To finish, her husband, Alan Hooker's rendition of a version of the Kipling epic, Gunga Din, brought this collaboration to an end.

The finale was, possibly, the most interesting take on the Cinderella pantomime story yet. Presented with real meaning, facial expressions, gesticulations

and a fascinating range of stage props, the ladies who delivered 'Cinder Alfred & The Furry Boot' were a revelation. Ably led by Marilyn Short with her 'partners in panto' Jane Mann, Moira Mason, Pam Butler, Doreen Allard, and Olive Smith, they ran, or rather, sat amok amongst a gloriously inventive script with fascinating role changes and switching of headgear.

A very talented young pianist played for us, **Shutian Cheng**, who was born in Beijing and began studying the piano aged 4, giving his first performance aged 7. He played:

Haydn Sonata in E minor

Bach Prelude and Fugue in F# minor

Chopin Barcarolle

Shutian Cheng was invited to give a performance of Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 3 at the St John Smith Square in November 2022. He was awarded Second Prize at Rickmansworth Young Musician in 2023, First Prize in his age category at the Windsor International Competition in 2022 and was the youngest finalist in the 18-and-under category at the 8th James Waterhouse Piano Competition in 2018. He also received three First Prizes at the Chelmsford Music Festival in 2017.

The second part of our programme was called:

Haydn the Humourist – exploring the wit and playfulness in the music of Joseph Haydn.

What makes music humorous? Haydn became the first composer to incorporate humour in his music. A relatively slow starter, Haydn nevertheless became the most popular composer of his day, despite spending much of his life hidden away in a remote Hungarian Palace as music director to the court of Esterhazy. This was all explained by John.

December

A MAGnificent Christmas programme.

We started with a festive film – a Disney-style overture, excerpts from the Nutcracker and Harold Lloyd and Charlie Chaplin. All accompanied by John on the piano.

This was followed by Joanna Lumley reciting "The night before Christmas" with music specially adapted by John in 2020 and played by the Philharmonia orchestra.

We managed to fit in a quiz based around Xmas carols and famous hit Xmas songs and some festive refreshments.

SCRAMBLE

We all flew Spitfires – Paul and Roger and Harry and me – running around the playground with arms extended. Of course, we'd heard of the modern jets, the Hawker Hunter and the Submarine Swift (we couldn't pronounce *Supermarine*), but in our comic books the panicked scream of the enemy airman was always, 'Achtung Spitfeuer.'



Back then, I read a lot of books by Capt. W E Johns. I followed Biggles from his beginnings in a Sopwith Pup, through World War 1 and his exploits between the wars. When it came to the Battle of Britain, the book title was 'Spitfire Parade'. And you can guess what kind of plane I piloted at home, sitting in a wooden box, wearing an old leather motorcycling helmet, with the handle from a broken umbrella as a joystick.

The Hawker Hurricane was also a magnificent fighter, easier to manufacture and appearing in greater numbers in the early days. The Wellington and the mighty Lancaster meted out payback for the horrors of the Blitz. And many lesser planes, the unsung heroes, provided transport for supplies and personnel. But they aren't the ones that we remember.

Even now, when the RAF Memorial Flight pass overhead on their way to an air show, the exhaust of that Rolls Royce Merlin engine is like nothing else on Earth. It's the sound that my parents heard, in the days when nineteen-year-olds fought off the invasion, in an aeroplane that R J Mitchell created, working on through his terminal illness. We stop, look up at the red, white and blue roundels on those unique wings, and wave our arms. And we smile.

I overheard a foreign visitor in the nineteen-sixties:

'Look, that car with the aeroplane engine.'

Nonsense, of course. The Triumph Spitfire had an ordinary four-cylinder push-rod engine, but the name had a magic that probably sold a lot of cars. The magic of a nation that, like their leader, would never surrender. The magic of pride, in a country that was worth fighting for.
