Chair's Report

Regional Committee Members and Regional Support Volunteers (originally called Trust Volunteers) have joined forces and are working together to visit as many u3as and Networks as possible. The first Regional Support joint meeting was held early January. Workshops, Shared Learning Projects, Study Events and much more were discussed.

The Lindisfarne Gospels: 20c impressions of an ancient artefact.


Many of you may have been to the Lindisfarne exhibition at the Laing or intend to visit. I went with a Newcastle u3a group. In this exhibition review, I wish to acknowledge the hard work and dedication that created this beautiful, intricate book.

The exhibition spanned three rooms. The first room was video animation, covering two vast walls. With commentary, it placed the gospels historically and geographically. The second room had real stone crosses from around this area that are of a similar period to the Gospels. This room also had the Gospels themselves. The borders of each page were intricate and colourful. The dyes used came from the Mediterranean, the middle east, as well as Britain. There were local flowers, plants, insects, birds, and animals depicted. These reminded me of the strong connection pagans had to nature and us today, as we appreciate and treasure our natural environment. The third room contained artwork from more recent centuries. They depicted the spiritual side of life as experienced by various artists of all world religions. Like the Gospels, the works translated the universal, invisible aspects of the spiritual dimensions of life into visual form.

The exhibition was well worth a visit. It can be appreciated as a welcome respite from the mundane, into, gentler, ethereal dimensions. If you went on a weekday morning or evening it costs no more than another great gift of life, a sticky bun and a coffee!

It was one of 27 branches of the Prudential Assurance Company, all of which were designed by prolific 19th century architect Alfred Waterhouse. Alfred Waterhouse



also designed the Natural History Museum in London and many other government, educational and commercial buildings, across the UK.

Painting with Light

It is said that early photographers were no more than failed artists. This fact I am not entirely sure about but one thing I am positive about is that the most important and fundamental element in both art forms is light.



Even the word photography tells us this as it is formed by joining the two Greek words for light and drawing. Just as painters brush paint onto canvas photographers paint an image by capturing light particles (photons) on to a light sensitive medium (film or digital sensor). Without light not a single picture could ever be taken.



An eye for light and perfectly handled work with natural and artificial light sources are the key prerequisites for a good photograph. The correct lighting will lift a dull photograph up out of the average, while a badly lit photograph no matter how beautiful will never impress.



A landscape photographer will visit a site on multiple occasions until the light he requires is correct at the scene. The best light is said to be during the "Golden Hours" which are 1 hour before sunrise and 1 hour before sunset, but even these times are not definitive as bad weather can prove. However, if the weather is good and cloud conditions right, the light is usually exceptionally good. I do hope I have not given the impression that glowing sunsets and sunrises are the norm as they are certainly not. Monochrome (black and white) photographs with the correct lighting can create fiercely evocative images especially with portraiture. A photograph is two dimensional but with the correct lighting can give a three-dimensional appearance. You must learn to see and control the light both natural and artificial as this this is the only way to create truly beautiful photographic images that are not merely dull records of reality. I love painting with light

If any of the readers are interested in learning photographic skills, I would suggest taking a trip to your local photographic group where I am sure you will be given all kinds of helpful advice and perhaps a little that is not so helpful, but remember, your thoughts on your images are the only ones that really count.

One room contained several busts and objects including copies of a stool and chair. There was even an Egyptian rattle. A large painting showed how the sand had almost covered the whole of a temple by the time the explorers arrived which partially explains why the buildings and hieroglyphs are so well preserved. Did you realise that Jean-François Champollion deciphered

the hieroglyphs in 1822?



We could see from the photographs, paintings and writings how ancient Egypt has been portrayed through the ages. Once wealthy gentlemen began taking the Grand Tour and saw these places the paintings become more realistic.

There were some exquisite jewellery and costumes. One modern dress fabric used Egyptian designs. I for one did not

realise that Howard Carter was an accomplished painter his brush strokes and use of colour brought the paintings to life.

At one point we could see a stylised ancient bust of a pharaoh in neon lighting and the depiction of ancient Egypt in modern art was not to everyone's taste.

We all left wiser and more fascinated that ever by the Egyptians.

Recruiting u3a Trustees is not a panic measure weeks before the AGM!

When I was at Northumbria University Business School majoring in 'Human Resources' on my NHS Middle Management training course, I was told that "induction is not something that happens on your first day, induction is continuous throughout your role, all organisations change and develop - you need to know how to change and develop within them".

Throughout my adventures as an employee and volunteer in small and large voluntary organisations, I have come to realise that the recruitment of Trustees is somewhat similar.

Recruitment of u3a Trustees should be a planned and continuous process and neither something mentioned straight away to a new member nor something that becomes an annual ritual just weeks or days before an AGM!

Two ideas mentioned at the recent Recruitment and Retention Pilot Workshop, organised by the Regional Support Team with u3a Whickham and Prudhoe are ...

A u3a Elder Tree

I subscribe to the e-bulletin from The Elders (<u>The Elders | Independent global leaders | Ethical Leadership</u>) as I find the whole concept really inspiring.

The Elders were founded by Nelson Mandela in 2007. They are an independent group of global leaders working for peace, justice, human rights and a sustainable planet. At Rotary International Conventions. I was lucky enough to hear Nelson Mandela but, more importantly, meet and talk with former UN General Secretary Ban Ki-moon and former President of Ireland Mary Robinson.


Subsequently, try and ensure that a few stars are completed by those key individuals who were not at that meeting.
