Monthly Meeting at the Victoria Hall Thursday 7 September 2023 10.00 for 10.30am

Presentation: Richard Blacklee

In 2016, the recently retired Richard inherited a box of family records. Reading through them and the accompanying notes taught him so much about his family that he started adding to them using memories of what he had been told by his parents. Before he knew it, he had been persuaded to publish the results, and his first book was released in 2018.

The Infamous Culworth Gang of Northamptonshire 1760 - 1780s

The records Richard had inherited inferred the intriguing possibility of a family connection to William Bowers of the Culworth Gang. These eighteenth-century highwaymen and robbers terrorised South Northamptonshire and adjoining counties for an unprecedented period of around twenty years.

In his talk Richard will discuss the relevance of the location of Culworth village and show where many of the robberies took place. It will introduce the leading members of the gang and explain the circumstances of their downfall and the fates which befell them. It will also include something of the history of Northampton County Gaol and the Sessions House, fascinating listed buildings dating from the seventeenth century which can still be visited.

YOUR HEALTH AND TECHNOLOGY

Most of us are probably aware of the increasing use of technology (typically smartphones or tablets) that GPs and hospitals are asking us to use in order to access NHS services. For example, we may be asked to take a photograph of a rash or injury and send this to our GP for diagnosis. Some people have been sent a test kit by their GP for them to use at home, and to inform the GP of the results. Also, patients are increasingly expected to book appointments online and many appointments are conducted by telephone (or sometimes by video link) rather than being held in person.



We wondered whether our members would benefit from some sessions where we could explore what is being asked and how we each can use our technology to get the best from the NHS. We are therefore planning to do the following:

- Conduct a survey to establish your experiences of using technology in this way and the extent to which you feel comfortable doing so;
- Contact a local GP practice and discuss with them their view of this approach, how we
 might be able to use it better and whether they have any plans to extend it in future;
- Design and deliver some workshops for interested members to help them to get the best out of their technology when accessing NHS services.

We plan to launch the survey next month (September) and hope you will complete it. It will be available online from our website and on paper at our monthly meetings. You will be able to complete the survey anonymously, but we would be glad if you would be prepared for us to contact you with any follow-up questions. All the information collected will be held and processed in accordance with our Data Protection policy, i.e. none of the survey results will be used for any other purpose and they will not be revealed to any other parties in a form that would enable any individual to be identified.

Thank you for your interest in and help with this project.

Papercraft Group
















