be potted or planted out into the garden to establish their roots before winter.

Remove the last of the leaves from tomato plants to aid fruit ripening and cut back the amount of water you give the plants. Close the greenhouse doors and windows mid-afternoon to help retain warmth overnight, which will help the ripening process.

#### From Russia With Love -Philip Tucker



At the October monthly meeting we had a magnificent talk about Russia from Cathy McAteer a Post Doctoral Research Fellow (Russia) at Exeter University. It quickly became clear that she knew her stuff, packing more than 500 years of very eventful history into a talk of an hour, all delivered with grace and charm. The Russian people have endured the indifference and hostility of their rulers for centuries. When Peter the Great built the spectacularly beautiful wibecame known as the city of bones. The Tsars maintained for centuries a system of serfdom – a form of slavery until its abolition in 1861. Stalin was even worse deliberately causing famine in the Ukraine in the early 1930's. and arresting millions in the purges during the late 1930s' being arrested and either executed or despatched to the Gulag - labour camps deep in Siberia. In the Soviet era most families lived in just one room. That has changed for some in the Putin age with the development of mortgages, available for a new middle class defined by whether they have 12 electronic gadgets. All this might seem depressing but members were taken by Cathy's love of all things Russian since the age of 13. She had more questions than usual at the

end, running over time. She has been invited to come back. I am sure she will be welcome.

#### Family History Group – Val Wood

Our visit to the Nottingham Archives was amazing, as well as the weather being warm we had a lovely stroll alongside the canal. We were made to feel very welcome and wouldn't hesitate to go back to do research if it was needed. The tour started off with an introduction of the different documents stored; The NA currently hold 5 million documents . There was a display of some original documents, one going back to the 1100s. Charters and Borough records are the oldest records held at NA from 1155/6. They also have estate records as well as Parish, Non Conformist, Probate, School, Local Authority, Poor Law, Diaries plus Maps and Plans. There was an old map of Mansfield dated 1917, photos, wills, old school photos one was of young girls doing a 'high jump' in long skirts, amazing. We were told about preservation and conservation of everything that come in to be archived,



how they sometimes have to be put in a freezer to kill off any insects that may be within the item.

After the introduction we then went on a tour of the building showing us how the items were logged then indexed and stored in a room which is kept at a certain humidity and temperature. We then went into the Conservation Unit and were shown examples of the different types of damage done and what they do to help preserve each item, whatever it is made of. Then we were given a demonstration of how they rebind books how the pages were sewn together and rebound in leather and re-gilded. It was all very interesting and well worth a visit.

#### **HALLOWEEN CLIPSTONE WELFARE 27 OCTOBER**


