11.00-13.00	Morning Guided Walk	<p><u>Meeting Place:</u> Outside Temple Underground Station (District and Circle lines)</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The walk will last about 2 hours and cover a distance of about 2 miles, ending at Charing Cross. There are steep steps at times; so not suitable for wheelchair users or people with mobility problems</p> <p><u>Description: 'Striding the Strand'</u> During the walk we will uncover over 700 years of London's turbulent history as we encounter conflicts and controversies over politics, war, slavery, education, religion, the environment, music and architecture. If history is your thing this is one for you.</p> <p><i>To book for this walk Click here Max 20 participants Cost:£10.00</i></p>
14.30-16.30	Afternoon Guided Visit to National Portrait Gallery	<p><u>Meeting Place</u> In the foyer of the National Portrait Gallery. Nearest stations: Charing Cross or Leicester Square. Please note the Tube stations do not have lifts.</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The visit will last about 2 hours</p> <p><u>Description: Portraits from Tudor times to the present</u> The National Portrait Gallery has been called the 'face of the nation' and houses some of the most famous portraits from Tudor times to the present. We will see monarchs, ministers, medics and musicians; poets, playwrights and philosophers as well as others- that's enough alliteration!</p> <p><i>To book for this event Click here Max 15 participants Cost:£10.00.</i></p>
<p>Your guide: David Lloyd studied History at Bristol and Liverpool Universities and UCL. He taught History and Law for many years in London since the late 1970's. 11.00-- 13.00	Morning Guided Walk	<p><u>Meeting Place</u> Tour starts in Villiers Street just outside the north exit of Embankment tube station. This station does not have a lift.</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The walk will last about 2 hours and cover a distance of about 2 miles, ending in Trafalgar Square.</p> <p><u>Description: Quirky London</u> We'll see some of the strange, odd and bizarre sights of Westminster. We'll zig-zag around, stopping at some things you would normally walk right past. Steps that lead nowhere, a lamp fed by an unusual sustainable bio fuel, a door that might fool some people and a very bizarrely named alley. Let's scratch our heads about old Imperial measurements and smile at the somewhat idiosyncratic pedestrian crossing lights. 14.30-- 16.30	Afternoon Guided Visit to the National Portrait Gallery	<p><u>Meeting Place</u> Meet by the Sir Henry Irving statue outside the entrance to the NPG in St Martin's Place. Nearest Stations: Charing Cross or Leicester Square. Please note the Tube stations do not have lifts.</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The visit to the NPG will last about 2 hours</p> <p><u>Description: Quirky London Portraits</u> During the afternoon visit to the NPG we will visit portraits of <u>some</u> of the individuals we met on the morning walk. We will also meet some of their contemporaries. The NPG's collection of portraits numbers over 210,000 – we won't be seeing them all! Hear the stories of 12 portraits - each with a link to Westminster – covering almost 500 years of British history.</p> <p><i>To book for this event, Click here Max 15 participants Cost:£10.00.</i></p>

