Hello everyone,

Hope you all had a good Christmas break and Happy New Year.

As I write this newsletter the rain has finally stopped and believe it or not, we've got some blue sky and sunshine! I feel like running around on the lawn to celebrate, although at the moment our lawns are very soggy, and I'd just make a mess!

Since November it's been very wet across the UK with lots of flooding and waterlogged conditions. In Lincolnshire we had our normal January rain fall in the first three days of the month! Fingers crossed, we're now in for a period of dry, cooler weather which will be great for the garden.

From now on the days will gradually lengthen and slowly bulbs will start to emerge and winter shrubs will produce their delicate, often scented flowers. Daphne, winter honeysuckle, mahonia, viburnum and sarcococca are just a few that bring a little cheer to the garden and very soon we'll have snowdrops and winter aconites to admire.

For Jill and me, hopefully February will be a time when we get lots done in the garden. While it's been too wet to garden, we've been building a new log store and paving a storage area, but as soon as the soil drains a little, we'll be back in the garden. My plan is to have all the beds and borders in the side and rear garden shaped, forked over and composted ready for planting come March when the soil starts to warm up. I've already got lots of the plants but need to buy a few more and I'm really keen to make sure we include several with winter interest in the form of evergreen foliage, stem colour and winter flowers. For a bit of inspiration, when I'm next up in North Yorkshire, I'll pop into Harlow Carr to have a wander through the Winter garden, which looks magnificent at this time of the year.

We'll also be out and about giving talks and demonstrations, so all in all the next month or two looks like being busy!

Jobs for February

Now is a great time to make sure all your gardening tools are clean and ready for the new gardening season. Spade, forks, rakes and hoes can all be cleaned, and the steel parts wiped over with an oil rag to prevent rusting. Wooden handles and shafts and be lightly sanded and coated with linseed oil to protect them. Once finished they will look like new.

If your lawn and garden soil is wet and soggy, keep off it until it naturally starts to dry. A few dry, bright days will make all the difference. To help any surface water drain where the soil or lawn is compacted, spike the ground with a garden fork pushed in as deep as possible.

Established wisteria can be given a winter prune to further shorten last year's grow back to just a few inches. It's also a good time to carry out harder pruning on large plants that are spreading or growing out from the wall too much. Don't go mad though as pruning off too much will result in fewer flowers.

With the possibility of colder weather on the way, make sure all outside taps are protected from frost by fitting a polystyrene cover or by wrapping bubble polythene around the pipes and tap.

Lawn mowers are now finished with until early spring so it a good time to clean them and get them serviced ready for the new mowing season.

When the ground is dry enough to walk on, now is a good time to make any alterations to the shape of existing beds or to create new ones.

Dead head winter flowering pansies and violas to keep them looking good and to produce new flower buds.

Apples and pear trees can be given their winter prune while they are dormant. It can be done any time before the buds start to burst in March. Thin out overcrowded branches, cut out dead wood and shorted long new growth. The aim is to have an open canopy.

Keep harvesting winter vegetables such as parsnips, winter cabbage, Brussels and kale. If the ground is very wet, lay a wooden board down to walk on to.

If you've got an established clump of rhubarb, it can be covered over with a large container or forcing pot to force the stems into early growth to provide you with tender, pink sticks in March and April.


If you fancy growing a few large onions, now is the time to sow the seed in pots or small trays. You'll need to provide a little heat such as an electric propagator or warm windowsill to help germination.



CRESWELL CRAGS WALK THURSDAY 25 JANUARY

We began our walk at the Dukeries Garden Centre at Welbeck Abbey. There were 23 walkers in total, some of which were

new to our group namely Trevor and Barbara Kirby, Christine Smith, Barbara West and Jan Ellis. All were very welcome and it proved to be a morning perfect for our walk.









Overlooking Creswell

Welbeck Abbey: Thomas de Cuckney founded the religious house in 1140 and it was made a monastery in 1153. The abbey thrived until Henry VIII dissolved the abbeys and it was eventually sold to Gilbert, 7th Earl of Shrewsbury for the sum of £555 6s 6d and then the whole Welbeck estate to Bess of Hardwick's youngest son, Sir Charles Cavendish in 1607. It was then passed to his son William Cavendish, later the first Duke of Newcastle. In the 18th century, it passed through an heiress into the Bentinck family and became the seat of the Earls and Dukes of Portland.

