One of these related to the history of the **More Family**, and the lengths a jealous husband would go to get rid of children he didn't believe were his!

Shropshire's link to the New World and the *Mayflower*

Samuel More (1593–1662), believing his children with his wife and cousin, **Katherine More**, were not his own, arranged for the removal of his four young children to the colony of Virginia in the New World aboard the *Mayflower* as indentured servants.

Richard More, Samuel's father, was master of Linley estate near Bishop's Castle. Katherine More, whose father, Jasper More, was master of Larden estate between Much Wenlock and Ludlow in Shropshire.

A certain death sentence

Sending the children on this trip was a near certain death sentence. At that time, children were routinely rounded by from London streets or taken from poor families to work as labourers in the New World colonies. Many did not survive either the voyage or the harsh climate.

The Mayflower voyage

The siblings departed Plymouth, England on the Mayflower 6/16 September 1620. The small, 100foot ship had 102 passengers and a crew of about 30–40, with dreadful weather, extremely cramped and unsanitary conditions with poor rations, attributed to what would finally be fatal for many, especially the majority of women and children.

The fate of the children

Elinor More, *aged 8*, died in November 1620 soon after the arrival of the Mayflower at Cape Cod Harbour.

A month later, at Cape Cod, Jasper More, aged 7, died of a "common infection"

Mary More, aged 4, died in the winter of 1620/1621.

Richard More (1614– c. 1694/1696), the only surviving child, aged 6 at the time of the *Mayflower* voyage, survived; going on to lead a very full life. He became a well-known sea captain who helped deliver vital supplies to various colonies, travelled over Atlantic and West Indies trade routes and fought in various early naval sea battles.

He and other Mayflower survivors were referred to in their time as "First Comers", who lived in the perilous times of what was called "The Ancient Beginnings" of the New World adventure.


In January, we shall hear more fascinating group presentations on women who have impacted history.


Painting & Drawing

he Recorded Music Group meets again on 7th December. As Christmas approaches the theme is seasonal music but with a difference - the more unusual the better.







meeting in September.


Hearing first about the founding and history of the Museum's collections, we were then able to look at the fine details of several of the works she had accessed for us. A further treat was in store as our