PM visit: From the Tudors to the 21st Century**

11.00-- 13.00	Morning Guided Walk	<p><u>Meeting Place:</u> Westminster Tube station. <i>Outside Exit 1, (Guide will be in front with a sign)</i> Step-free access.</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The walk lasts about 2 hrs and covers about 2 miles, ending at Trafalgar Sq.</p> <p><u>Description:</u> Out of the Shadows LGBT+ For many years people in the LGBT+ community had to live in the shadows due to discriminatory laws and attitudes. This walk reflects on the prejudice suffered as well as celebrating the contributions of LGBT + people in history and the major strides made towards equality in the UK. We will encounter a man persecuted for his sexuality memorialised in a coffin, the ‘most handsome man in England’ who was the lover of a former king; war heroes; brave men and women who drove the push to equality, the park which Lord Liverpool had locked up at night to prevent ‘scandalous practises’, a trans fencer who fenced in front of the Prince of Wales plus the pioneer of computing who appears on a banknote.</p> <p><i>To book for this walk Click here Max 20 participants Cost:£10.00</i></p>
14.30-- 16.30	Afternoon Guided Visit to National Portrait Gallery	<p><u>Meeting Place:</u> outside the main entrance to the NPG, St. Martin’s Place. Closest stations Charing Cross or Leicester Square. Note the Tube stations don’t have lifts.</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The visit will last about 1½-2hrs.</p> <p><u>Description:</u> From the Tudors to the 21st Century We will look at UK history from Tudor times to the 21st century in portraits. We will witness the rise and fall of empire; periods of immense political and religious turmoil, the end of absolute monarchy and the growth of modern democracy (including the fight for votes for all); civil war and the world war along with huge cultural, religious and social changes. All of this is illustrated through a range of portraits featuring people who have made a difference, from Elizabeth I to Elizabeth II.</p> <p><i>To book for this event Click here Max 15 participants Cost:£10.00</i></p>
<p>Your guide: Philip Scott was originally from Lancashire but has lived in London for 43 years and is still fascinated by this amazing metropolis. 11:00 – 13:00	Morning Guided Walk	<p><u>Meeting Place</u> In the courtyard of Burlington House, Piccadilly, in front of the statue to Sir Joshua Reynolds at 11:00 am. Nearest Tube Stations: Piccadilly Circus or Green Park. Please note Green Park Station has lifts and Piccadilly does not.</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The walk will last about 2 hours and cover a distance of about 2 miles, ending in Trafalgar Square.</p> <p><u>Description: Women in Westminster</u> During the walk we will encounter a number of remarkably influential women. We will start with two founder members of the Royal Academy: Angelica Kauffman and Mary Moser. In St James’s Piccadilly we will meet two lesser known artists: Mary Beale and Mary Delany. Influential women who lived in St James’s Square include Ada Lovelace and Nancy Astor. Along Pall Mall and Waterloo Place we will meet Florence Nightingale, Nell Gwynne and two extraordinary scientists Elsie Widdowsen and Dorothy Hodgkin. At the Women of World War II Memorial in Whitehall we will talk about Noor Inayat Khan and Queen Elizabeth II. We finish in Trafalgar Square where wartime concerts in the National Gallery often featured Dame Moira Hess.</p> <p><i>To book for this walk, click here Max 20 participants Cost:£10.00</i></p>

11.00-- 13.00	Morning Guided Walk	<p><u>Meeting Place:</u> Outside the main entrance to the Victoria and Albert Museum, Cromwell Road. Nearest Station South Kensington (not step Free). Knightsbridge station is planning step free access for mid-2024.</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The walk will last about 2 hours and cover a distance of about 2 miles, ending near the Natural History Museum</p> <p><u>Description: Mews Monuments and Museums</u> On this tour we explore the delightful network of mews and features including churches and Brompton Oratory and the former Brompton Road Station in the south side of Cromwell Road between the V&A and Harrods. We wind our way back via Holy Trinity Gardens to Albertopolis and discover the museums, institutions and monuments of South Kensington created as a result of the Great Exhibition in 1851.</p> <p><i>To book for this walk Click here Max 20 participants Cost:£10.00</i></p>
14.30-- 16.30	Afternoon Guided Visit to Victoria and Albert Museum (V&A)	<p><u>Meeting Place:</u> Outside the main entrance to the V&A Museum, Cromwell Road. Nearest Station South Kensington (not step Free). Knightsbridge station is planning step free access for mid- 2024.</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The visit will last about 2 hours Ideally we will use the staircases but lifts can be arranged if required for most areas. (I need to know in advance)</p> <p><u>Description: Cultural Highlights of the V&A Museum</u> This tour takes us around the highlights of the V&A galleries taking in significant objects from Britain, Europe, Asia and Africa from the 12th – 21st centuries. Some key objects include the Dale Chihuly’s Chandelier, The Becket Casket, Paul Pindar’s House, the Cast Courts, Hindu, Buddhist and Jain Sculptures, Tipu’s Tiger, The Ardabil Carpet and the Bed of Ware. The tour also highlights some of the architecture, galleries and spaces created for the Museum and its collections, including the original restaurant rooms and Museum frontage.</p> <p><i>To book for this event Click here Max 15 participants Cost:£10.00</i></p>

