NEWS FROM THE GROUPS


Serendipity Group 2

In July, the Group made a return visit to the 'Art in Action' exposition held annually for four days in Waterperry Gardens in Oxfordshire. The event showcased a wealth of talent, craftsmanship and expertise in arts, crafts and music with over 400 exhibitors demonstrating their skills and displaying their work of jewellery, metalcraft, wood carving, ceramics, print making and art. Two skills that particularly impressed us were the wood carving of David Patrick-Brown and those of Joanna Williams, the first lady blacksmith we have ever seen.





In the grounds of Waterperry Gardens is the lovely old church of St. Mary the Virgin, mentioned in the Doomsday Book of 1086. Visiting this church was an uplifting experience, listening to readings,



and providing the opportunity for moments of meditation and reflection. A Dutch male-voice choir rendered Gregorian Chants in the Church. Its singing was of the highest quality and very relaxing to listen to. The windows in the north side of the chancel are some of the oldest in the country, dated around 1220.

The herbaceous border in the gardens at Waterperry is 60 metres long and is backed by the mellow old brick of the kitchen garden. The long display and contrasting shapes and heights is achieved by careful juxta-positioning of early, mid- season and late varieties. Our visit in July was of course mid- season and we were fortunate to see a colourful display of delphiniums, achillea, verbascum and phlox.

We were blessed with excellent weather for our visit, and even the M25 behaved itself, so everyone enjoyed the day.



Church Visiting Group 2

In June, we visited the parish church of St. Mary Magdalene on the Sandringham Estate, just a few days before Princess Charlotte was christened there. The Royal family have worshipped in this church ever




since the then Prince of Wales bought Sandringham in 1862 and their family outing to the Christmas Day service has become as much of a royal tradition as Trooping the Colour. The Princess was to be christened in a 9th century Greek font which is considered to be one of the

church's finest features.

It is a beautiful church to visit. It was built in

the 16th century, therefore perhaps not as old as some churches we visit, but the royal connection makes it special. It is a Grade II listed building constructed of an unusual rust-coloured sandstone called Carrstone. The interior decorations are exceptional. The church has a silver pulpit and a silver 17th century processional cross presented to Queen Alexandra as a tribute to Edward V11. Many of the stained glass windows date from the 16th century.



During our visit the Verger told us how the church is filled with highly personal memories for the current Royal family. The present Queen's father, George VI, was not only christened in the church but also lay in state there after his untimely death in February 1952.

U3A DIARIES for 2016



This month we unanimously agreed that this was a book we would all recommend to everyone. Written in vivid detail it presents a compelling and disturbing account of life in the Southern States early in the 19th century.

THE INVENTION OF WINGS

by Sue Monk Kidd



The Invention of Wings is a powerful story of the contrasting lives of black and white women in Charleston during the 35 year period beginning in 1803 when Sarah Grimke, to her horror, is given a slave girl Hattie, known as Handful, on her 11th birthday by her Father a rich judge, plantation and slave owner, who considered it perfectly normal to give a 10-year-old slave to his daughter, a slave who would be expected to sleep on the floor outside her mistress's bedroom and to do whatever was asked of her.

In alternating chapters, the book follows the lives of Sarah and Hattie, giving a compelling and disturbing account of life at that time. This allows different perspectives on their related tribulations and their similar yearnings for racial and gender equality as they both harbour guilt feelings and endure hardships.

The story is based on historical fact, as Sarah and her sister Angelina, were

real people who played leading roles in the abolition of slavery, racial equality and feminism. The author has very cleverly created other very believable characters in her story, producing for our Group, a thought provoking and compelling read.

Imposter in my flower bed

Early morning, as I looked around our garden enjoying the rose scented air, I was feeling quietly pleased with the colour palette of the little patch of garden in front of me, a mixture of pale and deep shades of pink and mauve with splashes of white. Although I must admit that most of this harmonising was probably accidental. Well, I kidded myself, this is just like those show gardens we saw at the Chelsea Flower Show in May. Bring on the Pimms and enjoy this attractive flourish while it lasts! (Except I wasn't actually going to pour myself a Pimms as it was rather early in the morning.)

