FreeBMD - Summary

- Data for Birth/Marriage/Death records from September 1837
- 290 million distinct records
- All records double transcribed by volunteer effort
- Select Births/Deaths/Marriages or All types
- Searchable by Surname/First name, Date range (or Reference)
- Filter by Districts or Counties
- All record types complete for most locations up to early 1990s

FreeBMD - Tips

- Option for phonetic match on names
- Option for exact match on first name (if common variants)
- Select County then Districts within County
- Use Count button first to see if too many records returned then Revise
- Then use Find when number of matches is small enough (less than 100)
- District may be nowhere near the actual place of the event
- Data taken from Index Volumes held at GRO not original certificates
- Records only indexed quarterly March, June, September, December

FreeBMD - the search results page

- On results page click page number to see all entries on that page
- Click on the District name link to find out about that place
 - Linked page contains a further link to the UKBMS site for details
 - 0
 - This page also shows a list of all villages contained in the District
- Volume and page relates to one page in the marriage register
- Contains details of 2 or 3 marriages so can work out potential spouses
- Info link shows more details and link for corrections or comment
- Spectacles icon to download image of index page (.jpeg best)

GRO - New Online Indexes

- Prior to November 2016 you had to know the index record details (District, Date, Volume) in order to be able to order a certificate
- Or you could get GRO to find it given the best information you knew
- GRO has since re-indexed 130 million original certificates not just digitised the old paper indexes to make brand new online digital indexes
- Births from September 18437 to 1934
- Deaths from September 1837 to 1957
- Original digital records for all years from 1984 to 2021
- New data in the indexes include mother's maiden name for all records not just since Sept quarter 1911 no maiden name implies illegitimate
- Age at death or year of birth on all records not just since Jan quarter 1866
- Need to register a free account to be able to access the indexes
- Need to know date within plus or minus 2 years to find record
- Marriages not yet re-indexed from original records
- None of this replaces the content of the certificates themselves

FreeCEN - Summary

- Data from Census records for censuses from 1841-1911
- Around 46.5 million records
- Around 250,000 new records added last month
- All double transcribed by volunteer effort
- Searchable by Name, Birth Date range, Birth County
- Search by Census County then available Place and Census year
- Only transcription available not original image of record

FreeCEN - Tips

- Overall coverage varies by Census year varies from 0.3% to 65.3%
- Average 16.3% over all years (figures updated daily)
- View Records by County and Year (& wait for results) before trying a search
- Then review coverage Civil Parishes within that year and county
- Option for phonetic (Soundex) match on names
- [Birth place search coming]
- Over 3,000 daily searches

FreeREG - Summary

- Data from Parish Registers from earliest in mid-1500's
- Over 26 million Baptisms, 8 million Marriages, 19 million burials
- All double transcribed by volunteer effort
- Searchable by Name and Date range
- Search by Census County then available place and Census Year
- Choose Baptism/Marriage/burial or all three
- Only transcription available not original image of record

FreeREG - Tips

- Overall coverage varies by place
- Statistics by Place with first and last record (figures updated daily)
- View Records by County then Place within County to see records for each Church
- View records totals for Place and First/Last Year before searching
- Search options for Family members and Witnesses
- Widen search to nearest 40 Census Places
- Option for phonetic (Soundex) match on Names
- Over 14,000 searches daily


