Committee Chat

The Executive Committee (EC) met on 20th November to consider members' responses to the questionnaire posed at our September AGM. The EC's response is enclosed in this newsletter.

In our last Committee Chat, we referred to the 'Team' behind our u3a operation. Key members of the team are **our group leaders**. In your responses to the AGM questionnaire, some members suggested subjects for new groups. Our group co-ordinators met with 10 members to assist them form a singles lunch group. Also, Jean Jardine is organising a "Coffee and Chat Group", commencing in January at the Springhouse. Others who made suggestions for new groups are encouraged to contact our group co-ordinators who may assist those members start up their groups. **Remember, it only takes two to make a group.**

The EC has a project plan which finalises at next year's September AGM. It is reviewed at each EC meeting to ensure key objectives are met. On 20th November, the EC agreed that written Officer's reports will be presented at future AGMs.

We have been notified that the hire of the hall at the Springhouse will increase by 25% from January 2024. In last month's Committee Chat, we announced membership fees being held at £15–00 per person for 2024/2025. The EC stands by **that decision**, **but it will probably need revision for 2025/2026**. May 2024 will see the 10th Anniversary of Stanford-le-Hope and District u3a. Plans have been agreed to hold an Afternoon Tea in celebration on Thursday 2nd May 2024. Further details will be announced in the New Year.

The EC agreed in principle to hold a **Group Leaders' Coffee Morning** in 2024. The previous occasion was a success. We found it useful to discuss with group leaders any concerns they had, impart relevant news from the EC and provide a network for sharing ideas.

Over the past six months speakers at our u3a meetings have come from suggestions made by our members. If anyone has experienced a speaker, they think may suit our u3a membership, please drop an email to our Speakers Secretary

RESPONSES TO 2023 AGM QUESTIONS POSED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

COMMITTEE ACTION REQUIRED

1. Could invite non-committee members to attend committee meetings. –

In general, members are not permitted to attend Executive Committee (EC) meetings due to the confidentiality of some items discussed in committee
 Any member interested in joining the EC can contact the Secretary and request to attend before committing to stand for election.

2. <u>Did not know EC meetings were open</u>

I EC meetings are not open meetings

3. Are committee meeting minutes available to all?

© EC meeting minutes are not available, due to the confidentiality of some items discussed in committee.

© Committee Chat in the monthly newsletter provides key information about EC matters.

4. Nominate a charity for a year, like a local one rather than a national one

I Under Charity Commission Rules, we can only work with Charities with the

same ethos as us.

□ We are not able to donate money to a charity unless it shares our objective clause. However, collections could be undertaken as long as no money goes through the accounts.

I The EC has agreed to raise this at a General Meeting to seek the views of members.

5. <u>Use u3a as a base to volunteer for other organisations such as charity</u> <u>shops. Use the website?</u>

I Members are able to volunteer to any charitable organisations they may support without u3a involvement.

6. What happened to the survey you did some time ago? Nothing came of it. © COVID came along but the findings are still available to use although might be out of date.

7. <u>Keep advertising more in local libraries.</u>

□ With a membership in excess of 460, we have no need to advertise to attract additional members.

8. Facebook page? Many would need instruction

© Our Facebook Group is, "Stanford-le-Hope and District u3a". It is a Private Group for SLH & District u3a members only.

9. <u>Could we have a mid-month coffee morning either at The Springhouse else</u> local (Some people non-drivers)?

Jean Jardine is organising a monthly drop-in coffee morning on the first Monday of each month, from 10.00 to 12.00, commencing on 8th January 2024. (1stJanuary being New Year's Day).

10. <u>If on trips/outings, etc. – if low on numbers/vacancies, could places be</u> <u>offered to friends/family, etc.</u>

□ We have a procedure for this. If there are spare places for trips, spaces are offered to other u3as first. Any left can then be offered to other family members.

□ On the majority of trips, two coaches are now booked which leaves few, if any, spare spaces left.

Some destinations restrict the numbers that can attend. In such cases, additional dates may be offered.

11. <u>Occasional difficulty in booking trips, due to bookings being taken prior to</u> <u>the stated arrival time at meetings of 1.30pm. Ballot selection maybe?</u>

□ Refer to item 10 above. Please don't arrive too early.

<u>12. After the general meeting, may I suggest all different sections within the</u> <u>u3a have an exhibition of all projects (an open day)</u>

I The contact details for all group leaders are provided in the monthly newsletter. Members can contact them to discuss what any group involves.

13. Why don't we start with tea and biscuits and then start the meetings?

□ This is not practical due to other operational considerations.

MEMBERSHIP

14. Active membership enrolment. New members may have the expertise to start new groups. (I have previously raised this but was advised we could not expand membership.-not sure who told you that -we encourage new members)

□ The EC agrees.

A form has previously been available for new members to complete to identify their interests.

I New members will be asked to complete a Joining Form in addition to the current Membership Form to identify their interests which may assist in future u3a development

15. The only area that we seem to be falling down from our perspectives is with new members. There are many joining at meetings but we rarely see them joining the groups. Whether they are joining just for monthly meetings and the trips I don't know. It would be interesting to find out and whether we retain them after one year. One suggestion would be to try 3 monthly new member coffee mornings again where the committee or interested members could have the chance to sit down and talk to new people face to face about their interests, how they are finding their membership, what they have joined/not been able to join because its full, what they would like to see set up for them, what talents/expertise they have that could benefit u3a widely or the committee. Without knowing what the new members coming through could offer we are losing that new blood that the u3a needs. A lot of them feel it's a done deal and what is there is it. Those of us who came through at the beginning and set it all up know that new ideas are part of the fun. *I* In addition to the response given in item 15 above, the EC will introduce a questionnaire for new members to complete after a 3-month period to identify the activities they have become involved with since joining. We did try new members meeting but there was no interest.

