Members love their ballet sessions, commenting that it is the quickest hour in the week! The group is mixed, with some returning to ballet after a 60 year gap, whilst others are complete beginners. All

Information about proposed development near Tiddesley Wood



As most of our u3a members are residents of Pershore or live nearby, we would like to make you aware of a plan that might impact out local environment. You may know that the developers, Hollybrook Homes, have submitted plans to build 300 homes on a site off Defford Road, known as "Orchard Farm" in the submission. All the details can be found here:

The site proposed is very close to Tiddesley Wood, a designated Site of Special Scientific Interest. Below is a link to a very detailed statement from Worcestershire Wildlife Trust that objects to the development because of its adverse ecological impact.

On Wednesday June 14th the developers held a public consultation meeting at the Bank House, where interested residents of Pershore could see the plans, chat to the developer's team and fill in a feedback form expressing their thoughts. Later that day a protest meeting took place outside but unfortunately, by then there were no more printed forms available.

My husband and I were delighted to join the recent public meeting of residents wishing to protect Tiddesley Wood for the future. I have a personal interest in local history and was dismayed to discover how very little I know about Tiddesley Wood despite being aware of its great age, and something of its ecological and scientific importance. I feel sure that there will be evidence of human habitation and activity all over it, and that there will also be evidence of what happened when it belonged to the monastic community of Pershore. The titles of any books that are known to contain references to it would be really helpful.

What also fascinates me is what was happening in more recent times, within living memory, or what stories local people have, told to them by parents or grandparents or local characters, about the wood that has overlooked our ancient town for so long. I would love to hear from anyone who would like to pass on what they know of Tiddesley Wood, so that we can all flesh out our knowledge of it and share our pleasure and pride in its value and uniqueness.

Monthly Meeting Write Up

At Sea with the Royal Family This month, David Rushforth took us on a voyage around Her Majesty's Yacht 'Britannia'. He had served as a Warrant Officer for 4 years during a period of huge significance for the monarchy including the American Bicentennial and HM Queen Elizabeth's Silver Jubilee. We were given many facts and figures about HMY Britannia, and along with the human anecdotes provided by David, the ship came to life.

- Ship 691 was launched in 1953, after years of hiatus... having been agreed by George VI just before the war to replace the previous Victoria and Albert. She was the 83rd Royal yacht since 1660. She cost £2 million (£200 million in today's money) and was decommissioned in 1997 due to the prohibitive cost of refits to make her seaworthy, after having travelled one million nautical miles.
- HMY Britannia might have been needed as a hospital ship -so to this end, she had stabilisers, air-conditioning, and a large laundry with its many quirky gadgets such as a sleeve presser, also known as a button crusher!
- At one point a Royal Rolls Royce was brought aboard for the Persian Gulf trip but then almost immediately removed as not needed much to the relief of the seamen who used the space as a beer store!
- The sailors wore white plimsolls at all times so as not to damage the teak deck or disturb the occupants of Royal State Rooms below.
- Rooms included offices, a banquet hall that could seat up to 96 or the State Drawing Room sometimes used for film shows for the Royal Family and crew on their best behaviour!
- And finally... did you know the term 'Union Jack' should only be used when the flag is displayed on a Navy vessel and is smaller (a jack) than others, otherwise it is the Union Flag?

His years of service led to David being invited to many important events in past years, including the funeral of the Duke of Edinburgh, and the late Queen's committal. He recently met King Charles when presenting him with a model of HMY Britannia and David suggested the King may visit the decommissioned yacht in Edinburgh in the future.
