Groups


Mythology

As we enter 2024 our group, which has now been running for 4 years plus, continues to explore Mythology from around the world. So far we have only covered Greek Mythology, which took 2 years. We then moved onto Norse which only took about a year and covered Odin, Thor for example. Next came the Egyptians which encompassed both human and animal gods. At the present time we have been looking at Arthurian myths and legends, covering Arthur, Lady of the Lake, The Sword in the Stone to name a few. We are researching the last two topics one of which is Gawain and the Green Knight. Our new topic, which will begin in April, has yet to be decided, but might be the Celts or Native Americans.

We have had one trip to the British Museum to look at Egyptian and Norse (Vikings) artefacts and hope to do so again in the near future.

The photographs below are of King Arthur (the middle of the window) which is in The Lady Chapel, Rochester Cathedral.





Most of our material is taken from various sources including writings from Mallory, YouTube Videos and use of National Geographic DVDs – this was looking at the Greeks which is rich in sources material.

We have a group of 7 members and others who have dropped in and out. So if anyone wishes to join us in Rochester Library on the 3rd Wednesday at 2.00pm please do - as mentioned, we have a new topic starting in April which is a good time to join. You don't have to be an expert; we have varying degrees of knowledge and we all seem to enjoy it. It is also very useful for quiz questions provided you retain the information!
