Historic Environment Scotland (HES) Zoom event:

Sandra Whitnell (Tweeddale u3a), the national subject advisor for local history, has arranged for HES to put on a Zoom event, exclusive to U3A members, on Thursday 16 February from 2.30pm to 4.30pm.

HES cares for over 300 properties. The event will feature behind the scenes insights from specialists: archaeologists, conservationists, researchers and others will describe the challenges and highlights of caring for our national heritage.

Although grim, it was a good read and there was some humour to relieve the horrors. Criticisms included that the author was too self-absorbed and revelling in the horror to create believable events and the narrow story needed context. Most of us felt that it was a competent and complex piece of writing for a young author's first work. Words used to describe the tale were: redemption, human capacity to love and to hate; the difficulties of emancipation; racism; ignorance.
