



#### Strollers February Walk in Sherwood Forest

It was a lovely bright winter's day when 16 members participated in our February walk. We started from the RSPB Visitors Centre in Edwinstowe and walked along several paths which were new to us. We did see the Major Oak, which was just showing signs of new growth.

If an oak tree is over 400 years old it is known as an ancient oak. There are over 1,000 ancient oaks in Sherwood Forest National Nature Reserve. The Major Oak is between 800 and 1,000 years old and is believed to weigh around 23 tonnes, it has a girth of 33 feet and a canopy of 92 feet.

The name originates from Major Hayman Rookes description of it in 1790. He was a retired Army Officer who became an antiquary and archaeologist who particularly studied the local area. After retiring from the army, he came to live in Mansfield Woodhouse and is buried in St Edmund's Church in Mansfield Woodhouse.

The Major Oak is therefore named in his honour in recognition of his writings and his love of Sherwood Forest.

The morning ended with most of us enjoying refreshments in the Courtyard Café and a good chat.

#### Family History Group: Valerie Wood and Ken Gilbert

Our 28 February meeting was attended by seven of our members, the topic this month was newspapers.

We started with a photo taken in 1913 outside a church. The photo was of about 30 choir boys and amongst them was one of our member's relative. The photo was from a local newspaper and had been saved and passed down the generation to our member. Amazing.

Another member found that a relative had the letters VS after their name, and, after much research, found they had studied under a Professor William Dick at a college in Edinburgh. In 1850 they passed their exams at Edinburgh and received 'Veterinary Diploma', the forerunner of today's veterinary qualifications.

In my research, I found that our Great, Great Granddad, born in 1807, was a Brick Master who used to own a brick yard in Oldbury alongside the Birmingham Canal, West Midlands, producing blue bricks. He employed 53 people and had 2 servants.

He also had 14 children, 2 being twins, and was born in the brickyard. These blue bricks have been used in many parts of the country including in the construction of Papplewick Pumping Station.

We had an enjoyable meeting; our next meeting on 28 March is all about immigration and emigration, looking at how our ancestors moved around the world.

His name is John Lewis and he is Chair of Bingham u3a in Notts and a regular attendee at our Network meetings.

#### Third Age Trust

#### Board Meeting: 22 February 2023

#### Summary Report to be used when sharing with members

The main focus of the meeting was to review the financial information available for Q3, the year-todate period ending 31 December 2022.

- **Q3 Outturn vs Budget**. The outturn for Q3 showed a significant improvement on budget figures caused mainly by cost savings and slowing progress on a number of key projects areas. In particular, expenditure associated with the Site builder replacement and initial proposals for the Learning Hub had both been reduced, although some costs may transfer to the next budget year. Savings had also been achieved as expected staff recruitment was phased across the year. A Finance News Extra will shortly be issued providing more detail.
- **2023/24 Budget**. The budget for 2023/24 is still being finalised and will be presented to the next Finance Committee and thoroughly discussed at the next Board meeting in March. A number of uncertainties remain including future inflation rates and membership income.
- **Multi-year Forecast**. Recognising these uncertainties, the longer-term position beyond 2023/24 will also be reviewed at the Board meeting in March.
- Investment Policy. The Board approved an update to the Investment Policy, which focused on a conservative approach including term savings accounts with the main banks, and avoided any investments that attracted high risk.
- **Start Up Expenses**. The Board endorsed an approach to claiming and payment of expenses to new u3a members (eg Steering Committee) and Trust Volunteers associated with start-up u3as, where a local bank account had not at that stage been established.
- **Conference 2023**. Following a snap poll sent to all u3as in February, there was a clear majority against holding a conference in 2023. Although only 23% of u3as had replied, 66% were against holding a conference this year, most citing cost as a significant factor.
- **Open Board Meetings**: In the interests of transparency, the Board initially discussed the feasibility of live streaming face-to-face Board meetings. As live streaming entails a number of complexities, more details will be prepared for the March Board meeting.
- Trustee Nominee Hustings: Report back from the Hustings 6 candidates are nominated for the West Midlands, Wales and East Midlands trustee positions, no nominee received for the London position and the process will be re-run in London almost immediately. Voting commences week beginning 20 February with successful candidates being declared on 27 March.
- **Membership Fee Breakdown**: A simple breakdown of expenditure from the £4 annual membership fee was developed and discussed, and it will be circulated to u3as and included on the website as part of the Post AGM transparency programme.

Please note that official minutes are the true record of discussions and decisions taken at Board meetings. This is a summary of the main discussions and should not be taken as an authoritative statement. If you require any further detail about any item, please contact your Trustee.