Each generation has made its mark on the estate.

The 5th Duke of Portland - most famously known as the 'burrowing duke,' was responsible for commissioning an extraordinary range of buildings as well as a network of tunnels below the estate.

He was also the man behind the creation of the estate's kitchen gardens - the largest in Britain and the development of one of the biggest riding schools in the world.

Welbeck Village at the heart of the estate was also one of the 5th Duke's legacies. Today this private village is closed to the public and, hidden away, remains barely touched by the modern-day.

In 1890 Welbeck was sold again to Sir John Robinson, passing in 1929 to his great-nephew Captain John Farr, whose widow still lives there.

Welbeck Abbey's State Room has guided tours which are open to the public during the summer and comes well recommended.

From the garden centre we walked along the new footpath from the Harley Gallery and through a small woodland with many snowdrops in flower.

We then crossed the A60 and took the quiet footpath towards Creswell Crags. Before reaching the centre we passed a memorial for the Canadian WWII crashed aircraft.

Since the Creswell Crags centre was closed we continued on through some woodland until we reached the lake. The county borders of Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire runs right down the middle of the lake and on checking passports we went down the Derbyshire side viewing the caves and the gorge as we went along.

Creswell Crags is of outstanding historical importance and world renowned. The wildlife once living in and around the lake was extensive and included Hippopotamus, Woolly Mammoth, Rhino, Hyena, Sabre Toothed Tiger, Wolf and many more. The caves are also important sites for prehistoric Cave Art dating back 14000 years. The Church Hole cave is world-famous, containing examples of the oldest verified cave art in the UK. This includes images of bison, reindeer and birds, as well as some abstract symbols which may have had some religious meaning or witch marks.

The caves have been occupied as far back as 60,000 years ago. Guided Tours of the caves are available from the visitor centre and well worth the experience. More information can be found at https://www.creswell-crags.org.uk/

Following our walk along the length of the lake the group climbed up a short slope to look upon Creswell Village. From here we could see the remains of the Holy Well of Creswell or Christ's Well hence the name Creswell.

From here we took a path across farmland towards the village of Holbeck but before reaching it we had to negotiate a fallen tree and shrubbery probably brought down in the recent winds.

We crossed the road in Holbeck and took a beautiful private avenue lined with Lime Trees which lead to the private chapel of St. Winifred's.

St Winifred's Church was the traditional burial place of the Dukes of Portland and their families, most of whom are interred in the small churchyard. Note the names of those buried there... Dukes & Duchesses of Portland, Cavendish & Bentinck.

Having looked around the grounds of the Chapel we continued along the avenue of Limes until we reached a country lane where we turned left to start our walk back to Welbeck Garden Centre.

COMMONWEALTH WAR GRAVES COMMISSION - Forest Town Arena Tuesday 23 January.

Event organised by David Drew Mansfield u3a. Report by Bill Harrison.

An evening of not just remembrance but one of gratitude.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) is intergovernmental organisation of six independent member states whose principal function is to mark, record and maintain the graves and places of commemoration of Commonwealth of Nations military service members who died in the two World Wars/ Falklands, Iraq, Iran and other conflicts.

The commission is also responsible for commemorating Commonwealth civilians who died as a result of enemy action during the Second World War. The commission was founded by Sir Fabian Ware and constituted through Royal Charter in 1917 as the Imperial War Graves Commission. The change to the present name took place in 1960.

Prior to the presentation, the act of Homage was led by David Drew Chairman of the Royal Air Force Association as he called for silence and to pay Homage to the sacrifice made by so many. Acknowledging, honouring, and respecting an individual's achievements, influence, or memory is a deeply rooted practice and in doing so, is a sign of admiration, gratitude, and respect.

The talk was given by Martin Kerr a CWG volunteer whose uncle died serving with Bomber Command in WW2. There was a very good turnout of twenty -five people, with the majority being members of Mansfield u3a. Many thanks to David Drew for organising and inviting our Mansfield u3a members. A wonderful evening enjoyed by all. Bill Harrison.

'Threads through Creation' is an astonishing textile art exhibition showing at Sheffield Cathedral from now until 2nd March.
