Monthly Meeting at the Victoria Hall Thursday 4 January 10 for 10.30am

Speaker - John Thomas

John is Project Manager for the Rutland Villa Project and has been working as a professional archaeologist since 1986. He has directed many large-scale excavation projects with a particular expertise on prehistoric sites and landscape approaches. He has published the results of his fieldwork and academic study widely, and to a range of audiences, through monographs, peer-reviewed articles in national and local journals, and popular archaeology publications. John is also actively involved in promoting archaeology to the general public, regularly providing talks to local societies such as ours.

The Talk - Encounters with Achilles: The Discovery of a Trojan War Mosaic in a Rutland Field.

In 2020 a Rutland landowners walk across fields during the pandemic lock-down led to the discovery of one of the most exciting Roman mosaics in over a century. The unique example of ancient art featured scenes of Achilles and his battle with Prince Hector of Troy as told by Homer in his epic Trojan War poem The Iliad which were the first of their kind from Roman Britain. John will describe the discovery of the mosaic and talk about its imagery and about further work by University of Leicester Archaeological Services and Historic England that has revealed the wider setting of the mosaic, within an extensive villa complex.



NOTE This is expected to be a very popular talk. Seats will be available on a first come, first served basis as usual and there will be an upper limit to the number of seats available, based on the capacity of Victoria Hall

Church Visits Group

St Andrews Glaston

Fourteen members of the Church Visit Group met at St Andrews Wednesday afternoon 9 August and enjoyed a most interesting talk from the Reverend Jane Baxter.

There has been a church in the village for 850 years, possibly as much as a 1000years. It is unusual as it has a central tower which suggests an early date, and houses 6 bells that are rung from the floor, the earliest is dated 1598. The original church was smaller than the present one. The nave and chancel were both enlarged around 1200 with a north aisle being added.

In the 14th century the chancel was again extended. It seems that there was an intention to move the central tower and enlarge the nave but for whatever reason that never happened so the tower remains in the centre of the church and is narrower than the chancel and also there is a substantial north-west pillar between the nave and aisle.

There are two cross beams in the roof clearly carved with the date of 1750 and 1744.

All the glass is Victorian. In the early 20th century an organ manufactured by Morton and Moody of Oakham was installed, although it hasn't been used now for more than 30 years. It has been replaced by a modern electric organ and electric piano.

There are memorials to local people and also World War Memorials, one to the memory of members of 4 Parachute Squadron Royal Engineers who left from this parish and were killed at Arnhem, September 1944.

In 2018 thieves stole the lead from the roofs putting the future of the church in jeopardy, but fortunately with hard work and fund raising by the community it has been repaired.




Church Visits Group

St John the Baptist Harringworth - 13 September 2023

The village of Harringworth nestles in the shadow of the railway viaduct which is three quarters of a mile long and spans the Welland Valley from the Seaton Tunnel to Harringworth. On the 13 September sixteen members of the Church Visit Group enjoyed a very interesting visit to this unusual church.

The original church was built in 12th century. Since then, over the centuries many alterations have been made, and the porch which was originally 15th century. The north door 14th century and south doorway 15th century. The arches are 13th century, the outer one has dogtooth moulding. In the latter part of the 15th century the Chancel was rebuilt and the walls were raised, much of the old stone being re-used. Weather-worn sedilia suggest that the Chancel was roofless before this rebuilding.



The church has a 12th century tower with a 14th century spire, with carved heads on it. The top of the spire was renewed in 1892. The church was restored in Victorian times, and this was completed in 1892, the modern roof dates from that time. The plaster was removed from the side aisles but not replaced, and the box pews were also removed. In the tower and on the walls of the church are lists of benefactions to the Parish.

In the side windows of the Chancel are a few pieces of 15th Century coloured glass. Fragments of 14th and 15th century glass were also taken from the east window in 1919 and placed in windows in the North aisle where there was already some 14th century blue and red glass. Other fragments of coloured glass are probably no earlier than the end of the century.

The clock was given by Thomas Tryon in 1879. In the tower used as a Priest's bell, is the former Sanctus Bell, believed to have been brought from Lyddington. It is 15ins diameter and cast about 1410. The tower also houses a ring of six bells which were rehung in 1992 by the Rutland Church Bell Restoration Stewards.

In more recent years much restoration work and improvements have been made such as electric rewiring and heating, modern kneelers, and altar frontals. Most of this work has been completed by the local parishioners.
