The Vital Role of the Convenor

All our Interest Groups have a Convenor who acts as the point of contact between the group and the committee. The Convenor also oversees the Interest Group's meetings and programme. In some cases the role is split between two group members and with some of the larger groups there is a small programme planning team to help run the group's programme. It need not be an onerous job and other members of the group can help by taking on certain tasks. It is though an essential role and an Interest Group cannot exist without a Convenor. This year some Convenors are standing down and a new Convenor for that group will be required if it is to continue. Committee members can help and advise a Convenor, but they cannot perform the actual task. You will be informed if a new Convenor is needed for your Interest Group. If that is the case then please consider carefully whether you could help the group by taking on that role. Maybe you have a friend in the group and together you could take on this vital task.

New Interest Groups

Ringmer u3a is always willing to set up a new Interest Group if there is sufficient support for it and a Convenor can be found. Perhaps you have a specific interest that you would like to share with others. One possible new group is Climate Focus or a similar topic. You might have read the article on pages 42 and 43 in the latest edition of Third Age Matters (Issue 52). It covers a range of issues relating to our planet such as sharing experiences of going greener at home. There could also be interest in a second 'Newsgroup' or a 'Board Game' group?

If sufficient members have registered an interest in forming a new group by Open Day (17 August) then Ian will arrange an Inaugural Meeting to discuss arrangements and help identify a Convenor.

Group Activity

2 Garden Group

Our group holds ten meetings a year on the 2nd Tuesday afternoon of every month, except December and January, from 2.30 - 4.30. There are six meetings when we meet in members homes and, when weather permits, gardens. It's been particularly enjoyable to see such a variety of ways and styles members choose to cultivate their gardens. We share our joys and woes of gardening, pooling our wide varieties of experiences and sharing excess produce, seeds and plants. Refreshments are provided by the host, to which members contribute and excess funds are sent to our chosen charity each year.

During the summer, the remaining four meetings are set aside for outings to other gardens, mainly under the National Gardens Scheme, within a reasonable radius of Ringmer. Each year, we aim to visit a variety of styles of gardens, sharing cars, and as we visit 'by arrangement', our group is given a personal tour and talk by the garden owner followed by home made cakes and tea/coffee. Astronomy Group

The Astronomy Group has met monthly during the past year initially on Zoom but more recently in the Church Hall. Our talks have included an input on Cosmology given on Zoom by Leigh Edwards the U3A Science Advisor. A review of Modern Astronomy and an information session on the James Webb telescope were given by Steve Linehan, one of our members. We have met outside on several occasions to view the stars and have taken several photographs of interesting objects including one of the Whirlpool Galaxy. At this time there are no Astronomy Meetings as the nights are too light. We will start again in

September. Anyone interested would be welcome to join us.

Computing and Home Tech

Looking back over the year we've had a diverse number of interesting talks and topics. We also had a few members give talks to the group which were well received including a talk by Bob Cairns on "Auction Sites".

The group has had another busy year with one of the highlights being the third talk in recent years by Jayne Shrimpton on May 31st. Jayne is a nationally known fashion historian and photograph consultant who writes for the leading FH magazines and advises the Who Do You Think You Are series makers. She appeared on screen in the Ruth Jones episode last year. This time Jayne gave an entertaining and informed talk 'Wearing the Trousers' which looked at women's struggle for sartorial freedom and ranged from 18th century female pirates, via Mrs Bloomer, pit-brow lasses, bold cyclists to Land army Girls of the first and second world wars. Not unsurprisingly given Jayne's reputation we had our largest audience since before Covid. As usual Jayne followed her talk by helping group members date their photographs with her expert knowledge of fashion.

Open Day

If you would like to join an extra Group you need to check with its Convenor that there is a vacancy. Enrolment Forms are included with this newsletter.

Our preferred way is to pay by bank transfer (details are on the form - make sure you add your name as reference!) and send me an email with a scan of the completed form, (if you can't scan the form just send me an email with all the information the form asks for). I will send you an email confirming membership - note that this may be a couple of weeks after you renew, to give time for the Treasurer and I to tie the payments and forms together.

Please read and complete the membership form carefully. Due to the laws on privacy and data processing there are now several questions to be answered on the form.

This year we will only supply membership cards on request, on receipt of a stamped addressed envelope. Instead of sending out cards we will be sending an e-mail confirming your membership. Our Conveners can see on the Beacon system that you are a member, so a membership card is only needed if you are planning to visit another u3a.
