Visit to Llanerchaeron House - The Annual August Meeting 'Away-Day'

On Wednesday 1st August twenty one of us ventured to the Llanerchaeron National Trust Property on a bright warm day, it was good to see the house so busy.

We were divided into two groups. The house tour focused on remembering the ladies of the house. We started in the service courtyard, exploring the laundry, brewery, bakery and servants quarters, hearing about the ladies working there, including the long service housekeeper of 40 years, who was originally from Edinburgh, apparently it was a deliberate policy to employ an outsider. Although she had responsibility for running the house she was only paid half the wages of the Butler.

We were told about Mary Lewis whose husband died after 14 years of marriage, although the house was willed to his sister, Mary was allowed to stay for the rest of her life. She lived for a further 62 years before the inheritance could be claimed. She was a very caring employer, allowing time off and providing housing for them.

It was another lady Miss Pamela Ward (her collection of antiques displayed in the house) whose legacy enabled the National Trust to take over the house and so save the house from decay and demolition.

The Garden tour was equally fascinating, indicating how self sufficient the house was and the use of glass and heat to spread the seasons. All excess is sold at the gate. We were told and shown the large range of fruit especially apples - there were 50+ varieties of apples and not forgetting the oddity of the apple trees with 2 trunks. Our day finished with us communing with a litter of piglets in the farmyard.

Many of us had been to Llanerchaeron before and saw and heard a different aspect of the house and its history. My sadness of the house was how few children had lived there.
