More on the history of Leyland.

Last week's 'Where am I?' has sparked some discussion and thanks go to Janice for the information and photo below.



The photo is of the entrance to the Leyland Motors site on Golden Hill taken in the 1950s.


It is now the entrance to the retail park which includes Morrisons.

The contributor to last week's newsletter isn't wrong as the area was acquired in WW2 to use as a storage depot for the ministry of supplies and to set up a facility to make gas masks.

Some of the components for them were made by the Rubber Works and transferred across Wheelton Lane by a bridge.

After the war the facility was acquired by Butec which was part of Leyland Motors. They manufactured electric motors and alternators used in Leyland vehicles and then later a truck assembly plant was added on the same site.

The OS map below shows the site of the Golden Hill Rubber Works in 1893.

Otto von Bismarck -1815 - 1898.



During his long life Bismarck held a large number of political and state roles, Diplomat, General, Minister of State, Chief Minister and Chancellor.

His main political aim was the unification of Germany, which was finally achieved in 1871, after victory in the Franco-Prussian War.

Bismarck finally left office in 1890 after a number of disagreements with Kaiser Wilhelm.

AJP Taylor concludes his excellent book Bismarck, The Man & The Statesman, with the following assessment:

"At all events, Bismarck would be content that his name is still a symbol of policy and he himself a subject of controversy."
