Wed. 09 NOVEMBER

'Unity & Loyalty' - Ray Alder

Ray is the Chairman of the Friends of Chippenham Museum and has always had a strong interest in local history. The subject of the talk and the title of his book is 'Unity & Loyalty' which is the history of the Chippenham Red Cross Hospital which was set up in 1915 in the Town Hall. This was not a military hospital but a base for convalescent soldiers who were recovering from horrendous injuries and who were often many miles from their homes. The local families in this small market town did everything they could to care for these stranded people and to ease the feelings of loneliness that they must have been feeling.

Many people in Chippenham today can recall stories about their relatives who became very involved with the VADs and others who undertook so much work, mostly unpaid, to care for these injured servicemen. 'Unity & Loyalty' is the town motto and features on the town crest - and the names were adopted for the two large wards that were set up in the hospital.

The History of Highwaymen in Wiltshire - Ruby Vitorino

Ruby is a keen local historian who enjoys giving guided walks around the Salisbury area. She graduated from Bournemouth University and has since become a full time writer and lecturer. She has always been fascinated by highwaymen and wondering how their romantic image evolved, as they were certainly not nice people to know. One of the handsome young highwaymen that she will concentrate on had his body hung in chains in Chippenham after robbing the mail coach there!

Bath at War - David Lassman

David was born and brought up in Bath and is now a lecturer with Frome Community Education (FCE). When not involved with that, he is a freelance journalist and writer with topics ranging from Jane Austen to the history of the Frome area. In this lecture he explores Bath's experience of WW2, covering in detail life on the home front, set against the background of the wider theatres of war. The focus is on the ordeals faced by Bath's inhabitants with insights into the life of the bombed city.

NORTH WILTSHIRE WINTER WALKS

Here is a summary of some of the walks, mainly circular, that helped to lift our spirits over the past two winters.

We are not fans of muddy winter fields and footpaths, so these routes used minor roads and byways. Occasional vehicles passed by but, in general, the peace of the countryside filled these interludes of about an hour to an hour and a half. We have happy memories of beautiful views of the changing seasons and of twittering skylarks! We look forward to walking these in the coming season and wondered if you might enjoy them too.

If you want more detail, we can email a photo of the route on a map. If you have any similar walks to share, please let us know.

FOXLEY- NORTON: From the large lay-by just south of Foxley Green. Turn right from the lay-by and turn right at each junction. The route passes The Vine at Norton.

BREMHILL: From the lay-by in Charlcutt with a possible extension to Bremhill village. Turn right through Charlcutt, turn right through the gate to the driveway past Bremhill House. Then at the crossroads, if not visiting Bremhill which is ahead, turn right up the hill, then right again at the top to walk along the road back to Charlcutt with wonderful views in all directions.

DEVIZES WHITE HORSE / **ROUNDWAY DOWN:** a circular walk with various places to park. We usually drive carefully along the bumpy byway alongside the North Wiltshire Golf Course clubhouse to a crossroads of paths. Walk up the hill ahead, turn right through the woods near the White Horse, then right along the byway past Oliver's Castle, then right back to the parking. After very heavy rain there can be the odd large puddle to negotiate!

CORSHAM: From Springfield Campus. This is part of the Peacock Trail in leaflets available in Corsham Library. Left up Beechfield Road, right into Valley Road, left then carefully across the A4 by The Hare & Hounds. Right, then left into Pickwick Road. Left towards Hillgreen Lodge and Pickwick Lodge Farm. Left through the farm, then follow the road back to the A4. Left back to the pub and then retrace your steps to Springfield.

LACOCK: From the National Trust carpark. Turn immediately right, then right again with the abbey on your left, along the road and over the bridge; then left along the road past Bewley Court, left along to Reybridge. Turn left after crossing the river and then, as the road bends, look for a path between two cottages, then across the field. Then left down the hill to Lacock village.

SLAUGHTERFORD / FORD: From the Giddeahall lay-by on A420. Down the road from the lay-by to join a road from Biddestone joining from the left. Left at the next junction, down into Slaughterford, right up and over Common Hill to Ford, right up the hill past Toplands Farm, and left fork back to the car.

BIDDESTONE / **SLAUGHTERFORD:** From Biddestone church. Leaving the village, fork right down to Slaughterford, right through the village, right up the hill, fork right back to Biddestone.

WEST KINGTON / MOUNTAIN BOWER: From a lay-by on the Upper Wraxall to West Kington Road. Continue along the road past the nurseries and down into West Kington village, right up the hill and through West Kington Wick, right through Mountain Bower, right at a 5-way junction and then right back to the car.

CHITTOE: From a lay-by a short distance along the road signposted to Chittoe off A342. This is a there-and-back walk past the cottages and houses of Chittoe, continuing straight on along a broad woodland track until your legs tell you it is time to turn around to return to the car!
