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Monthly Meeting at the Victoria Hall Thursday 4 January 10 for 10.30am

Speaker - John Thomas

John is Project Manager for the Rutland Villa Project and has been working as a professional archaeologist since 1986. He has directed many large-scale excavation projects with a particular expertise on prehistoric sites and landscape approaches. He has published the results of his fieldwork and academic study widely, and to a range of audiences, through monographs, peer-reviewed articles in national and local journals, and popular archaeology publications. John is also actively involved in promoting archaeology to the general public, regularly providing talks to local societies such as ours.

The Talk - Encounters with Achilles: The Discovery of a Trojan War Mosaic in a Rutland Field.

In 2020 a Rutland landowners walk across fields during the pandemic lock-down led to the discovery of one of the most exciting Roman mosaics in over a century. The unique example of ancient art featured scenes of Achilles and his battle with Prince Hector of Troy as told by Homer in his epic Trojan War poem The Iliad which were the first of their kind from Roman Britain. John will describe the discovery of the mosaic and talk about its imagery and about further work by University of Leicester Archaeological Services and Historic England that has revealed the wider setting of the mosaic, within an extensive villa complex.



NOTE This is expected to be a very popular talk. Seats will be available on a first come, first served basis as usual and there will be an upper limit to the number of seats available, based on the capacity of Victoria Hall

Coexisting Dementia and Hearing Conditions



The following message has been received with a request to circulate it to as many members as possible. Will you please include it in your Newsletters and on your websites. Thank you.

"We are pleased to share with you that we have launched a short 10-minute survey to collect priority questions for future research about the connection between dementia and hearing.

This work is led by the NIHR (National Institute for Health and Care Research) Nottingham Hearing Biomedical Research Centre (BRC) and the University of Nottingham in a collaboration with Alzheimer's Research UK (ARUK) and the RNID (Royal National Institute for Deaf People) and supported by the James Lind Alliance.

We would like to share the survey widely to help ensure that future research focuses on the questions that matter most to those it will impact.



Free upgrades available to give Rutland warmer homes



Rutland residents can now get free upgrades to make their homes more energy efficient. These upgrades are up to £38,000 per household.

If your home is not very energy efficient and lacks gas central heating, you can apply for this programme. You may be eligible for free upgrades for your home that could save you money on your energy bills. These upgrades include things like better insulation, air source heat pumps, and solar panels.

By applying to Warmer Homes, you can have these improvements installed in your home for free. For example, solar panels usually cost £6,000 to install, but you won't have to pay anything for them through this funding. They can save you over £500 per year. Solid wall insulation, which can cost up to £10,000, can also be installed for free and save you up to £500 a year. Air source heat pumps, which are worth £14,000, can be installed for free and save you up to £1,000 a year. So, by taking part in this programme, you get these installations at no cost, and they will help you save money on your energy bills.

This scheme is available now and will be open until 2025. This scheme is first come, first served so apply now.

We need volunteers! Leicester's Life Skills Charity helps children make safer choices, join us and help make a difference in your community.

At Warning Zone children hear real life stories and experience learning through interactive zones led by our volunteer guides. The centre is split into two. There is a general safety zone –fire, arson, railways, personal safety, water, electricity, road safety to name a few! And E-Safety - topics include online phishing, cyber bullying, sharing and use of inappropriate images, online grooming and more. Both areas explore themes such as peer pressure, criminal responsibility and consequences, the importance of talking to a trusted adult, being a good friend, and mental health and wellbeing.

Warning Zone wouldn't function without the generosity of our wonderful team of volunteers who deliver lessons and experiences to the children from Monday to Friday throughout the academic year. Each day is split into a morning and afternoon session. This equates to 10 sessions a week that we require volunteers. Each session needs approximately 10 volunteers, so that is around 100 volunteers a week! Some of the volunteers stay for the day, while others just come for a morning or afternoon session. The minimum requirement is just 5 hours per month (2 sessions).

Volunteers range from 16 to 80+ years old, from all walks of life. The day at Warning Zone is ideal for people that have retired and are looking for a way to use their extensive, valuable skills and experience. It really is a rewarding volunteering opportunity and a great way to give back to the community. There is a dedicated space for volunteers where appreciation is shown from biscuits to days out and achievements are celebrated with certificates at various stages.

Be sure to visit Oakham's Charity Bookshop!




The books donated to the shop range from thrillers to children's stories, beautiful art books, biographies of all kinds, travel writing, nature, history and specialist, academic studies.
