Getting to Know Members

This next instalment of our 'getting to know members' series is from Miles Scrivens, leader of the Local History Interest Group:

Born in what was still a village on the eastern outskirts of Cardiff on the day Paris was liberated, I have clear memories of the some of the winter of 1947 and standing in queues in shops with ration books in my hands. It was usually my job to hold them. Primary school days were not the happiest days of my life but then things didn't improve in secondary school either. Or at least not until the maths teacher hit

on the idea of sending me over the shop to buy him five Senior Service and a packet of Polo. I got the Polos. The unspoken agreement being that I didn't return until the class ended. It was pretty much acknowledged that I was a lost cause. But at the end of June 1960 I was out of school and free to pursue my limited ambitions, a couple of spare shillings to purchase my own Senior Service and an occasional glass of beer.

On the fifth of September I began a five year apprenticeship as a Fitter and Turner in a local steelworks. On the seventh of September my world was rocked as a load of staff from the local technical college arrived to sign us up for day release for the forthcoming year. It soon dawned on me that it wasn't just the next year. It was going to be the next five years. Oh joy unconfined!

Over those five years I smoked a lot; drank far more than was good for me; walked the Bannau Brycheiniog, as I must call them now, and through an increasing awareness brought on by age and attendance and eventually a leadership role in a number of youth organisations I approached the end of what one uncle described as my "tearaway years". The end of my apprenticeship also ended my brush with education I believed.

My friends and companions were settling down as was the pattern of life at the time. I began to think about the years between then and my ultimate goal, retirement. Slowly the light dawned. Steelworks were closing, the world of heavy industry was coming to an end and some of those that said you'd have to do many different jobs in a lifetime were correct.

What to do? No commitments, the world potentially my oyster. What did I enjoy doing? Working with young people in the youth club environment. I had friends who did just that who spoke of how rewarding that was and it didn't involve working night shifts on Saturday or Sunday. Before I could do that I needed A levels as a starting point. Back to school.

After A levels, then university came employment in General Education in Further Education colleges in Surrey and Essex and later, a governorship in a local secondary school. FE because Youth Clubs were going the way of steelworks, five year apprenticeships and day release. The last college that employed me has become a site for a housing estate.

A couple of months after my seventy-fifth birthday I retired from my role as Chair of Governors of a secondary school academy and was just making my way with speech in hand when a light flashed in front of me that threw my well prepared material completely out of my mind. I had spent seventy years, minus one, the thinking year, on one side of the desk or the other. It turns out that my ambition had become to ensure as far as I possibly could that education was a better experience for others than it had been for me. I may never know!
