ASTRONOMY

The Cardigan and Newcastle Emlyn joint u3a Astronomy group met as usual on the 3rd Wednesday afternoon of the month, May 17th in this case. We went over what is easily visible in the sky at the moment – and it is Venus, of course, which is still far and away the brightest object apart from the Moon, and it continues to dominate the western sky for a couple of hours after sunset.

We continued with a light-hearted quiz about our galaxy, the Milky Way – held together by a super-massive black hole at its centre that has mass and gravitational pull 4 million times that of our Sun. We were also tested on our knowledge of a number of easily-seen constellations such as Ursa Major (The Plough), Cassiopeia and Orion



Strictly, we should call these recognisable patterns of stars (the 7 stars of The Plough and Orion, and the "W" of Cassiopeia) asterisms, as they are not the whole of their constellations or sometimes not even just from one single constellation.

We also had a look at a report that new spaceports for launching satellites into orbit were being built in northern Scotland. Who knew? Anyway, mindful of the most recent glorious British space failure, Richard Branson's attempt to launch satellites from the jumbo jet that is based at his Cornish spaceport, we wondered how the Brits might get on in Sutherland county this time.

It turns out that the Orbex company is currently making 19m-long rockets capable of lifting 180kg satellites into low-Earth orbit at its HQ near Inverness (shown below) and has started to build a launch site on the North coast of Scotland, on land (at the blue marker) leased from the local crofter cooperative. The site has no land north of it so it is ideal for launching rockets with satellites that are to orbit over the Poles (rather than along the more common routes around the Equator). The rockets are Bio-propane-propelled and are reusable so all operations are aiming to be minimally CO2-

producing.



The company has raised most of its capital privately but has had financial support of about £30M from various UK and Scottish government agencies — including around £3M from the Nuclear Decommissioning Agency which is responsible for cleaning up the nearby closed Dounreay Fast-Breeder site now that we don't need any more fissile plutonium for our defence capability. Dounreay was (still is?) the major employer in the area and Sutherland Spaceport will provide some alternative employment opportunities.

Orbex have orders for launches in 2024, and in 2018 the original plans included for

Lockheed-Martin also to launch rockets from the Sutherland site. However they pulled out in 2020 and are building their own Space Centre on the north coast of Unst, the most northerly populated island in Shetland. Again there is no problem with people under the launch path. Their's looks a slightly bigger operation than the Orbex one, with permission for 30 launches



per year (vs 12 for Sutherland) – but their more conventional kerosine-powered one-trip rockets are perhaps less environmentally friendly – and they also have orders for launches in 2024. We await next year with great interest.



If anyone else wants to join our merry band please let me know, we meet 2nd Thursday of the month at 11am in Rhydlewis Hall.



DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY

This months walk took the group somewhat further afield with a visit to the Hafod Estate up near Devils Bridge. The trip was made somewhat longer by a combination of closed roads and modern technology failure ie sat nav.

Eventually a group of 10 people arrived safely at the car park and we initally went to explore St Michael Church next to the car park. We were welcomed by piped music and a choir when we entered the church which continued throughout the very interesting visit. The church itself originated with the estate in the 17thC and was restored and remodelled at the end of the 18thC.





The church was badly damaged by a fire in 1932 with various original items destroyed or in need of major restoration including a 3000 year old vase which originated from the Mediterranean region but has now been reassembled. Having spent a little time looking at the variety of items in the church including a wonderful model of the estate mansion that sadly no longer exsists the group set off on the walk along what is called the Ladys Walk.

The estate comprises a number of walks ranging in distance and difficulties. The walks were all created by the original owner Thomas Johnes in the 18th century so that the family and guests could enjoy the wonderful landscapes. Our walk took us past waterfalls and along by the river Ystwyth culminating in a wonderful vista of the Ystwyth Valley.

