The Committee's role is not to run our u3a, but to act as a facilitator enabling members to organise activities for themselves. I would like to thank all members of the Committee for their support during my time as Chair, in particular those who have come to the end of their term, Lindsey and Karen, and also those who have put their names forward to replace them, namely Robert, Jane & Ted. Thank you also to Roger for agreeing to take on another 3 year term as Treasurer, to Stuart for stepping up as Chair and to Sue for agreeing to be Vice Chair. We could not function without other key members who support our organisation and I am grateful to Carole, our Membership Secretary and to Frank, our Beacon Administrator, for their continued support.

Thanks go to Janice for continuing to update our notice boards and slide show and to Stephen for taking over the management of our website. Stephen had a baptism of fire when he took on the role, as Sitebuilder, the national web provider crashed, leaving the majority of u3as across the country without a vital resource. However he calmly and efficiently repopulated our site with photos & documents from various sources. A group of dare devils went sky diving earlier in the year, some tried out the Zip Wire and others settled for the more sedate challenges such as Willow Weaving. No organisation remains static and change is inevitable. This year saw the end of an era for our Geology Group which has thrived for 10 years. Field trips have been organised across the north west, along with talks and presentations covering the earth's fascinating history. Our thanks go to Chris for her time and effort and also to all those who have contributed by sharing their knowledge. Our Line Dancing Group said goodbye to Neil, who has taught the group for the last 15 years, but this is not the end of the line thanks to Carole and several long standing members who have stepped in to keep the group going. The Family and Social History Group have been running since 2006, the inaugural year of our u3a, but have now decided to call it a day with their research, however there is an open invitation for members to attend meetings of the Family History Research Group whenever they wish to do so.

As one door closes, another opens and this year has seen the development of several new groups, including Politics - a friendly chat, where members can discuss current affairs. We also have a new Play Reading Group, we have reintroduced Tennis on our list of regular activities and following on from last Autumn's Origins of WW2 sessions, our History Group has just started. Earlier in the year we had two very successful sessions on the life and works of Jane Austen and one of our newest members has recently started running some Basic IT sessions. Thanks once again go to those members who put their time and effort into researching and presenting these sessions for the benefit of the rest of us.

We have continued to support several charities during the year. Last October saw the return of our Bling and Buy Sale raising money for Children in Need and the jewellery which was left was donated to Heart Research via Beaverbrooks the jewellers.We held another successful Macmillan Coffee Morning in September and have made several collections of food items & clothing for International Aid.