(no lifts)</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The walk will last about 2 hours and cover about 1.7 miles, ending at Baker Street station (no lifts)</p> <p><u>Description: Regent’s Park - Fantasy Terraces and Secret Gardens</u> We will see some of the most beautiful Nash Terraces on the Outer Circle and their gardens as well as St John’s Lodge Gardens and the exquisite Queen Mary Rose Garden. We will look at the medicinal gardens of the Royal College of Physicians and hear about Prince Regent’s grand scheme to make London the most magnificent city in Europe. We will look at how the buildings, gardens and open spaces of Regent’s Park act to enhance our lives. 14.30-- 16.30	Afternoon Guided Visit to the Wallace Collection	<p><u>Meeting Place:</u> Bond Street Tube station, Marylebone Lane exit, North of Oxford Street (Lifts available)</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The visit will last about 2 hours</p> <p><u>Description: Wallace Collection</u> The Wallace Collection is a national museum in an historic London town house. Its 25 galleries contain unsurpassed displays of French 18th-century painting, furniture and porcelain with superb Old Master paintings and a world class collection of armour. It is a true treasure house and a unique collection as it has remained almost unchanged for more than 100 years. The setting of the gallery is truly elegant and a glorious reminder of a long since departed aristocratic way of life. We will be looking at a diverse selection of extraordinary art works in this introduction to one of London’s greatest galleries. 11.00-- 13.00	Morning Guided Walk	<p>Meeting Place: Tottenham Court Road Tube station, outside exit 4 at top of escalator. Lift available.</p> <p>Notes: The walk lasts about 2 hours (max) and covers 2 miles ending at the British Museum.</p> <p>Description: St Giles to St Georges We start at a place of execution but architectural excellence; continue to a horticultural oasis; meet the Beatles' manager and Monty Python; discover why John Keats would have made a terrible estate agent; avoid getting drenched; come across some extraordinary women from the early 20th century; marvel and perhaps smile when we arrive at another architectural masterpiece; meet an 18th century liberal and libertine and finish outside the British Museum.</p> <p><i>To book for this walk Click here Max 20 participants Cost:£10.00</i></p>

Time	Session Type	Politicians, Philanthropists and Physicians <u>Guide:</u> Sue McCarthy
11.00-- 13.00	Morning Guided Walk	<p>Meeting Place: Outside Holborn station by the Kingsway exit. There are steps from platforms to escalators but no lifts. Nearest toilets – Shakespeare's Head (large Wetherspoons a little further down Kingsway)</p> <p>Notes: The walk will last about 2 hours and cover about 1¾ miles, ending at the British Museum</p> <p>Description: Politicians, Philanthropists and Physicians This walk behind Holborn's main roads takes us through garden squares and tree-lined streets. We visit Queen Square with its many hospitals and educational associations and Red Lion Square, laid out by the first professional, female landscape gardener. We pass architectural gems including the John Soane Museum, and walk through Sicilian Avenue; see monuments to Ramsey MacDonald's wife Margaret, radical politician Fenner Brockway, and the church with a king on its spire close by early social housing and the hotel that started life as a hostel for young women, before finishing at the British Museum.</p> <p><i>To book for this walk Click here Max 20 participants Cost:£10.00</i></p>
<p>Your guide: Sue McCarthy has been a qualified guide for 10 years after a career in adult education and charities. Her walks usually have a social history or literary focus and she is particularly interested in the stories of London's women. Sue guides with Capital Walks in London and Footprints of London.</p>

11.00-- 13.00	Morning Guided Walk	<p><u>Meeting Place:</u> At the sculpture of Matthew Flinders and Trim the Cat, outside the front of Euston Railway Station (south side), London NW1 2EE. Nearby transport links: mainline trains (Euston Railway Station); Underground (Euston/Euston Square -- no step-free access from Euston underground platforms.); Bus Station. Toilets (including accessible)/refreshments available at Euston Railway Station, or at Friends' House (opposite the War Memorial on the south side of the Euston Road).</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The walk will last about 1 hour 45 minutes and cover a distance of about 2 miles, ending at Bloomsbury Square, (approximately 5 minutes' walk to the British Museum)</p> <p><u>Description:</u> Walking the Wild Side of Bloomsbury Bloomsbury is well known for its educational and literary links, for the serenity of its squares and the studious tranquillity of its libraries and museums. But behind these, lie hidden histories of radicalism and reform, heroism and betrayal. This walk will take us through the area's beautiful garden squares and historic streets where we will unearth and explore the lesser told stories of Bloomsbury's rule-breakers, risk-takers and radicals and meet these men and women – from VC holders to traitors, martyrs to medics, the godless to the godly – who, by daring to be different, found themselves making history.</p> <p><i>To book for this walk Click here Max 20 participants Cost:£10.00</i></p>
<p>Your guide: Rebecca Walker has loved learning about history and sharing that learning for many years. In 2020 she completed the Camden Guiding Course, drawn to this lovely area of London after family research revealed that many of her ancestors were from there. East Bloomsbury in 3D

