Victorian glasshouses, Edwardian pergolas and walled kitchen gardens.






August Tea Party

September Meeting



Our speaker was Lorna Thomas and her talk 'A Rebel, a Saint, a Nobleman and a Mercenary: the

Legends of the Four Nations'

The talk focused on our common Celtic origins, shared history, heroes and enemies using four people who have captured the imaginations of generations and become legends.



The rebel was **Boudica** who in the 1st Century AD was a heroine fighting for the British against the Roman Empire in SE England. She was Queen of the

Iceni and led them and other peoples in a revolt against Roman rule. Although her forces massacred some 70,000 Romans and their supporters, they were ultimately defeated. British early advantage was mainly due to the design of their chariots, which were superior in battle. Boudica was imprisoned and little is known of her death.



The saint was **St Patrick**, who was not Irish but born in Britain and nothing is known of his parents. At sixteen he was taken prisoner and spent six years as a shepherd in

Ireland. He escaped to Britain where he had a revelation telling him to return to Ireland, which was mainly pagan at the time, as a missionary. He began religious training, a course that lasted 15 years. He then went to Ireland and worked with the few Irish Christians and gradually converted many pagans to Christianity, but he did not, as legend claims, banish snakes from Ireland!



Owain Glyndwr was a Welsh noble and military leader who led the Welsh people for over a decade in a war against England, the aim of which was to end English rule in Wales during the Late Middle Ages. The fighting continued during the reign of Henry IV and many Welsh were captured. However, Henry IV died in 1413 and was succeeded by Henry V who began to offer the Welsh rebels' pardons and made peace with the Welsh but Owain was the last Welsh Prince of Wales.



William Wallace, was Scottish and 7ft tall, a Scottish knight who became one of the main leaders during the First War of Scottish Independence. Although he

served as a mercenary, he was not truly one.

Along with Andrew Moray, Wallace defeated an English army at the Battle of Stirling Bridge in September 1297. He was appointed Guardian of Scotland and served until his defeat at the Battle of Falkirk in July 1298. He was put to death in 1358.
