Speakers for March & April

Thursday 2nd March 2023 Professor Karen Hunt - "Women's Suffrage in Dorset: Forgotten Stories"

Dorset is not a county usually associated with the long campaign for votes for women that culminated in partial enfranchisement in 1918. However, that does not mean that women (and men) of the county were indifferent to women's lack of citizenship. This talk explores where in Dorset women chose to organise, what they did and the effects it had locally. Why did suffragism blossom in some places and not others; and how did the experience of this campaigning affect Dorset women once the vote was won?

Karen is an author of several books on the subject of Women's Suffrage internationally and also a book about life on the Staffordshire home front in the Great War. Karen is the Chairman of Bridport Museum Trust and Professor Emerita of Modern British History at Keeble University.


Thursday 6th April 2023 Brian Margetson - "The Search for the North West Passage"

This is the story of the exploration of the North West Passage. The booming trade with the far-east spurred on by the Industrial Revolution had the one major pitfall.