Time	Session Type	Session Description
11.00-- 13.00	Morning Guided Walk	<p><u>Meeting Place:</u> Chancery Lane Underground Station. Meet outside the station, leaving via exit 1 (no lifts)</p> <p><u>Notes:</u> The walk will last 1.30 - 2 hours and cover a distance of about 2½ miles, ending in the British Museum area.</p> <p><u>Description: East Bloomsbury in 3D</u> Away from the elegant Georgian Squares, our walk will take us behind the opulent houses into alleys once riddled with <i>Dirt, Disease</i> and <i>Destitution</i>, the 3 D's of our theme. We will hear the rushing water of a disappeared river, described by Jonathan Swift as a sewer of "dung, guts and drowned puppies....". <i>Diamonds</i> (another D!) were cut around the corner, not far from "ragged schools", workhouses and prisons. If "Cleanliness is next to Godliness", dirt and poverty were next to disease and deprivation in these dark streets. The rapid increase in population during the Victorian age accelerated the need for a proper sewage system, clean water for all and the first social housing. A few examples in our walk. We will pass by The Foundling Museum, once a refuge for abandoned children. After a stop by a former Horse Hospital, we will visit a square with more hospitals and even a larder for a sick King. End around the British Museum area.</p> <p><i>To book for this walk Click here Max 20 participants Cost:£10.00</i></p>
<p>Your guide: Carla Zoso was born in Italy but has lived in London for over 30 years and considers herself a consummate Londoner. She guides at the London Canal Museum and is a qualified Camden Guide. She prefers the quieter and less crowded areas of London: Regent's Canal, the Legal Quarters, Highgate Cemetery. She tries to leaven history with the humorous, the odd and the quirky. She makes lots of connections with other cultures and countries. Her walks glisten with pendants of the past, present and future. She worked as a language teacher, now semi-retired. She also volunteers at the Bloomsbury Squares' Wellbeing walks and at Age UK.</p>

14.30-- 16.30	Afternoon Guided Visit to British Museum	<p>Meeting Place Inside the British Museum, Great Russell Street. Meet at the Information Desk in the Great Court. Nearest Tube stations: Tottenham Court Road (step-free access); also Holborn/ Russell Square/Goodge Street but none have step-free access.</p> <p>Notes: The visit will last about 1.5-2 hours</p> <p>Description: British Museum Highlights This is a 90-minute tour of the highlights of the British Museum. In this tour you will see the Assyrian lion hunts of King Ashurbanipal, the Parthenon Marbles, the Rosetta Stone, the tomb chapel of Nebamun, a good selection of ancient Egyptian artefacts, the Sutton Hoo ship burial, and many others. The British Museum holds one of the largest collections of world history and is made up of some 8 million objects. We barely have time to scratch the surface but what you will see are some of the most beautiful treasures ever made by human hands. Your guide is a former employee.</p> <p>To book for this event Click here Max 15 participants Cost:£10.00</p>
<p>Your guide: Daniel Hausherr is an Islington and Camden tour guide who currently works at the National Portrait Gallery. Daniel has worked in most of London's major galleries and museums including the British Museum, National Gallery, Science Museum, V&A and many others. Originally from NY Daniel moved to London in the 1980s.</p>

Time	Session Type	British Museum Highlights Tour Guide: Alison Seabrook Moore
14.30-- 16.30	Afternoon Guided Visit to The British Museum	<p>Meeting Place: Meet at the rear entrance of the British Museum, Montague Place. Nearest Tube stations: Tottenham Court Road (step-free access); also Holborn/ Russell Square/Goodge Street but none have step-free access.</p> <p>Notes: The visit will last about 1 ¾ to 2 hours</p> <p>Description: British Museum Highlights Tour The British Museum might be called Britain's "museum of the world for the world". The first national museum anywhere, it all started in 1759, because of doctor-to-the-aristocracy and avid collector Sir Hans Sloane. Apart from seeing Norman Foster's Great Court (the largest covered square in Europe), we will go on a whistle-stop introductory tour of British Museum highlights, why they're special, beautiful and important and how they came to be here: the Rosetta Stone, Parthenon Marbles, Sutton Hoo, Lewis Chessmen, Hoa Hakananai'a, Ramesses the Great, Tang Tomb Warriors, Gebelein Man, Mildenhall Treasure and the Mold Gold Cape.
