Places to visit: Home and Abroad

This is the first in a new series of articles devoted to places to visit for days out and short (or long)breaks. This month's contributor is Lauri Scrivens who tells us about Bury St Edmunds. Thank you Lauri.

This month I am going to tell you about a 4/5 day break in this country. For years, in fact, for most of my life I lived in the charming area that is called East Anglia. I would like to suggest a short break based on the town of Bury St Edmunds in Suffolk. It's about a three hour drive from here. The town itself is full of beautiful Georgian buildings and has a wonderful Abbey to visit. The Abbey has some amazing gardens around it which are at their best in Midsummer but beautiful for different reasons in the other three seasons. There are a number of hotels in Bury or there is an interesting hotel at one of the National Trust properties on the outskirts. This is Ickworth House, which is surrounded by the estate full of beautiful walks, a chapel, and a large herd of deer. Its house is known for its rotunda, open as a National Trust property. The hotel there has a restaurant and there is also a National Trust café. Moving West from Bury St Edmunds travel along the A14 and the A11 to Cambridge. Cambridge, of course, is well known for its ancient colleges and seats of learning, and is a fabulous shopping centre. Both Bury St Edmunds and Cambridge have professional theatres and it's worth looking at whatever touring production is available when you are there. The Theatre Royal at Bury is also owned by the National Trust and has been renovated recently to its original Georgian self.

Travel slightly north from Cambridge, and you come to another stunning National Trust property called Anglesey Abbey. This is well worth a visit for its gardens and grounds especially, again in whatever season you are there. Its actually famous for the number of different species of snowdrops that are there during February and March. Another short drive will take you to the National Stud at Newmarket and then on to Audley End Mansion and grounds which is run by English Heritage. From there, or from Bury St Edmunds, go a little further south to travel around the villages of North Essex and South Suffolk. In particular, take a look at Finchingfield with its scenic duckpond and village green where there are several cafés and a welcoming Pub. Also try to see nearby Castle Hedingham which has its Norman Castle Keep intact and is open to the public. The Keep is also set in magnificent grounds. Nearby is the Colne Valley Railway, if you're feeling inclined to take a short nostalgic trip on a steam train. If you then travel north towards Bury St Edmunds you come across Clare, a Suffolk Village and another wonderful place full of interesting buildings. Clare has a Country Park built around a disused railway station next to a ruined castle on its mound. Cafés abound in Clare and it also boasts a working Nunnery, which has recently renovated its chapel, set in some lovely gardens and it is really worth a short visit. Take the road across to Long Melford, about 6 miles, where you can visit yet another National Trust property, and also Long Melford Hall, a Tudor house which is owned privately but open to the public. It, too, has lovely grounds.

Just south of Long Melford is the market town of Sudbury where the painter Thomas Gainsborough spent a fair amount of time. The house he lived in is now a small Art Gallery and Museum . It is open on a daily basis. Also, in that part of the world you can visit Dedham Vale , where the painter John Constable lived and worked.

From Sudbury, you can travel back to Bury St Edmunds or visit Lavenham an old wool town with more medieval or Tudor buildings. Clare, Long Melford and Lavenham have huge churches built from the proceeds of wool money when that commodity was abundant in past centuries.

Travel east from Bury St Edmunds and you can reach the Suffolk coast at Southwold or Aldburgh, visiting more interesting places on the way: The Museum of East Anglian Life at Stowmarket- very much hands on ,Sutton Hoo Treasure, the Norman Framlingham Castle, or even the RSPB Reserve at Minsmere.. As this all shows there is a wealth of beauty and interest to be found in just one small part of East Anglia.

If you venture that far east for a short, peaceful but interesting touring holiday I'm sure you won't be disappointed.
