#### Slow Ways Group – Geoff T



Our Slow Ways Group Has Halted. Olton and District u3a Slow Ways group started in the Summer of 2021. Its aims were to walk, review and verify local routes identified by the National Slow Ways Initiative. The exact nature, length and accessibility of these walks were not known beforehand. They also tended to be 5 to 7 miles in length. All this may sound daunting however, members that took part pulled together as a team developing their sense of direction, map reading skills and stamina. Although often tired on completing a walk, there was always a sense of satisfaction and achievement. The group went out on 10 occasions and produced information available to anyone

using the National Slow Ways website.

It has only met twice in 2023. Such limited activity points to the fact that this is not a healthy functioning interest group. There are several reasons for this, and I have decided to step down as its Facilitator and there are no plans for any walks in the foreseeable future.