I had a couple of favourites at Chelsea out of all of those truly stunning show gardens. 'The Laurent-Perrier Chatsworth Garden' (designed by Dan Pearson) and 'A Perfumer's Garden in Grasse' (designed by James Basson). The naturalistic planting of 'A Perfumer's Garden' depicted such a scene of tranquillity. I could just imagine a warm evening as the sun is fading, lazily sitting at the rustic wrought iron table, positioned in the shade of two large old olive trees, enjoying a simple and very peaceful moment. And then the Chatsworth garden with its stunning use of really large pieces of gritstone boulders and rocks to create a feel of the actual Chatsworth garden in Derbyshire. A garden that provides areas of both wildness and formality that we love visiting.

Of course there were many other striking show gardens and beautiful planting schemes to delight the visitors. Some may not have excited me but I can still certainly appreciate the effort, passion and probably tantrums that went into creating them. Flowers and plants at the very peak of perfection, designers and garden teams at the top of their game, it's good to celebrate such creativity. Okay, I will admit that the crowds can make walking round the show and actually getting up close and personal with the gardens difficult, and a glass of Pimms or Champagne comes with an eye-watering price tag, but I still found it a flower and perfume filled joy. I come away, inspired and full of ideas, most of which have remained just that, ideas!

It was then, in this moment of reverie, I saw it. The imposter in amongst my pink and mauve vision of Chelsea. A dahlia had bloomed. Not one of my favourite dahlias in mauve and white, ruby, or the velvety deep burgundy shade of Karma Choc. No, this was yellow, acid yellow in fact. Ouch! A shrill statement rising up from all that gentle pink and mauve. "Where did you come from", I said aloud, "I thought you were supposed to be 'Bishop of Leicester', in a pretty shade of pale pink". I left it a while to think about it, but, 'the dahlia which was not a pink 'Bishop of Leicester', really couldn't stay there. For one thing I kept talking to it, how ridiculous is that, common sense had to be restored.

Now, as luck would have it, I had planted this exuberant yellow dahlia in a pot. Note that it was now 'exuberant' and not 'acid' – I was getting comfortable with it. And so, picking up the pot I moved it around the garden until I found it some friendlier companions where it could shine out in all its glory.

It was now well into the afternoon, order had been restored to the flower beds. Time to relax, time to enjoy, time to pour that glass of Pimms.

Speakers at our Monthly Meetings

The speaker at our September meeting is Andrew Babicz in a talk about the Royal Botanic Gardens in Edinburgh. Andrew is a Polish Scot who started as an apprentice gardener at Inverewe Gardens on the north-west coast of Scotland with the National Trust for Scotland and went on to work at the Royal Horticultural Society's Garden, Wisley, Kew Gardens and Hampton Court Palace Garden. He also spent a year working in nurseries in Holland.

In October our speaker will be Prof. Carolin Crawford talking about the Sun, our nearest planet. Carolin is the Public Astronomer at the Institute of Astronomy in the University of Cambridge. She is also an Admissions Tutor, College Lecturer and Fellow of Emmanuel College, and the Professor of Astronomy at Gresham College.

Gardening Corner

September brings shortening days combining with those late flowering perennials starting to 'do their stuff'. This has been a difficult year in the garden with wildly fluctuating temperatures and around 5 weeks without measureable rainfall. I have 9 x 40 gallon water butts around the garden and bungalow collecting roof drainage from 5 positions some linked in pairs or 3s. Incidently, do you know that you can claim rebates on your Water Rates if you supply them with details of your water diversion to butts? A drawing will usually suffice and satisfy the water company.

Now for some more 'good-doers'. Hardy perennials like phlox, asters or chrysanthemums are giving or will give a good show for the next couple of months. When they finish flowering, cut hard back and, if the weather is still mild, take some divisions which will settle fairly quickly. Failing this, buy some large plants which are usually cheap when without flowers and divide those. Most of the above are frost hardy and providing you water them in well they will make a 'flying start' next year.

This is a good time to trim your hedges or take off long growths from flowering shrubs. Also dead head regularly all your perennials.

The plant of the month is **MELIANTHUS Major** (illustrated). A shrub which makes a 'sub-tropical statement' at the back of a border with its large serrated blue-green leaves. It originates from the Western Cape of South Africa. Hardy once established, fantastic for flower arrangers. Can reach 4 feet if grown well. Can look a bit tatty in winter, but pruning in spring brings vigorous new growth. Has insignificant dark red flowers in summer which can yield seed. For more details on growing and seed, see Google.
