ASTRONOMY

The Cardigan and Newcastle Emlyn joint u3a Astronomy group met on March 15th, i.e. the regular 3rd Wednesday afternoon of the month – and, as usual, we had a look at which planets and stars are easily visible in the coming weeks. Venus and Jupiter have been very prominent after dusk for some time, and have been getting closer to each other. On March 1st and 2nd, they were about the width of a full-Moon apart and changed places, with Jupiter, having been higher in the sky hitherto, moving progressively lower.





We had a look at a number of web photos for this event – and the two here are from India, where the observer photographed the two planets getting closer every day for 10 days (20 Feb to 1 Mar), and from the Czech Republic on 1 March.

As we approach the end of March and later sunsets, Jupiter will probably have moved too low in the west to be seen at dusk – so only Venus will remain as a really bright "star" in the west, until it too sets at about 8pm GMT (9pm BST).

We spent much of the time talking about aurora, as they had been seen at lower latitudes than usual on Feb 26th and 27th- and this first pic is from the Brecon Beacons.





We learnt that aurora are formed when very energetic electrically-charged particles in the Solar Wind (principally negatively-charged electrons and positively-charge hydrogen ions) are drawn down the Earth's magnetic field lines towards the magnetic poles (which are close to the geographic North and South poles). In the upper atmosphere, when these plasma particles reach 250km above the Earth's surface (and down to around 80km above), they collide with oxygen and nitrogen molecules and – if the energies of the particles are in the right range, not too low or too high – they energise electrons in the oxygen or nitrogen molecules. These molecules then lose that energy by emitting light photons of the colours we see (a bit like fluorescent lights do).

The density of our atmosphere decreases with altitude and this affects the colours in the aurorae – as shown in the second picture. At the highest altitude (200-250km) we usually get red emissions and these come from oxygen – but further down at 150km the oxygen emission is green – the most common aurora colour seen. Down at 100km, nitrogen is the main player and its colours are blue, violet and pink.

Unfortunately (maybe fortunately as they can be associated with havoc amongst our electrical systems(?)), we don't get aurorae every time electrically-charged plasma are magnetically drawn down to Earth at the Poles. This actually happens to some extent with our Solar Wind for much of the time - but it generally takes much denser and faster-moving, more energetic flows of plasma from the Sun to give us extensive visual aurorae or ones which extend beyond the arctic regions.

Fantastic aurorae usually follow enormous ejections from the Sun of hydrogen plasma in the direction of Earth, typically billions of tonnes travelling at a million miles per hour – as shown in the graphic. (This is what happened 2 days before the Feb 26th aurora.) Being electrically-charged particles, their flow generates its own magnetic field and when that reaches the Earth's magnetic field, the field lines of the two magnetic fields interact. Some of Earth's field lines are broken and they reconnect with the magnetic field lines of the Solar Wind – which allows (and accelerates) more plasma particles into the atmosphere above our Poles, and a bigger chance of creating extensive aurorae. When it does, we get displays like this one seen from the International Space Station.



These Coronal Mass Ejections from the Sun are not predictable, but they are more likely to occur when there are more visible sunspots on the Sun's surface – and this number tends to rise and fall over a 11-year cycle. The next maximum for sunspots should be in 2025, so we could be in for a period of more frequent aurorae – like this one over Loch Glascarnoch in the middle of the Highlands, or the next one further north at Durness on Scotland's North coast.

DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY

The aim for March's homework was 'using your camera in the manual setting' with any choice of subject. Once again, we had a brilliant session, lots of discussion about using the cameras in 'manual mode' and it was very pleasing to hear that lessons have been learnt and 'manual mode' will be used more often.

Tutorials are shown in group each month to assist everyone with the homework set. The homework for April is 'attention to detail' with any choice of subject. The group were asked to consider; the positioning of the primary subject; ensuring the camera is straight, both side-to-side and front-to-back; staging the photo and moving clutter, trailing cables or removing unnecessary items the shot; grouping items in 3's; filling the frame with colour; using just 2 colours; using a plain background; using patterns, circles, stripes or diagonals; using texture; etc.

FRENCH


