The curlew population has declined by 50% in the UK, with over 30% decline locally in 11 years. The Eurasian Curlew is now classified as 'vulnerable' on the European Red List, meaning that the species is at risk of extinction.

The Curlew Country study area is on the Shropshire and Powys border. With 40 pairs of breeding Curlews it is one of the largest regional strongholds outside managed moors and reserves in the North.

Sue Piggott-Forster gave a fascinating and well researched talk on the Black Death to a well attended meeting on the 17 Oct.

Following the presentation there was a lively Q&A and discussion. We also looked briefly at other pandemics and compared how they have been seen, reacted to and dealt with in modern times, including our recent experiences of Coronavirus.

As a footnote, Sue has advised that latest research indicates that the plague was in fact carried by human fleas and lice, not rat fleas as originally believed. Whilst not on the 14C Black Death, there is an excellent documentary on the 17th century outbreak, called The Great Plague, that can be watched on My5.

The Black Death



14th century plague victims -Engraving

From the Plague of Justinian in AD 541 to the outbreaks in 1900 in San Francisco, and up to the 21st Century, plague has been around us, mainly unnoticed, except in the small pockets where it still persists, mainly in parts of Africa, particularly around the area of The Congo.

But the Black Death of the 14th century was different (one source believes the name to have come from the black bruising of the skin caused by the buboes, that for many spelt death).

Interestingly, the bacterium, *Yersinia pestis*, which caused the plague was only identified in 1894. Rats and rat fleas generally carried the plague from port to port and person to person. But in some forms it was also airborne.

However, none of this was known at the time and how to control it.

It is remembered because of the impact it had across the known world, from Egypt to Constantinople, China to England and Scandinavia. It touched lives, livelihoods and even changed feudalism and serfdom forever.

But the Black Death remains in our psyche, because, although the actual death toll in pure numbers was lower than many pandemics since, it is however the sheer percentage of population it wiped out in some countries, indeed up to as much as 50% of the population of men, women and children, rich or poor; across the known world.

Very few countries escaped its relentless march across countries and continents, respecting neither borders or religions, leaving in its wake a sense of fear, abandonment, and helplessness, in populations where Bible prophecy seemed to become reality, as many believed the end of the world had come!

Literature




e have finally finished our study into Russian literature, which


