
































Art Appreciation Group 3 - Gallery Visit

Church Visits Group - Reports from their April and July Visits

St John the Evangelist Caldecott Church Visit in April

It was our first visit since pre Covid, and eleven members enjoyed the visit and a lively talk by Mary, the Church Warden.

The first record of a church in Caldecott dates from 1267. The word Caldecott means near a Roman road and there are indications that a Roman temple was once built on or near the site of St Johns.

The architecture is mostly Gothic. The roof is made of Colly Western tiles and the roofers were busy making repairs during our visit. There is an urgency to complete them before May as bats return to roost.

There is a peel of 6 bells that are rung from ground level. Currently the clappers of the bells are being rebushed. The organ is 1909 from Taylors of Leicester. Above the chancel hangs a painting of the lion and the unicorn, the royal arms of Queen Victoria. Towards the altar on the right are two well preserved stone seats (sedilia) for the priests. The font dates from about 1300.

Outside the church near the porch is a large piece of rounded stone which was the tip of the spire that was struck by lightning on 30 July, 1797. There are interesting photos inside the church showing a more recent repair, 2015, of the spire and replacement of the weathervane. In the church yard are 10 large rectangular tomb stones that are listed buildings. There is a sun dial above the porch, also two small holes in the stonework to the left where a walking stick or straight rod could be placed to read the time.

We had a lively talk and tour of the church yard by Mary, the church warden who then provided us with tea and biscuits. Eleven members attended and to show our appreciation we made a donation of £55 to the church funds.

U3A VISIT TO OAKHAM METHODIST CHURCH

On 13th July the Church Visits Group of U3A visited Oakham Methodist Church. The church was opened in March 1998 and is an example of inspired modern church design. It replaced and is on the same site as a Methodist church built in 1865.

During the tour the group received a talk from Pauline Collett, author of *The Parish Churches of Rutland*. The visit started in the Wesley Hall, the main church and worship area on the ground floor.

Pauline gave the history of Methodism in Oakham, originally represented by two churches, Primitive and Wesleyan, which combined in 1932 with Methodist Union nationally.

Pauline highlighted in particular the two foundation stones for the earlier and the current churches, now found in the entrance, and the two 'time capsules', both on display but the current one to be opened at some unknown time in the future.

Architectural features of the church of particular note were: contrasting internal brickwork, windows giving open to outside but disrupted by symbols so as not to be too intrusive, a high open roof with three crosses set into the beams, the way in which the building has turned the different levels of the earlier church, which had become an impediment, to its advantage.

The church had been designed with adaptability in mind so that the raised staging at the front of the Wesley Hall and the chairs (not pews!) can easily be re-arranged for different types of social activity and worship.

Proceeding next to the third level, visitors entered the glass-fronted 'upper room' which overlooks the Wesley Hall. It is included in the sound system so it can take an overflow of visitors on such occasions as funerals or be used for meetings and other activities.

Finally, on the second level the group gathered in the Dean's Hall. This is a large hall used for social gathering, local community group meetings, and is adjacent to a modern kitchen with a serving hatch. Here, Pauline completed her presentation, and our U3A group took advantage of the facilities to enjoy tea and cakes and a chat.
