TREASURER'S REPORT

The first change for this year was that the social account has to be within the main account. This is not a March U3A decision; it is a directive by the Charity Commission and The Third Age Trust. The social account had a healthy balance of £760. This account is mainly for the Christmas party. Funds are raised through the raffles held throughout the year.

This left our second Account unused so as new Treasurer I decided that I would move the monies that some groups pay into us to this account. This is used for room hire, equipment and materials used by these groups. This money is ring-fenced for each individual group, as each group is self financing which makes it much easier to manage.

The finances of the March U3A are approximately in a very similar position to a year ago, despite reducing monthly meeting fees to 50p, paying for the U3A magazine, along with the reduced £15 membership fee, all introduced last year. Good news indeed, but of course there are always price rises in the pipeline. The room rental costs at the Community Centre have risen for all the rooms in the centre but up till now as a main user we have not been affected so far. However any new rooms rented will be at the new prices. Currently we pay £960 per year for the Meeting Hall and Room 6.

We have, however, been asked to pay for the three storage cupboards we use and also the equipment we have stored there, i.e. bowls mats rack and table tennis tables. This will amount to £240 per year which is not unexpected and affordable. Another cost rise from next April will be for our administration system, Beacon, which will go up to £1 per head for current members - 295 at the moment. This is because this year the management costs have exceeded income. The Third Age Trust is also looking to introduce a new "Beacon 2 System" so no doubt the costs will rise again in the future.

Capitation Fees to the Third Age Trust are based on the number of members we have - £3.50 comes out of each membership fee. All U3As pay this to support the Head office and Networks and the facilities it provides. If you belong to more than one U3A you only pay this at your main U3A.

David Rapetti has arranged a variety of speakers over the past year which will cost around £1100 by the end of this financial year. Speaker costs have risen as we would expect, but most have been well received and good value so many thanks to David.

During the year we have supported groups with requests for equipment from the Bridge Group, DVD box sets for the History Group, and the new Geography Group. The new Classical Music Group also received support and the Country Dancing group for room hire. These groups normally finance them selves but the Committee are always willing to help provide extra support for groups especially new group start-ups.

One of the ways you can help your U3A if you are a UK Tax Payer is to sign up to allow us to claim Gift Aid on your Membership fee. As we are a Charity this allows us to claim £3.25 on each £15 donation, as the Tax Office calls it. There are around 80 members who do this for us at the moment, but if you can help please pick up a form from the monthly meetings, or when you renew your membership next time.

The Raffles have done especially well this year with over £300 being raised to support our Christmas Party, presentations and Welfare.

Overall our U3A is running smoothly with the money in the accounts more or less the same as last year. We have a £3000 reserve in an account to deal with any unseen expenses, and to cope with equipment renewals as they arise. I am cautiously optimistic about our future.

BEACON ADMINISTRATION SYSTEM.

The Beacon system is an online system and is our way of keeping membership records, group records and financial accounts under one roof. The system is secure and updated at the end of each day and complies with the GDPR regulations to keep data safe and the risk of losing any information minimised.

The persons allowed to use the system are the officers, committee members and group leaders. Each person has password access and is allowed to use the system for what they require or are allowed to do. This can be customised for each individual.

The Beacon mass email system is a real success, as it allows all members to be contacted individually or all at once, with personalised messages. Group leaders can also email members in their own group and other group leaders. This has proved really useful. Personal information is updated when membership is paid and is logged in each personal membership record. These details are sent when renewal is requested and gives the opportunity to change or delete any personal information, i.e. address, email address, phone number and emergency contact details. This can be done at any time a change occurs if you contact us. The preferred way of contact is email with nearly 265 of our 295 membership having email addresses. Beacon is constantly being improved, with some bugs being sorted out, but with well over 280 U3A's using the system it is proving its worth.

However the running of the Beacon System has been taken over by the Third Age Trust who say the management costs have significantly exceeded income this year. This is due to the costs of the specialist software company in addressing bugs and enhancements and the employment of a staff member to alleviate the workload on the lead volunteers. This means of course that our costs will rise in April to £1 per head, for each of our current members. This is still very reasonable I think and our committee agrees.

The Third Age Trust have also appointed an external consultant to advise on "Beacon - the way forward" who has advised them that to provide functions which U3As will increasingly request, the cost of continuing with our system would not be without unacceptable significant cost.

Therefore the Trust plan to replace Beacon with "Beacon 2". Against this background, the The Third Age Trust Board took the decision to replace Beacon with a commercially sourced "Beacon 2" which will provide everything we have now ,plus additional functionality. They are forming a Working Group this January to advise the Trust on implementation of the new Beacon 2, and the transferring of data to Beacon 2. all to be done by October 2020. There will be a lot more to come on this story I think!!

If you would be interested in knowing more about our Beacon Administration System, please contact me and I will be pleased to show you around it, with a view that you might wish to be involved more with how our committee functions.