We arrive at Highgrove at 12.00, the guided tour starts at 12.30 (just time for a comfort break). There will be a comfort/coffee stop each way. Perhaps eat here or on the coach as there will not be time for lunch when we arrive at Highgrove.

The Orchard room is booked for 2.00pm for light snacks at the end of the tour. <u>Picnics/ eating outside is not allowed.</u> The guided tour of gardens is 1 ½ hours. The only toilets are at the entrance. <u>PHOTO ID is required for every person, or bank card.</u> Photos are restricted to certain areas. Wheelchairs should be suitable for all types of surfaces. There is no access to the house. The coach will park off site and return to Highgrove to collect us about 3.45pm.

Hope this covers everything, but, if not, please let me know.

Looking forward to see everyone at our first Garden Group meeting of the year on Tuesday 7 March.

The Garden Group members fee is still £16.00 for 4 meeting (March -June) and £5.00 per meeting for guest.

#### Linacre Walk Report Tuesday 14 February 2023

There were 19 members who joined us for this lovely walk around the Linacre Reservoirs near Chesterfield. We all met in the car park and walked down to the Rangers' office where there is an interesting 'jigsaw puzzle' information board and map of the Linacre Reservoirs complex.

Permission was granted by an Act of Parliament for the Lower Reservoir to be constructed in 1855 (holding capacity 140 million litres), followed by Upper Reservoir in 1885 (575 million litres), and Middle Reservoir in 1904 (410 million litres). Prior to 1909 the water was unfiltered before being pumped to customers, resulting in complaints about its taste and odour. Quote: 'The appearance of the public water supply was such that the poor used it as soup, the middle class for washing their clothes and the elite for watering their gardens.'

Walking down the steep steps to cross over the dam wall of Lower Reservoir, we then headed uphill to a junction of paths where we followed the bridlepath up to Old Brampton Church dedicated to St Peter and St Paul. Although much was restored in 1924, there are still the remains of a Norman doorway in the south wall. Inside are choir stalls erected in 1938 to the memory of Thomas Linacre of Linacre (1450-1524) who was a fellow of All Souls and the first President of the Royal College of Physicians. He lived opposite the church in Brampton Hall, parts of which are medieval.

The church is well known for its clock face curiosity which has 63 minutes to the hour. Installed in 1897 to commemorate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, it is thought that the painter may have over indulged while visiting the George and Dragon pub, which until 2010 was located nearby, resulting in a few too many strokes of his brush on his return!

From here we took a narrow steep path downwards with wonderful views across the countryside. The walls hereabouts are built in the dry-stone method but using delicate small slabs of grit-stone, a stark contrast to the jagged lumps of limestone to the west of the county.

Eventually we reach Westwick Lane between high hedgerows of holly, ivy and hawthorn.

After passing the imposing and wonderfully positioned Westwick Farm, we turned right at a junction and descended steeply on a wonderful old lane which meanders through a 'Postman Pat' landscape passing remote properties before going straight through the yard of Frith Hall. This farm has recently been accepted as an environmental project, part of the Environmental Stewardship Agreement with Natural England. The farmhouse dates from 1804, but a barn built about 1600 is reputedly one of the largest cruck structures in Derbyshire, having seven trusses.

The group continued along the lane, passing an old duck pond with rushes and weeds. This could well be one of the old routes used by John Stevenson who was recorded in 1692 as living at Hallcliffe House, Brampton. He was a yeoman involved in the lead trade and was registered as owning '5 pack saddles, gears for 4 of them and a collar of bells.

The bells were worn by all packhorse trains to warn of their approach, some consisting of a long line of up to 100 ponies. This road now becomes Bagthorpe Lane, an easy-to-follow walk, emerging at a little cluster of properties known as Hollins, with The Royal Oak pub opposite, where we took refuge to indulge in an excellent lunch - it comes highly recommended.

Following our lunch, the walk went downhill! This is a former turnpike road of 1759 and was the main route from Baslow to Chesterfield. It was used as part of a salt road from Cheshire, entering the market town of Chesterfield along Saltergate, which acquired its name as long ago as 1285. Walking down the road we got fine views of the Crooked Spire in Chesterfield.

Continuing our walk down the roadside, we reached the quaint former Hollins Wesleyan Chapel of 1846. At Hollins House, we turned off the road onto a narrow-walled footpath before Priestfield Grange and then crossed the fields and stiles on the well-walked path to return to the reservoirs with grand views of the water of the Upper Reservoir. After completing our walk across the field, we entered woodland and down the path to the sides of the reservoir and then across the dam wall.

After crossing over the dam, we followed a track through tall trees. The woodland here contains many oak trees along with beech, alder, larch and pine. Conifers are often planted next to reservoirs for two reasons.