20. A "Bus pass" excursion group. Especially for those who don't drive

22. Like to join London Walk

□ This group is over-subscribed.

I Membership has recently been rationalised.

Gardening Allotment News

December Allotment News

I wished for rain and it rained. Now I wish for a drier spell. The rain makes it very muddy at the allotment particularly with weeding. Pulling up weeds, which are mainly grass with lots of soil sticking to the roots. Being wet, it is not that easy to shake off the soil. Whilst weeding the strawberry bed I wondered why so many individual grass plants rooted around and within the strawberry plant. Possibly the grass and weed seed that blows around the allotment site eventually touches a plant leaf, falls to the ground and germinates when conditions allow. The grass roots can easily grow down into the strawberry plant making the weeds difficult to remove. Just a thought with no scientific proof! I have often had to dig up the whole strawberry plant remove the weed and plant back into the soil. Not good to disturb the plant but often I have no choice. The strawberry plants have produced runners so I thought it would be good to weed the bed so I could easily see what was a growing strawberry and what had died. Has taken a while to complete the weeding but now the weather has turned wet, cold and frosty. I will not transplant the small plants until the spring when conditions may be more favourable to them establishing and growing.

Back to the Blackberry bramble pruning. Very prickly even with leather gloves. Possible done around half the bramble at present. It looks a bit of a mess while I am doing it as I find it easier to cut out all the old wood and then trim and tie in the new. Where some of the new growth laid on the ground, it has found soil at its growing tip it and has grown roots to establish a new plant. Left alone the whole allotment could become covered in brambles which are difficult to dig up to get all the growing root out. A bit of root left in the ground will continue to grow in the spring into a new plant.

Have planted two double rows of Broad Bean seeds with all the usual safeguards against the mice stealing the seeds, still had a few spare seeds so I planted them in pots and are growing in the greenhouse to replace any at the allotment site that do not grow. So far, no sign of growing beans at the allotment. A recent BBC tv gardening programme, BEECHGROVE, has George Anderson from Joppa (that is near Edinburgh) describing how mice love broad beans seed and dig them up as I have previously described. Doesn't matter whether they are Essex or Scottish mice, they all like Broad Beans!!

As I said before, I did not plant the Gladioli corms very deep this year so have been lifting a few at a time and drying in my greenhouse at home ready for storage. Removed all the dried soil and trimmed the shrivelled roots Should prevent them from rotting. Many have clumps of very small corms which in a few years may produce another corm and flower.

I also planted a few Sweet Pea seeds in deep root trainers and placed them in the greenhouse. This is unheated, so germination will be slow but will give the plants a good start for next spring.

Finally sorted through my box of seeds discarding any that are out of date. Some seed suppliers had discounts over the Black Friday weekend so I quickly updated the spread sheet and ordered new seeds. May have saved a few pounds or not!! Unfortunately I found a few Cauliflower seed in date so will try and grow the coming year. Not sure of any success.

Our walk in October took us to one of the more affluent areas of London, – Mayfair. We started at **Piccadilly Circus** where we saw the statue of Eros, although we found out that it should be called Anteros, the Greek god of unrequited love.

The walk then took us along Piccadilly passing on the way **Fortnum and Mason's**, established in 1707. Although it is somewhat exclusive it was originally founded by a footman in the court of Queen Anne. They claim to have invented the Scotch egg in 1738. We passed by **The Royal Academy of Arts**, the oldest art school in England and continued on to see the famous **Burlington Arcade**. Our walk then took us down Albermarle Street where the oldest hotel in London is situated, **Brown's Hotel**, founded 1837. Such famous people as Theodore Roosevelt and Franklin D. Roosevelt have stayed there. We continued on our walk to pass **The Royal Institution of Great Britain**, where the popular Christmas lectures are held.

Our walk then took us through several streets lined with fine Regency dwellings to reach **Shepherd Market**. Although no longer a market it was here that an annual fair was held, this gave the area its name of **Mayfair**.

After lunch we made our way via **Down Street**, were there is a disused underground station that in WW11 was often used by Churchill and other

members of the cabinet when the War rooms were unavailable. He called it the "burrow". We carried on to pass the Hilton Hotel facing Hyde Park and on to Pitt's Head Mews and into Curzon Square. It was here in her flat that Mama Cass Elliot, of the Mamas and papas died in 1974 and four years later Keith Moon, drummer with the Who, died in the same bed.

Our next stop was at **Berkley Square**, which was the home of Clive of India. Number 50 is said to be the most haunted house in London. The next square we entered was **Grosvenor Square**, once the site of the American Embassy. We walked along **Duke Street**, now famous for the tv programme " Duchess of Duke Street". As we neared the end of our walk we saw the **Ukrainian Catholic Cathedral**, designed by Alfred Waterhouse who designed the Natural History Museum. We ended our walk at Bond Street station to take the Elizabeth Line back to Tower Hill via Liverpool Street.
