Ambling Group

Amble - Combroke - Compton Verney - 8 August

After taking a democratic vote 16 of us did the amble in the rain and drizzle! The amble took us 3.5 miles through fields and muddy woodland, around the perimeter of Compton Verney Estate. Some of the walk was undulating but the views were worth the effort, taking in the two lakes and Compton Verney House. Even though it was raining everyone enjoyed the walk and it has been put in the diary for next June/July to see the wild meadow flowers in bloom.

The field that has the wild flowers is called Old Town Meadow and was the site of the medieval village of Compton Murdak. The village was abandoned in the Tudor period and by the time 'Capability' Brown came to Compton Verney in the 1760's no trace of it remained. The meadow is home to a number of birds, skylarks, kestrals and buzzards. Goldfinches can also be spotted feeding on the knapweed seeds.

In August, 4 members of the group met to discuss the book 'Three Hours' by Rosamund Lipton. Those members who could not be present, sent their comments. The book's action is set over the course of three hours, hence the title. It deals with contemporary topics: a school shooting and terrorist attack but set in England rather than the USA as we are used to hearing. The start of the book is extremely dramatic and tense with students and teachers hiding in classrooms and the school theatre from gunmen and there are some superb images such as children piling books against the library door to prevent entry. This is every parent's, teacher's and students' nightmare but the book goes deeper into issues that are pertinent and relevant to our times: terrorism, radicalisation, refugees and their integration. Could any of our children be radicalised online? The characters are well drawn. The book provoked a lot of discussion and despite its serious subject matter was enjoyed by the group.
