Once upon a time, a life was lost and an idea formed...

In 1996, in a tiny village called Thorncombe in Dorset, a resident died from a heart attack because the ambulance could not reach them in time. Thorncombe lies tucked in the rolling hills, down remote lanes, far away from the nearest hospital. The owner of the village shop and village postmistress, Rosemary Walley, was determined to improve the situation and came up with the idea of recruiting and training a couple of villagers to help in an emergency ahead of the ambulance arriving and potentially prevent further deaths.

She formed a CFR scheme which launched in April 1998. The idea soon took off amongst other rural communities and slowly spread across the nation. We are fortunate in Pershore to have our own Community First Responders scheme. The team comprises Steve (the local blacksmith) Sarah and Richard, who are all volunteers giving their time in a 5 mile/ 10 minute radius of Pershore to situations where they may be able to reach and respond to emergencies before the ambulance service can attend.





Since August 2022 the team have had a fully equipped lifesaving vehicle thanks to Arrive Alive and ongoing financial support from the Friends of Pershore Hospital(FOPH). Trustee Michael Amies spoke movingly about the support received by his daughter from the CFR. We were told that if you live in a community where you know there is a locked defibrillator, the 999 Ambulance call handler should be aware of these but it may also be a good idea to find out and make a note of the code.
