ASTRONOMY

At the July meeting of the Cardigan and Newcastle Emlyn joint u3a Astronomy group, Jon Gall gave a talk on star-parties. These take place at a number of dark-sky locations in the UK; in Scotland, Kielder Forest, the Brecon Beacon and other places but, as a frequent attendee over the years, the one Jon is most familiar with is at Kelling Heath near Sheringham in North Norfolk - so this was the main source for his presentation.



The Kelling Heath star-parties are at the camping site of the same name, run for a whole week and are probably the largest star-parties in Britain with 400-500 dedicated attendees (who are, probably no surprise, overwhelmingly male). Everyone shares their telescopes and their star-

gazing experience with each other - so the week is as much about being sociable

and making like-minded friends as spending hours peering through your own telescope in the dark. But, of course, as Jon showed us, some amazing pictures of star clusters, galaxies, nebulae, etc, do emerge and are shared around enthusiastically.

visible in the East for a short period before sunrise.

We also updated ourselves on the current positions of our brightest planets and stars. Venus has been brilliant in the evening sky after dusk for many weeks - but not any longer. Venus is about to pass between Earth and the Sun ("inferior conjunction", when it is absolutely in line, is Aug 13th) so we will not easily see it again until early September – when it will be

Mars is also close in angle to the Sun (and well away on the far side) so it is also pretty invisible — and will remain so for some months. So that leaves us with Jupiter and Saturn as the planets to see — and both are progressing from being "morning stars, visible only just before sunrise, to being among the brightest objects visible at bedtime or soon after.

Jupiter is currently rising in the East at about 1am, and is the brightest object in the sky (Moon excepted) from then until sunrise when it is about 30 degrees above the SE horizon. Saturn currently rises in the SE at about 11.30pm and progresses across the sky so that it is well past South (and also at about 30 degrees altitude) when the Sun comes up. Though not as bright as Jupiter, Saturn is as bright as most of the brightest stars that we can currently see, so after midnight it is fairly easy to spot — and both planets will become visible earlier in the evening and easier to see as we move into autumn.

We also noted that we are approaching the Perseid meteor shower

season. The peak frequency (20+ per hour) for these shooting stars will be on Aug 12/13th, probably best seen just after midnight when the Perseus constellation (from where they appear to originate) is higher in the sky. On this date, the Earth runs into the maximum dust debris left near the orbit of comet Swift-Tuttle, and our gravity accelerates



the dust grains into the atmosphere where they heat up and burn up as meteors/shooting stars. These meteor showers are amongst the most reliable and easiest to see – so, if it is a nice night and clear and dark, get your sun-lounger out between Aug 10th and 15th and look up at the sky almost anywhere above 60 degrees but particularly towards the 5-star W of Cassiopeia (which is near Perseus but easier to find).

The sky cleared up pretty well yesterday afternoon and evening - but not over the rising ground from the sea at Newport to the West end of the Preselis, which is where the sighting of the Moon and Venus would be. Low clouds blanketed that smallish area, both before sundown and then after. No problem seeing higher up in the sky, the Winter Triangle, reddish Arcturus and even more orangy-red Antares in the southerly or south-westerly parts of the sky after dusk - but no Moon or Venus down low in the cloud. I will try again tonight at sundown - but it will probably be the last time as Venus is getting less visible as it moves more in line with the Sun and it is going down below the horizon sooner. Also the Moon is getting bigger and moving further yaway from Venus!

BOOK CLUB

Our book for July was Black Dogs, by Ian McEwan. Ian McEwan is a well-known current British author, who won the 1998 Booker prize with Amsterdam and has been nominated on another five occasions.


Black Dogs, published in 1992, concerns the aftermath of the Nazi era in Europe, and how the fall of the Berlin Wall in the late 1980s affected those who once saw Communism as a way forward.

It is a fictional memoir, told by the son-in-law Jeremy, of June and Bernard Tremaine, a couple who are in love, but who have lived apart, ever since the pivotal events of their honeymoon in France, just after the second world war. After a terrifying

encounter with two black dogs, June converted to believe in God and turned away from her communist ideals, causing the rift with Bernard.



The book provoked an enjoyable, wide ranging discussion. None of us thought it was an easy book to read. Almost all of us felt that it was worth the effort. We enjoyed the writing style and the author's observations. Our debate centred around the differences between fact-based and spiritually based lives, the aftermath of war, the ideals of communism and the motives of the fictional memoir writer.

Because of the quantity needed, I had cut these beforehand. These were then ironed onto fabric strips taken from jelly rolls so everyone ended up with 20 narrow, folded strips of fabric. We will use these at August's meeting to weave our baskets. For those who don't do patchwork, a jelly roll is a set of 40 – 44 2½" wide strips of coordinating fabric which are rolled together for selling. 4 of these baskets can be made from 1 jelly.


