#### Places to visit: Home and Abroad


This is the first in a new series of articles devoted to places to visit for days out and short (and long)breaks. This month's contributor is Judith Jurics who was brought up in Hungary and knows the country well. Thank you Judith.

#### Budapest

If you are looking for a short city break Budapest is a great city to visit. It is about 2 1/2 hours flight from Birmingham. Jet2 runs two direct flights per week to Budapest on Mondays and Fridays, and also offers city breaks which include flight plus hotel accommodation.

Budapest is the capital city of Hungary. The Danube flows through the city and divides it into two parts: Buda and Pest. The centre of Pest is the heart of the capital. Here you find many restaurants, museums, theatres and much more. A couple of days won't be enough to see all, but certainly will give you a taste of the city. I would suggest to take a hop on – hop off sightseeing tour and then you can decide what you would like to see.

Personally, on the Pest side, I would visit the Parliament, St Stephen Basilica, the Opera house (guided tours are available to book online), travel on Europe's oldest Underground Railway to the City Park and have a soak in the Szechenyi thermal bath. Make sure to have a coffee or tea and a cake in the famous Gerbaud Confectionery in the city centre on Vorosmarty Square directly opposite the old underground (Metro line 1) station.



Buda's special feature, Castle Hill, rises above the Danube. Castle Hill, boasts Matthias Church, Fishermans Bastion and the Sandor Palace, which is the official residence and workplace of the President of Hungary. Nearby is the excavated remnants of the Royal Palace and also the very impressive Buda Castle, which houses the National Gallery. Wander through the cobbled streets of the district and admire the many Baroque buildings. A coffee and cake at the famous Ruswurm Confectionary in Szentharomsag Street is a must.

Anne Bronte, the least well known of the Bronte sisters, published 'The Tenant of Wildfell Hall 'under a male pseudonym following her sisters' example. The book uses her personal experience within her family and deals with addiction (drugs, gambling), domestic abuse and the restrictions placed on women( and their children )who were very much their husband's property. The heroine, Helen, having married for love but not really knowing her husband, flees from her abusive and controlling husband taking her son with her and living under an assumed name in fear of being found. She returns to nurse her husband in his final illness thinking to get him to repent and save his soul. Finally, she finds happiness with a man she has met whilst living under an assumed name. There are many references to religion and the way women were treated under the law. Most of the group did not enjoy the book but it did provoke a good discussion. The group will hold its New Year Meal at The Dirty Duck on 1<sup>st</sup> February. #### Recipe for Hot Wassail as served at the December meeting

Many members asked for the recipe for the hot, non-alcoholic punch served at the Christmas meeting. Frances Freeman has kindly provided this:

Great to warm you up on a cold day and we have had a few of these recently.

1 litre apple juiceI tbsp ground cinnamon/or a stick of cinnamon3 tablespoons honey

6 cloves

1 teaspoon ground nutmeg

4 tablespoons lemon juice

Bring this mixture almost to the boil. Let it stand for a while, heat again, sieve and serve. Ideal for a winter's evening.
