Gardening Corner

This month (June) I am concentrating on Roses. With so many varieties to choose from, it is better to draw on my experiences with my 'good doers'.

My first is a Rambler which I have had for nearly twenty years or more. I first saw this one 'Chevy Chase' (see picture) at Chelsea on the Peter Beales' display. It is now 15 feet long covering a 6 foot high fence with hundreds of blooms in clusters. It <u>never</u> has Black-Spot and has an annual trim in Spring, mostly of top growths, before bud-formation.

Black-Spot is a common problem with most Roses. It is important that infected leaves are cleared away at the first signs. 'Rose Clear' is fine providing you begin spraying when new growth is just starting.

A bit of nostalgia now, I have a lovely variety called 'Peace'. This large Rose is a repeat flowering Rose introduced to commemorate the end of World War 2. It's origins I think was Mieland 1947, France. Mine is now nearly fifty years old and still flowering well, despite very little attention apart from dead-heading and no feeding and it survives!! Roses are greedy feeders. I mulch with well-rotted horse manure every Autumn and that's it – it works for me!

Ten Years of Visiting Essex Churches - Group I

Many of you may not know that this group was actually made up of members who became the original Committee for our Rayleigh U3A.

It started with our dear friend Marian Allen (who sadly passed away in 2016), Marian was our original founder and chairman.

Marian was Chairman and a member of Basildon and Billericay U3A, as were several of us. In her infinite wisdom Marian contacted those members who lived in Rayleigh asking if we would be interested in forming a Visiting Essex Church Group. We all got together at Marian's house and with Marian's enthusiasm and commitment to the U3A, asked "Would we like to start up a U3A in Rayleigh"?

The first Rayleigh U3A was set up and the first Visiting Essex Church Group was formed with Marian as its Group Leader.



We have visited over 100 Essex Churches and have covered all religions including a visit to a Synagogue, Monastery and Hindu Temple. It has been an extremely interesting and a very knowledgeable journey over the last ten years and is still going strong.

Terry and I have been running the group since 2016 and we still have many of the original group that started in July 2007.

Essex Church Visiting Group 2



In April our Group visited All Saints & Saint Faith's Church, Childerditch which has a fascinating history. Church Records date back to 1232 and show improvements to the building in the 15th and 16th centuries.

The old church became ruinous in 1858 and was described as a small building comprising: nave of flint rubble, brick chancel, timber belfry, a steeple of brick at the bottom and timber above. It was demolished in 1869 and replaced with the present one designed by D. Cubitt Nichols and F. Johnstone, London architects. The building is of Kentish rag

stone in the Early English style and consists of nave and chancel with south porch and west bell cot. There is one bell dating from the 17th century and a 16th century font from the old church.

The church sustained very little damage during the Second World War but the simple Victorian pulpit on the north wall and the organ were both destroyed by local vandals on the Queen's Jubilee Day in 1977. The rector, Derrick lorns, purchased a beautiful Victorian pulpit from Brentwood School Chapel and personally gave a large country house organ. On his retirement in 1981, there was a great decline in church activities during the 8 year incumbency of Samuel Marsden and, eight months before he resigned in 1989, he attempted to close the church. Archdeacon Jonathan Bailey called an emergency meeting and within 8 months had rectified the problems and the church survives today.

Childerditch village has much the same number of houses and population size as 180 years ago and although the church is not in the centre of the village, it works in partnership with the village hall to support a pleasant village community.





In May we visited the Monastery of St. John the Baptist in Tolleshunt Knights, which is the oldest Orthodox religious community for both men and women in the U.K. We were shown around the Monastery and chapel by Sister Cassiani who originally came from Romania and had tea and coffee in the dining hall.

The monastery was founded in 1958 by Elder Sophrony (of Orthodox parents in Russia) and its buildings have been decorated over the years with frescos of icon paintings and Tableaux. After departing from Mount Athos, where he

had been a disciple of Saint Silouan the Athonite, he moved to Paris, where he lived in a Russian old people's home assisting the priest.

Elder Sophrony originally had six people living with him seeking a monastic life. Then in the Spring of 1959, the new Community of St. John the Baptist was formed at the present location. Numbers grew over time and the Monastery increased its buildings and took over care and upkeep of a nearby 12th century chapel down the road from the Monastery.

The Monastery had been informed that the only way it could bury people on its property was to build an underground crypt, which it proceeded to build. Having been told the expected completion date of 12th July 1993, Elder Sophrony stated that "he would be ready". On 11th July 1993 he died and his funeral and burial were on the 14th July 1993 attended by monastics from around the world.



This was one of our most unusual and interesting 'churches' we have visited. It was greatly enhanced by the informative Sister Cassiani who answered all our many questions.
