They often go on to join other U3As around the country and sometimes we get to hear about their experiences elsewhere. Two people who left recently have sent comments and thoughts about U3A and have kindly allowed some of their thoughts to be published

Margaret Stevens was a founder member of MB&M U3A and was its first Chairman; she moved away some time ago but still continued to attend our meetings whenever she could. She said the following, 'One of the most important benefits of joining MB&M U3A was that lifelong friendships are formed and support offered when needed. Especially for those who have lost the company of loved ones. This to me is one of the most important benefits of joining Marple Bridge & Mellor U3A. Also the value of lifelong learning for its own sake and not dependent on qualifications or university degrees. I am very proud to have been a founder member and first Chairman of this very successful group.'

Some other thoughts were expressed by Chris Sims who moved to Milton Keynes and joined the U3A there. She said,' The difference here with the U3A is the way it's run. They have a talk or lecture once a month for everyone, the chairs are all in rows so when people arrive they just find a seat. Coffee is always served afterwards by which time most people have gone home and haven't bothered to stay. They never have tables for the groups at monthly meetings. You never sit next to the person you chatted to last time and sometimes never see them again. I was lucky that I knew a lot of people in Marple Bridge. My advice is - Don't move - despite children telling you they'd like you to be nearer!! To have them popping in and out more is nice but doesn't entirely compensate! '

We also received an interesting letter this month from Edwina Currie, who came to talk to us last month. Meet outside the Regent Cinema Marple at 10.30am

The Stroll - We cross the road via the pedestrian tunnel to Top Lock. We take the canal tow path towards New Mills, passing the marina, until we reach a stone bridge. Then over the stile onto the path to All Saints church. The first few yards of the path are a bit steep and rough under foot, but it then levels out and there are good views on a clear day. We proceed on the footpath, over another stile, through the church yard leading onto Church Lane. We continue our stroll up Church lane for about a quarter mile until we reach the footpath at the riding school (again there are lovely views here looking towards New Mills), then down the footpath, up the steps, over the bridge to the canal tow path on the other side which takes us back into Marple.

We recommend strong shoes

There are 2 lych-gate stiles to cross on the walk, which is approximately 2 miles. Afterwards join us for a drink and a natter in one of the cafes in Marple.

Meeting at Romiley Forum (post codeSK64EA) in the centre of Romiley, at 10.30am

The Stroll - We will wander down to High Peak canal then through the woods to Chadkirk Chapel (this could be muddy) and back along the canal into Romiley. This will be about 2miles with one short steep climb, obviously we will take this very slowly. If this is too much (can decide on the day) we can miss Chadkirk out altogether and stay on the canal towpath, distance about 1 and half miles.

Strong shoes recommended - could be muddy!
