TREASURERS REPORT

Who could have guessed what was to befall us at the start of 2020 and how it would effect our u3a. Despite the Covid virus and the F.E. Centre asking us to leave so they could refurbished the centre, almost 300 of you still joined us as members, but it still turned out to be a disastrous year for March u3a when hardly any activities were able to operate.

Because of this the committee decided that all who had paid for that year should have a free membership for this year. Not that this year has looked much better. The Third Age Trust of course were still are keen to have the capitation payment of £3.50 per member, and the administration system costs us a £1 per head even though we have all been locked down.

Because of the lack of membership fee's for this year, we will using our reserve money to get us though this year ,and we should be OK, to pay for room hires. and speakers up until the next membership year with careful management, and perhaps now we will be able to get things started up again. Fingers crossed!

As I previously said we had to leave the Community Centre as it was to be refurbished and nearly all our equipment had to be removed whilst this went on. We were allowed to continue to store certain larger items belonging to two of our groups in the centre. and they said they would take care of them. However certain items have gone missing. This will have to be resolved.

As for Main meetings we had pretty much outgrown the Community Centre so we will be using the Braza Club which is much bigger and costs are very similar. The Community Centre is finally to reopen in September and we will, we are told, be sent forms to apply for room hire with a risk assessment attached. We hope our two groups will be accepted back, but we as yet have know any idea of cost. We do now have Speakers Booked from September onwards, at the Braza club, and we hope it will be possible to start running our March u3a monthly meetings again.

There is of course with price's rising for room hires and Speakers the probability that our membership fee may have to increase for next year. You will be asked at the AGM in October to vote on this as required. If you have any questions about our financial postion, i will be pleased to answer these if possible.

All three Walking groups are currently meeting, despite one of their leaders being stuck in New Zealand as Covid 19 arrived and affected flights back home.

I will say a big thankyou to group leaders and assure all members that March u3a is continuing its efforts to have groups meeting again, perhaps not quite as before, but somehow in the new "normal".

THEATRE GOERS GROUP

By the time Covid-19 hit us and the first Lockdown occurred in March 2020 we had already booked and paid for 6 shows and provisionally booked for another, taking us up to October. Throughout the year there would have been a few others added. But it was not to be. When Lockdown was set in motion I was still recovering from a bad bout of pneumonia but was able to continue with the administration of the Group from home.

Shows booked for 2020, paid for and refunded during 2020/21:

The Sound of Music - Milton Keynes - 18th March (the day after theatres closed!)
Mama Mia - Nottingham - March*
We Will Rock You - Northampton - May*
Everybody's Talking About Jamie - Norwich - June*
Footloose - Milton Keynes - July*

Those shows marked with an * were rescheduled - sometimes more than once - but took us into 2022 so the choice of a refund was taken on the belief that we could always re-book at a later date if that was what members wanted.

Show pre-booked but not paid for when Lockdown occurred:

Strictly Ballroom - Milton Keynes - October

Show booked 2020, paid for, rescheduled and attended in 2021:

Priscilla Queen of the Desert - Northampton Royal & Derngate Theatre - 4th August 2021

As with all Shows that were rescheduled an email was sent to booked attendees to ask if they wanted me to Cancel (and be refunded) or Reschedule. There was no third choice with any theatres so the democratic 'majority' was the deciding factor. Those who decided after we had rescheduled from 2020 to August 2021 that they were not ready to attend an event in a closed space just yet, or had elected to go on holiday or have family visiting were made aware that they would not be refunded the £26 ticket cost for the one Show that was attended. Everyone who contacted me was understanding about this as it was a theatre ruling rather than a March U3A ruling.

Refunds paid for Cancelled Shows:

Once the decision had been made to ask for the Refund Option and the money was returned to my bank account, an email was sent to those affected asking them to either contact me to collect their cheque from my home or send me a stamped addressed envelope so I could post it to them. A spreadsheet was created with the Show details which included payment made/payment outstanding columns; and each time another Show got cancelled the spreadsheet was updated accordingly - in total 63 Group Members were accounted for and almost £4,000 refunded by me. The remaining responsibility for payment of refunds was handed over to the March U3A Committee in March 2021 with the residue of money transferred to the U3A Bank Account via a cheque as requested plus the spreadsheet showing exactly who had been paid what and the remaining persons who hadn't requested their money as of that date.

