

Hi Mo,

I am so terribly sorry to hear the news about John. He was a wonderful man, so generous with his time and with his views, too. He seemed to mine all those years of experience and use his razor-sharp mind to cut directly to the real problem at hand; an architects training, perhaps.

I met him only relatively recently when you introduced us so that I could find out more about the TAT and the u3a movement. I found immediately a common

view, one that gave me hope that there were still long-term members and, in myself, new members who share a common purpose and wish to keep the original integrity of the movement alive. And, of course, I came to appreciate his cynicism in the face of aimless and ambitious plans to change the TAT into a commercial organisation with only the limited support of its u3a members.

He was never afraid to speak his mind in that considered and deliberate manner of his. And buried in that slow delivery was so often a large dose of truth and reality.

I was with him at the University event the previous Tuesday where he, like me, sat through over 50 short scientific presentations, and, unlike me who barely raised my hand, asked many interesting questions of the speakers afterwards. He was engaged, alert and interested throughout when others, much more junior in years, were flagging.

I liked John a great deal and will miss him. The best of men.

u3a Week

On Saturday, 23rd September, members of Seaham Harbour u3a played their part in the national u3a week.



They were given permission to have a Seaham's stall in Place Byron shopping centre between 10am and 3pm to promote the u3a. Strangely, management said the members couldn't speak visitors but had to wait to he approached.

Publicity material had been purchased from the Trust which visitors were encouraged to look at or take away and their questions were answered. It was quite surprising how many people had never heard of the u3a and most were keen to know more. Time will tell whether or not we get any new members from the day.

Nevertheless, those who manned the stall felt it had been a worthwhile exercise.

In addition to that The Trustees had previously decided to try and do something about a problem in Seaham and which is not uncommon elsewhere. That is, the lack of public toilets.

Seaham is increasingly popular with visitors, especially along the sea front, and there are plenty cafes and bars. However, from Seaham Hall car park in the north to Nose's Point in the south there are no public toilet facilities.

So, along with our stall and u3a promotional material we had a petition to be sent to Durham County Council about the lack of toilets. People were enthusiastically signing it, including people who were not Seaham residents. That day we got 355 signatures and since then the number has reached almost 500. We intend to continue with the petition for the next couple of weeks.

Pomanders for Christmas

They are a lovely way to scent a room and make good decorations.

You need: -

1 Orange

Good quality cloves, with heads intact


Ground Cinnamon

Orris Root (Iris Germanica)

Stick the orange full of cloves but leaving space between each once as the orange will shrink as it dries. Use a fine knitting needle to make the holes.

Mix the orris root and cinnamon and roll the finished pomander in the mixture rubbing it well in. Place in a warm dry place for two weeks then tie with ribbon or raffia and hang up.

Regional Event to Ad Gefrin, Wooler



Ad Gefrin, the new whisky distillery in Wooler was opened in March 2023. Members from Cramlington, Gateshead, Wooler, Washington and Whickham u3as enjoyed an excellent tour of the distillery. Isla, our guide explained about the many different processes in order to make a malt whisky. The malting barley is grown by farmers in the fields around Wooler and the water comes from the Cheviot Hills. Ad Gefrin has only been producing whisky for the past nine months and it takes three

years for a whisky to be called a single malt. A gin distillery has also been created on the site.

A reconstruction of the Great Hall of the kings and queens of Northumbria at the Great Palace of Ad Gefrin has been created. There's also a museum demonstrating the Golden Age of Northumbria. There are objects on display from the British Museum and the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust.

Of course, at the end there was a tasting session of the whisky and gin. Lots of positive comments about the tour—well worth a visit.

Who knew it was there?

Morpeth had a well-kept secret hidden from us - until recently, when seven members from Newcastle u3a Poetry Group visited the little gem of the Northern Poetry Library run by Northumbria Library Services, housed since 2016 in the delightful Grade 1 listed 13th century building of the Chantry (of Bagpipe Museum fame), within the Tourist Information Centre on Bridge Street, where we were made most welcome.

This specialised collection of post Second World War poetry is the largest outside London and celebrated its fiftieth anniversary in 1993 with a North-East poetry festival featuring (two then yet to be, poet laureates), Carol Ann Duffy and Simon Armitage.

Julie, a self-confessed poetry lover, came from Northumbria Library to introduce us to the collection and told how she had been part of the team wearing heavy protective clothing to salvage works damaged, although sadly much was beyond saving, in the devastating Morpeth floods in September 2008.

This library had come into being with the efforts of George Stephenson, Director of Mid-Northumberland Art Group and George Laughton, County Librarian of Northumberland in 1968 with the aim of containing a copy of every volume of contemporary poetry published in Great Britain then and in subsequent years. Their vision was for the library to be a free, open access public library through a free direct lending service. Magazines and journals were acquired, many of which would have escaped the acquisition methods of other libraries.

"The strengths of the collection are in its small press collections, especially those of writers who have gone on to national renown, its children's collections, often overlooked and its anthologies which are attractive to new readers. Its collections of the seventies and eighties now represent an important archive to researchers"

From September 2015 to March 2017, the Northern Poetry Library was redeveloped, and events organised to raise its profile as it was little known and underused by professional poets and the community in general. It now holds

over 15,000 volumes including signed copies, first editions and foreign publications.

The librarians can offer a service to help with choosing suitable poetry for specific events such as for a wedding, christening or funeral.

The library is open from Monday to Saturday so please do give it a visit!
