- Crates: The clue? 'They may be old but can still bear their burdens' (6). A crate may be a slatted wooden case used for transporting goods. It may also refer to an old and dilapidated vehicle.

- Banditry. The clue? 'Prohibit the use of dirty lawlessness' (8). Banditry is a type of organised crime committed by outlaws typically involving the threat or use of violence. Wikipedia
- Camera. The clue? 'Private in it' (6). Not the common use of the word. In essence, 'in camera' means private, in particular taking place in the private chambers of a judge.

- Distaff: The clue? 'The side monopolised by women (7)'. It appears that a 'distaff' is a tool used in spinning. It is designed to hold the unspun fibres. It can also relate to the 'female side of the family'. Apparently the male side is sometimes referred to as the 'spear side'!
- Colliers: The clue? 'To make profitable moves, they must have fuel' (8). It seems that 'collier' is a French word. A collier is a coal miner yet the word also refers to a ship carrying coal.

• Prorogue: The clue? 'What pro needs to prevent meeting' (5)? A prorogue is the discontinuation of, say, a parliamentary session.

The group were soon at work. We easily worked through our homework and even managed to make a start on crossword 90.

Anagram Indicators: Today, these included: deteriorating, sort of, wrongly, broken up, somehow, handling, in, set-up, somewhat, confused, new, must use. Normally, at least one or two words stimulate further discussion. Today they included:

- Manse: The clue? 'Fellow's got a point- it'll attract a good occupier' (5)'. A
  manse is a clergy house inhabited by, or formally inhabited by, a minister,
  usually used in the context of Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and other
  Christian traditions'. Wikipedia
- Inners: Some us, or maybe just me(!), did not know that 'Inners' refers in archery and shooting, to a division of the target next to the bullseye. Of course we knew that it referred to the inner part of something! The clue? 'Score on board could be wrongdoers (7)' The answer: 'sinners'.
- Amity: The clue? 'Friendliness but the girl does hide it. (5). The meaning of 'amity' is friendship, especially between nations.
- 'Blue pencil': Some of us had forgotten that the use of 'blue pencil' means to censor or make cuts in, say, a book or manuscript.

**Gainsay**: the clue? 'Deny this, say' (4) To gainsay is to deny or contradict, or to speak against or oppose someone.

**Germane**: The clue? 'Relative has letter from European?' The word 'germane' means 'pertinent to a subject under consideration'.

**Card**: Of course, 'card' has many everyday meanings! The clue 'Where to find droll man if about to introduce funfair'. A card is a still piece of paper, or a small rectangular piece of plastic containing personal data in a machine readable form i.e. a credit card. It can also be used as a verb 'to card' – to write something on a card, especially for indexing.

However, it is also ana informal term - 'a usually clownish amusing person'.

• 'Ambit' was the first. The clue? 'Scope, provided some can end in the morning' (5). It seems that 'ambit' means 'scope, extent, or bounds of something'. Several of us have taken a liking to this word and plan to make use it as soon as possible!

'Martinet'. The clue? 'Flyer in France (and disciplinarian) (8).'A martinet is a person who demands complete obedience, a strict disciplinarian. Origin: late 17C named after Jean Martinet a 17C French drill master.

• 'Outré'. The clue? 'Dismissed again – being eccentric? (5)' From the French verb outrer, outré means 'unusual and typically shocking'.

Fathead: The clue? 'Overweight, he is given notice – the idiot!' Quite simply, a
'fathead' is a stupid person. However, I must confess that this term is new to
me!

A 'lighter' is also a term for 'a low, open boat used to move goods to and from ships in a harbour'. https://dictionary.cambridge.org/dictionary/english/lighter

We had a full house today and we worked hard on completing the three crosswords set at the previous session. It was generally agreed that these crosswords had been found more of a challenge than normal.

Today, several words which were considered to warrant further development seemed to follow a loose theme.

• Firstly, 'Censor'. The clue? 'He sees much others don't!' (6)

According to https://www.lexico.com/definition/censor .....a censor is 'an official who examines films, news, etc. that are about to be published and suppress any parts that are considered obscene, politically unacceptable, or a threat to security'. In ancient Rome, a censor was one of two magistrates who held censuses and supervised public morals'.

- 'Blue Pencil' also started a group discussion. It means 'to censor or make cuts'. It can be used as a noun for example, 'holding up each paragraph for preliminary blue-pencilling'. Another example: 'Also, true excellence in writing will be quickly blue-pencilled into oblivion'. https://www.lexico.com/definition/censor
- Another word was 'obviate'. The clue? Get round at (and above) it perhaps?'
   (7).

As a verb, obviate means to remove a need or difficulty, as in 'the presence of roller blinds obviated the need for curtains', or 'a parachute can be used to obviate. https://www.lexico.com/definition/obviate.

Anagram indicators today included: ripe, scrambled, poor, perhaps, breaking, awkward, somewhat, modified, enmeshed, frantically, eccentric and not quite.

The noun 'augur' refers to an official diviner of ancient Rome (https://www.merriam-webster.com/dictionary/augur). Their role was to divine

whether the gods approved a proposed undertaking i.e a military move. The noun generally refers to one held to foretell events by omens. As a verb auger means to 'give promise of', i.e 'this decision doesn't auger well. 'Augur' is from the Latin verb 'augere', to increase'.

• Anagram indicators today included: wild, possibly, not fully, somewhat, intends, mad, great if, for example.

Anagram indicators: Todays anagram indicators included: devious, badly, using, weird, not exactly, about involved, unusual, somehow, new, wild.

Today's 'interesting' word was 'prelate'. The clue? 'Quietly tell Bishop'. Quietly (p) tell (relate) = Bishop (Prelate). Not everyone was familiar with the term 'prelate'.

According to https://wikidiff.com/bishop/prelate

As nouns the difference between bishop and prelate is that bishop is (Christianity) an overseer of congregations: either any such overseer, generally speaking, or (in eastern orthodoxy, Roman Catholicism, Anglicanism, etc) an official in the church hierarchy (actively or nominally) governing a diocese, supervising the church's priests, deacons, and property in its territory while prelate is a clergyman of high rank and authority, having jurisdiction over an area or a group of people; normally a bishop.

As verbs the difference between bishop and prelate is that bishop is (Christianity) to act as a bishop, to perform the duties of a bishop, especially to confirm another's membership in the church or bishop can be (uk-colloquial-obsolete) to murder by drowning while prelate is (obsolete) to act as a prelate.