Though the walk in parts was quite challenging we all

managed to get round and back to our cars in one piece. We then

adjourned to the Two hoots cafe in Devils Bridge for some light refreshments and were fortunate to witness the arrival of the steam train from Aberystwyth

Groups Reports

June 2023

THEOLOGY

Turning detective, our theological hitch-hikers explored the biggest mystery of all: what on earth (literally) happened on that first Easter Day?

Rising from the dead turned out to be a less than unique occurrence amongst gods of various cultures and in ancient times, with their periodic visits to and returns from the underworld often explaining why we experience the famine of winter followed by the fruitful rejoicing of spring and summer. Our word 'Easter', after all, derives from the Anglo-Saxon goddess of life Oestre (also responsible for naming the fertility hormone oestrogen, as well as the East of the sunrise, via Old High German) - raising the question as to what our Christian forebears called the festival before the Anglo-Saxons invaded. (Pasg, probably: that pesky invasion is what drove the noble Celtic languages into the corners.) But back to the plot, and the double locked-room mystery. How did Jesus get out of the tomb, and how did he get into the locked room where his frightened disciples were holed up afterwards? All the Gospels, including those that didn't make the final cut of the New Testament, describe in varying degrees of detail the security arrangements outside the tomb - guards posted by the Romans, seals verified by the Jewish authorities – to make absolutely sure his disciples didn't sneak along and remove the body, especially on that crucial third night. The Apocryphal Gospel of Philip even details the evidence-tent they put over the sealed entrance, just in case – and names Centurion Petronius as the man in charge, and the originator of John Wayne's famous line in the film: "Truly, this man was the Son of God!"

After his Resurrection, how does Jesus, without a key, effect entry into the secure Upper Room, then pop up to meet his surprised disciples in various unexpected places? There was definitely something different about Jesus in those days.

Dan Brown didn't invent the conspiracy theories that attempt to explain Christianity's central mystery. Did Jesus escape before the crucifixion, or revive afterwards, elope with Mary Magdalen and live happily ever after in Provence? Did his sorrowing disciples visit the wrong tomb on Easter morning? Did they steal the body after all? (That account of the Romans' bribe to the guards to say so rather explodes that idea.) Was the appearance of Jesus a foretaste of the End of Time, or a moment when the quantum theory that all times exist at once becomes a reality? And is it heresy to suggest that the disciples may not have regarded Jesus as truly divine until after his Resurrection? Other questions discussed by the Hitch-hikers included wondering which day was Jesus' actual Last Supper? (Passover lasts for eight days, and the Seder meal could have been on any one of them.) How did his disciples manage to give Jesus a proper burial, when crucified criminals were normally left to rot where they hung or dumped in the tip? (Though famous for his association with lowlife, Jesus also had rich and influential friends, like Joseph of Arimathea.) And do bunnies and chocolate have anything to do with it after all? (The Easter Bunny, it seems, was invented in the 17th Century as an alternative to Papist celebrations. In other countries it's foxes or cuckoos who hide those ubiquitous symbols of new life, the Easter Eggs.)

Whatever the theory, it's clear something dramatic happened to convince the disciples that Jesus was seriously special, and that it was worth putting their own lives on the line for it. There's something about forgiveness, love bouncing back, and the conviction that however horrible things are, God doesn't go away. Which is worth celebrating, whether or not you believe in the Easter Bunny. Next time, on June 5th at 2pm in Ffostrasol Village Hall, there will be a special guest appearance from Gwyn Wardman (well-known to the Philosophy Group) who will talk to us about the Society of Friends – aka the Quakers.

There were 4 whites and 2 reds and all of the wines scored well with only 3 1/2 points between the top and bottom ratings. The favourite was an M and S wine from the Côte de Beaune called Albert Bichot 2018.

Next month we will be enjoying our annual summer barbecue at Trevor and Angela's on Thursday 15th June starting at 5pm. Then in July Julia and Brian will host us for our final French region, Champagne!
