
All of the group have various conditions which make running up/down hills/steps impossible but we find on the flat we can keep up a reasonable pace.




The Craft Group continues to thrive with around 10 - 12 regular members.

Adjoining areas' music could be experienced but not from much more than a day's walk away.

What we call "classical" would be totally unknown to the majority. Despite popular belief, Classical music has a widespread appeal and if you like to dabble, immerse yourself in it or somewhere in between, maybe the Music Appreciation Group is for you. Lord Woolton Pie

With the current cost of living being a problem for many, perhaps it's a good time to take another look at this World War 2 recipe which was created when many items of food were rationed.

1 lb diced potatoes

1 lb diced carrots

1 lb diced cauliflower

1 lb diced swede

Leek or an onion, chopped

Fresh parsley, chopped

1 or 2 teaspoons Marmite (or stock powder)

1 heaped tablespoon oats

Shortcrust pastry (with wholemeal flour)



- 1. Dice up all the vegetables, place in a saucepan and just cover with water. Mix in the Marmite and oats and stir. Bring to the boil and simmer for 15 minutes until the vegetables are soft.
- 2. Drain, then season with plenty of salt and pepper, adding a teaspoon of margarine.
- 3. Place the mixture in a pie dish.
- 4. Roll out the pastry to the desired shape and then place over the pie dish. Pierce the top in several places with a sharp knife. Glaze with a little milk.
- 5. Place in the oven at 180C for 20-30 minutes until the pastry is golden brown. Serve with thick gravy.

NEW YEAR GREETINGS FROM CANADA

January in Ontario, and we are just beginning another winter snow storm, expecting around 20 cm around the overnight period.

At the moment it is light fluffy stuff, softly falling, but who knows, later if the wind gets up, it could make travel difficult. My elder daughter is travelling from PEI (Prince Edward Island) to Ottawa tomorrow for a two week stay with us, so it could be a troublesome journey.

Many of you may wonder what everyday life is like over here, and as I am staying with my younger daughter and her family in a small country community called Russell village, I will try to give you a brief description.

Ours is a typical small subdivision of modern homes, together with a large community centre, doctors' offices, churches, shopping areas, and a library.

Much the same as the facilities in Seaton.

However, although the community is surrounded by many large farms, the same as Seaton, there the similarity ends.

This is a vast province, one that the whole of England would fit into comfortably, and as most of it was developed on a grid system, everything is square and neatly surrounded by long straight roads, with few hills.

There is a large collection of activities for people to be involved with, such as the 55+ group, that offers fitness sessions, indoor games and craft activities, along with luncheons and bus trips, and also a well-supported horticultural society, while at the local library, reading and writing groups are available.

They have an active Women's Institutes, and churches for most persuasions.

Outdoor and indoor sports centres, and an adequate supply of restaurants and coffee shops.

More than enough to keep a person busy.

I hope to return to the UK and Seaton in the spring, and although I will miss my many new friends over here, I look forward to meeting up with those in my homeland.

Canada is a huge country of extremes, very hot in summer and comparatively cold in winter.

I read my digital copy of the "i" each day and this keeps me in touch with what you are contending with.

So, I urge you to keep warm, keep well and keep smiling. Afterall, that is the British way of doing things, isn't it?