Transport paid for Cancelled Shows:

Fortunately the transport cost was never paid until a few weeks before attendance so the majority of

cancelled shows did not apply. As local coach companies are family owned in the main the decision was made to accept a Credit Note instead of insisting on a refund. All Members involved in the couple of shows where payment had been made did not object to this choice: it would have been counterproductive to cause our only means of getting to the theatres to become bankrupt!

With prices rising and a larger than needed coach being requested as a comfort factor when we attended the theatre in Northampton, our credit has now been used.

Financial Update of the Group:

The Group has always been run on the basis that once a year during March members will pay a £2 annual subscription which helps to cover the costs of telephone calls, stationery equipment etc. As we have such a large Group this fee has remained unchanged since 2012. I wasn't well enough to attend the March 2020 U3A monthly meeting and then we went into Lockdown. This has resulted in less than 50% of members paying the 2020 Subscription Fee but I have had theatres and transport companies to contact, many emails to send and spreadsheets to print out, as well as members not on email to telephone over a twelve month period which has ensured that the small pot of Fees that I had has been depleted.

The Future of the Theatre Goers Group:

Lockdown is now over (hopefully) and the unprecedented need to cancel and refund is thankfully now a thing of the past. Having run the Group single-handedly since 2012 - and seen it grow into the largest March U3A Group with Shows as far afield as London and as close as Kings Lynn - I have decided the time is ripe for somebody else to pick up the baton. I would be prepared to assist a new Group Leader in any way I can for a mutually agreed specified time and will make available all the contacts made and full information that has helped to ensure it can be run by a single person. Although a couple would probably be better!

I wish to thank all those Members who helped make the TheatreGoers Group such a successful and happy Group. You have all enriched my life and I have enjoyed seeing some wonderful shows and eating some great lunches with you. Hopefully the Group will continue to exist and flourish because I for one would still like to join you for a fantastic day out.

WRITING SUPPORT GROUP

The function of the group is to encourage and support all those who want to write. The group had its first meeting in October 2019 it had ten members, the plan was to meet monthly on the fourth Thursday. Not all members were able to come to that first meeting but there was enthusiasm, variety plus a great deal of support and encouragement for each other. And that is the group's aim. Writing whether fact or fiction often needs encouragement, even acclaimed and well-known writers often say that. But more importantly writing is satisfying to do it stimulates imagination and perhaps helps to avoid mental decline. The second meeting in November went well, each member was fully engaged and everyone had something to contribute. We agreed not to meet in December - the day of our meeting would have been boxing day - but looked forward to next our meeting in January 2020. That too was successful demonstrating considerable promise for what we hoped was to come.

Of course, what was to come was the coronavirus with the result that our February meeting was to be the last before lockdown in March 2020. I kept in touch with members via email but not everyone wanted to

use email and by implication Zoom or other platforms. It also became clear that some members no longer wanted involvement, even at arm's length, outside of their homes. Most people were fearful but in any event the shielding order meant that without using online protocols there was no way forward.

As 2020 progressed and restrictions yoyoed somewhat, the five remaining members- that includes myself - met socially distanced, in my garden. The weather of course couldn't be guaranteed which meant that our meetings were somewhat random. I would check the forecast and email members accordingly. And those meetings were successful not just from the point of view of what people achieved with their writing, one of our number completed the first draft of a novel, but also the level of encouragement we gave each other. We managed to maintain those meetings until October 2020.

Garden meetings couldn't continue through the winter months of course but in any event the situation changed with another total lockdown. When restrictions began easing in March of this year, I suggested we resume our meetings in April, but at that time members were caught up in events in their own lives and the group meetings were on hold to an extent, but three of us met recently on 24th June. Now it seems certain there will be further lifting of restrictions the future looks promising. It may be that members of