They keep away farm animals that might pollute the water and, after a few years, they can be sold for timber. The area is a haven for wildlife and birds as well as a habitat for bugs, beetles and interesting insects. There are many varieties of wildflowers to be found especially bluebells which, in spring lie as a carpet beneath the trees.

#### The Roman Villa Walk Thursday 23 February 2023

It was a bright, sunny but cool, day when we all met to begin our walk in the car park at Mansfield Woodhouse railway station. Our walk leaders for the day were Marilyn and Dave Stubbs and what a joyful pair they are taking every opportunity to chat to various members of the group.

We began by walking up towards Oxclose Wood, over the old coal tips, but now unrecognisable after extensive landscaping and tree planting.

The Romans had a fortress here in Mansfield Woodhouse and a civilian settlement in the area from about 20AD.

There was a wholly wooden church in Mansfield Woodhouse before the 1086 Domesday Book, but a part timber, part stone church was raised here in 1190. The church burned to the ground in the Mansfield Woodhouse fire of 1304. The church was rebuilt using stone between 1804 and 1810 and this <u>Church of St Edmund</u>, <u>Mansfield Woodhouse</u>, still stands.

Stone from Mansfield Woodhouse was quarried and used in the building of the Houses of Parliament and Southwell Minster.

From close to the Roman Villa, we walked across open countryside and then down towards Pleasley Vale. Unfortunately, close to Pleasley, we found our pathway had been blocked due to building work, which meant a detour of almost 3 miles. However, the walk was enchanting with lots of snowdrops along our path in the woodland setting. Eventually we arrived at Pleasley Mills for our break.

The caravan served drinks and exceptional food and very low prices - highly recommended!

The Pleasley Vale Cave was discovered in 1862. Inside the cave were the bones of reindee*r*, woolly rhinoceros, wolf and wild horse – at that time the animals lived in a very cold climate. The second cave, known as Yew Tree Cave, was explored by William Ransom in the 1860s, where he discovered bones of roe deer, wolf and pig, indicating a warmer climate. The area has been used 600,00 years, like Creswell Crags.

You only have to look at Pleasley Vale's striking stone mills to see this is a site with history. In the 17th century it was home to a water-powered forge before it was bought in 1784 by five men, one of these being Henry Hollins, to transform the site into cotton spinning mills. Three mills were built between then and 1913. Mill 1 was burnt down in 1840 and Mill 3 in 1844, the latter after Hollins had received an anonymous letter threatening to burn it down. Both had to be totally rebuilt.

These mills are said to be haunted. In 2004 the mills played host to the 'Most Haunted' team. It is said to have a negative and an oppressive atmosphere, enough to drive some visitors to tears, causing them to feel disorientated or nauseous. One of the most haunted areas of the building is the dye room on the first floor where the ghost of a former boss at the mill is said to haunt. He is described as an intimidating and abusive entity; not surprising since, in life, he is said to have murdered one of the mill workers!

The nearby Pleasley Pit was sunk in 1870 and was worked until 1983 when it closed.

Following our very deserved break at the cafe, we walked through Pleasley village and up towards Northfield House, then on towards the old garden centre, across the old Pleasley Pit railway line and finally up the hill to Oxclose Woods back to our starting point. Although the walk was advertised as 3.5 miles, due to our diversion we walked almost 6.5 miles, but everyone was still smiling at the end.

## Notes on Chesterfield, Extracts from the Pathe Finders Walk.

Chesterfield began as a Roman fort, which was built around 70 AD until the 2nd century when the Romans left. However, the Roman Fort gave its name to Chesterfield. The Saxon word for a Roman fort or town was Caester and their word for grazing land around the village was feld. So, the village was Caester Feld and eventually Chesterfield. By 1165 Chesterfield had a market and in 1204 Chesterfield was granted a charter, granting the towns people certain rights.

## Chesterfield, Crooked Spire Church (St Mary and All Saints)

The crocked spire leans at an alarming 9 feet 5 inches from true.

The typical explanation is that the builders used green timbers, which warped over time

## The Roman Villa Walk

The Roman Villa, (which was occupied between 130- 340AD and discovered in 1786 by Mayor



between 130- 340AD and discovered in 1786 by Mayor Hayman Rooke (1723-1806), a British soldier and antiquarian who came from Pleasley Vale. This year it's the 300th anniversary of his birth. The major had another claim to fame by being the person to name the Major Oak, previously known as "The Major's Oak".

There was a wholly wooden church in Mansfield Woodhouse before the 1086 Domesday Book, but a part timber, part stone church was raised here in 1190.

## The Roman Villa as it was

The church burned to the ground in the Mansfield Woodhouse Fire of 1304. The church was rebuilt using stone between 1804 and 1810 and this <u>Church of St Edmund</u>, <u>Mansfield Woodhouse</u>, still stands.
