Fraud and Scams

At the April meeting, *Ellen Holah, a Police Community Support Officer* gave an interesting and informative talk on the latest frauds to look out for. For those of you who could not attend here is a summary of the most frequent ones:-

Telephone:- These scams are aimed at our age group, since these days most people under 50 do not have a landline. To make it more difficult, fraudsters can make it seem that they are calling from a local number. So be aware!

If you get a call from the Police station saying your credit card has been stolen, They will offer to put you through to your bank or you to call directly. DO NOT call your bank from the same phone as the fraudsters will have held the line. To call your bank to check, use a mobile or another line. The police will NEVER call you to ask for help. Be aware of a new scam where criminals 'cold call' people asking for their bank details, falsely saying this is required in order for them to receive the Government's £150 energy rebate. Councils will never ask you to give your bank details over the phone. If someone does ask you, hang up immediately.

If you get Amazon prime calls or calls saying your Internet is having problems and are going to be cut off. Ignore these and put the phone down.

Text messages;- whatever the message DO NOT click on a link.

Unfortunately if you get scammed once, then your number goes on a 'mugs ' list and afterwards you will find that you will get a lot more phone calls . You then have several options:- you may have a call blocking service included in your package from your telephone service provider. The alternative is to buy an electronic device to put on your telephone line. It was suggested that a good one is called 'True call' and costs about £100. (Perhaps do not rush to buy one as technology on landlines are changing which might make it redundant).

Next, remember that 'Mobile' communications are more secure than landlines.

However, watch for 'mobile messaging scams. These often come via Whats app or Facebook by someone pretending to be their sons/daughter/friend claiming they have lost their phone and giving you the new number. Next a plea for money since they cannot get through to their bank as they do not have passwords with them. Be very careful, try contacting their old number or other verification before taking action. You can check out what the latest scams are about by going to the *AGE UK website* and search for 'scams & frauds'. Ellen also mentioned *Romance scams, cold calling* etc but there were too many details to include in this report.

On The History and Work of the Thames River Police

Originating as a partnership between the Government of the day and the West Indian planters and merchants, the Marine Police were formed to protect the vital trade between the West Indies and London from widespread theft on the Thames. Over the last two centuries the Thames River Police, as they have come to be known, have continued to protect the river, patrolling, with very few exceptions, 24 hours a day, seven days a week since their foundation.

Today the Thames River still protects the river, as they have done since 1798. They are now recognised by UNESCO as the longest continuously serving police force in the world and, as forerunners of the Metropolitan Police, are the founders of modern policing.
