
#### **NEW Discussion group:- This House believes! (Zoom only)**

## Out and about with your Newsletter Editor:-



During our stay in Devon during August, we caught wind of a potential church concert on a Saturday afternoon. Despite the overcast weather, we took precautions against rain and set out from Seaton, making our way along the cliffs to Beer. Instead of descending the steps, we veered right, inland, and descended a steep hill adjacent to the Parish Church. Finding nothing of interest there, we headed down toward the beach. About 150 yards further, we stumbled upon the Congregational Church, where an "Organ concert" was taking place. Curious, we paid the entrance fee with uncertain expectations. Upon entering, we were greeted by a magnificent 99-year-old Wurlitzer Organ, the oldest of its kind in Britain. These organs were originally developed in the 1920s to accompany silent films. Despite their eventual obsolescence, they continued to resonate in many cinemas until the early 1960s.

Some of us, as members of the older u3a generation, can recall these organs playing during Saturday morning picture shows. Also notably, Reginald Dixon at the Blackpool Tower ballroom, a regular on the BBC Light Programme, stands out in one's memories. The organist treated us to melodies spanning from the 1920s to the 1960s, intertwined with discussions about the instrument's history throughout that era. During the intermission, we had the opportunity to converse with the organist and the dedicated group of volunteers responsible for maintaining the organ. The afternoon proved to be both delightful and enlightening. As we made our way home, the weather markedly improved, climbing the steps out of Beer, we pondered why this unique piece of heritage wasn't more prominently showcased. A monthly tradition, these concerts attract organists from across the UK, all eager to play this beautifully aged instrument.

With the tourist crowds gone and convenient parking available, it offers a distinctive outing on a dreary autumn day. Upcoming concerts are on September 9th, October 14th, November 11th, and December 9th. The repertoire seems to be a bit potluck, leaving me yearning to hear some lively Bach music resonating within that setting. Brian Webb.

## **Tech Corner with Tony Warren**

This is a new column that I have volunteered to write each month, just to give a few tips and ideas about computer security, staying safe on-line and making sure nobody gets caught out by the bad people out there. I was pleased to be able to present a talk on this at the Science and Technology group, so if you are in the group, some of this will be familiar.

I thought I'd start off with three items, a nag about using passwords, tips on coming up with a safe one, and finally, some defences against scammers.

We recently saw that the Northern Ireland Police inadvertently provided a list of all their officers and

staff on a "Freedom of Information" request, which quickly fell into the wrong hands. It happens all the time to so many organisations, but, annoyingly, people like us have no choice in the matter – it's those who should be keeping our stuff private that don't. So, the message is this. If you are keeping other people's personal information on your computer or tablet, perhaps a list of your group members or such like, please make sure it's password protected because, believe you me, hackers WILL try and get into your device. Without a password, you've simply left the porch door open!



Passwords. Don't we love 'em! I could go on and on, as is my way, but I won't.

Use AT LEAST 12 characters, a number or two, and upper and lower case letters. That will take a hacker 300 years to "brute force" (So my chart tells me). It's not that difficult – here's an easy to remember one just as an example (PLEASE don't use it!) – U3aReally3xcellent. That's 18 mixed cases, with numbers. My chart says it would take 11 trillion years to hack. That should do, and it's dead easy to remember! It's not a PASSWORD, it's a PASSPHRASE.

Finally, If you don't get anything else out of this column, this is the list you should burn on your memory for when you receive a TEXT, CALL or EMAIL

- 1. You HAVEN'T won anything that is ALWAYS a scam.
- 2. You haven't missed a package that needs your details and a fee to pick up.
- 3. It is absolutely IMPOSSIBLE for anyone out there to detect that your computer or device has a technical problem which needs fixing. Don't believe them!
- 4. No bank will EVER ring you. If you think they did, then put your phone down (the caller might

- keep it connected). Go to a DIFFERENT phone, look up the bank's number and ring them. Better still, just unplug or turn the phone off and forget it. If the bank had a problem, they would freeze your account and write a letter.
- 5. Never click links in an email unless you are absolutely certain it is from someone you know, and the links are genuine. Never ever click a link in a text message, be especially careful with a text. With a link be sure you are stone-cold certain it is from a friend or genuine company, such as EE or Octopus Energy etc.
- 6. If you want to check where an email came from, even though it looks genuine, click FORWARD EMAIL (but don't ACTUALLY forward it!). You will see the forwarded version which reveals the true email address it came from.
- 7. Artificial Intelligence models can now EXACTLY mimic the voice of a relative or friend. If someone calls you because they're in trouble and need money, ask them something that nobody else would know. Never trust anyone in this situation.
- 8. Always use two-factor authentication if it's offered.
